The Ministry of Corporate Affairs, Government of India ('MCA') vide its General Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 08, 2020, the General Circular No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020, the General Circular No. 22/2020 dated June 15, 2020, the General Circular No. 33/2020 dated September 28, 2020, General Circular No. 39/2020 dated December 31, 2020, the General Circular No. 10/2021 dated June 23, 2021, General Circular No. 20/2021 dated December 08, 2021, General Circular No. 02/2022 dated May 05, 2022, General Circular No. 11/2022 dated December 28, 2022 and General Circular No 09/2023 dated September 25, 2023, and other circulars issued in this respect ('MCA Circulars') allowed, inter-alia, conduct of AGM through Video Conferencing/ Other Audio-Visual Means ('VC/ OAVM') facility on or before September 30, 2024. The Securities and Exchange Board of India ('SEBI') also vide its SEBI Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD2/ CIR/P/2022/62 dated May 13, 2022, SEBI Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/PoD-2/P/CIR/2023/4 dated January 05, 2023 and SEBI Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/CFD-PoD-2/P/CIR/2023/167 October 07, 2023 ('SEBI Circulars') has provided certain relaxations from compliance with certain provisions of SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ('SEBI Listing Regulations'). In compliance with these Circulars, provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 ('Act') and the SEBI Listing Regulations, the 33rd AGM of the Company is being conducted through VC/ OAVM facility.
2. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 108 of the Act read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014, as amended ('Management Rules'), Secretarial Standard-2 ('SS-2') on General Meetings and Regulation 44 of SEBI Listing Regulations read with MCA Circulars, as amended, the Company through Central Depository Services Limited ('CDSL') will be providing facilities in respect of:
 - (a) voting through remote e-voting;
 - (b) e-voting during the AGM. The procedure for participating in the meeting through VC/OAVM is explained further.

Participation in the AGM through VC/OAVM shall be provided by 'PURVA SHARE REGISTRY INDIA PVT. LTD'
3. In terms of the MCA Circulars, physical attendance of Members has been dispensed with and, therefore, there is no requirement of appointment of proxies. Accordingly, the facility of appointment of proxies by Members under Section 105 of the Act will not be available for the 33rd AGM, Hence, the Proxy Form and Attendance Slip including Route Map are not annexed to this Notice.
4. In pursuance of Section 112 and Section 113 of the Act, representatives of the Members may be appointed for the purpose of voting through remote e-Voting through Board Resolution/ Power of Attorney/ Authority Letter, etc., for participation in the 33rd AGM through VC/ OAVM facility and e-Voting during the 33rd AGM.

The said Resolution/Authorization shall be sent to the Scrutinizer by email through its registered email address to info@igfl.co.in or to rocteam.professionals@gmail.com with a copy marked to helpdesk.evoting@cdslindia.com on or before 29th September, 2026 at 05:00 pm without which the vote shall not be treated as valid.
5. Attendance of the Members participating in the 33rd AGM through VC/ OAVM facility using their login credentials shall be counted for the purpose of reckoning the quorum under Section 103 of the Act.
6. The Members can join the AGM in the VC/ OAVM mode 15 minutes before and after the scheduled time of the commencement of the Meeting by following the procedure mentioned in the Notice. The facility of participation at the AGM through VC/OAVM will be made available for 1000 Members on first come first served basis. This will not include large Shareholders (Shareholders holding 2% or more shareholding), Promoters, Institutional Investors, Directors, Key Managerial Personnel, the Chairpersons of the Audit Committee, Nomination and Remuneration Committee and Stakeholders Relationship Committee, Auditors etc. who are allowed to attend the AGM without restriction on account of first come first served basis.

Procedure for remote e-voting and e-voting during the AGM :

13. Pursuant to the provisions of section 108 of the Act read with Management Rules and Regulation 44 of the SEBI Listing Regulations and in terms of SEBI circular no. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated December 09, 2020 in relation to e-Voting facility provided by listed entities and the MCA Circulars, the Company is providing facility of remote e-Voting to its Members in respect of the business to be transacted at the AGM.

14. The remote e-Voting period begins on Sunday, September 27, 2026 at 09:00 A.M. (IST) and ends on Tuesday, September 29, 2026 at 05:00 P.M. (IST). The remote e-Voting module shall be disabled by CDSL for voting thereafter. The Members, whose names appear in the Register of Members/ Beneficial Owners as on the cut-off date i.e., Wednesday, September 23, 2026 may cast their vote electronically.

15. The voting right of member shall be in proportion to their share in the paid-up equity share capital of the Company as on the cut-off date, Wednesday, September 23, 2026. Once the vote on a resolution is cast by the Member, he/she shall not be allowed to change it subsequently. A person who is not a Member as on the cut-off date should treat this Notice of AGM for information purpose only.

16. The facility for voting through e-voting system shall also be made available during the AGM. Members attending the AGM who have not cast their vote by remote e-voting shall be eligible to cast their vote through e-voting during the AGM. Members who have voted through remote e-voting shall be eligible to attend the AGM, however, they shall not be eligible to vote at the AGM. Members holding shares in physical form are requested to access the remote e-voting facility provided by the Company through CDSL e-voting system at www.evoting.cdsi.com

17. The Board of Directors has appointed M/s. Isha Bothra & Associates, Practicing Company Secretary (ACS: 27531 / CP No. 9949), as the Scrutinizer for scrutinizing the process of remote e-Voting and e-Voting during the Meeting in a fair and transparent manner.

18. The Results of remote e-Voting and voting at the Meeting shall be declared by the Chairman or by any other director or Company Secretary duly authorised in this regard. The Results declared along with the Report of the Scrutinizer shall be placed on the Company's website www.igfl.co.in and on the website CDSL www.evoting.cdsi.com immediately after the results are declared and simultaneously communicated to the Stock Exchanges in compliance with Regulation 44(3) of the SEBI Listing Regulations. The Resolutions shall be deemed to be passed on the date of the Meeting, i.e. Wednesday, September 30, 2026, subject to receipt of the requisite number of votes in favour of the Resolutions.

19. The Scrutinizer shall within a period not exceeding 2 (Two) working days from the conclusion of the e-voting period unblock the votes in the presence of at least 2 (Two) witnesses not in the employment of the Company and make a Scrutinizer's report of the votes cast in favour or against, if any, forthwith to the Chairman of the Company or a person authorised by him in writing.

20. The Results shall be declared after the AGM of the Company. The Results declared along with the Scrutinizer's Report shall be placed on the Company's website at www.igfl.co.in and on the website of CDSL within 2 (Two) working days of passing of the resolutions at the AGM of the Company and the same will also be communicated to the Stock Exchanges.

24. The Members who have cast their vote by remote e-voting prior to the AGM may also attend/ participate in the AGM through VC / OAVM but shall not be entitled to cast their vote again.

25. Pursuant to Section 91 of the Act The Register of Members and Share Transfer Books of the Company will remain closed from Thursday, 24th September, 2026 to Wednesday, 30th September, 2026 (both days inclusive) for the purpose of AGM.

26. The Registers maintained under Section 170 & 189 of the Act, and the relevant documents referred to in the Notice will be available electronically for inspection till the conclusion of AGM by the members based on the request being sent on interglobefinance@gmail.com.
27. Member(s) must quote their Folio Number/ DP ID & Client ID and contact details such as email address, contact no. etc. in all correspondences with the Company/ RTA.
28. As per Regulation 40 of LODR Regulations, as amended, securities of listed companies can be transferred only in dematerialized form with effect from April 1, 2019, except in case of request received for transmission or transposition of securities. In view of this and to eliminate all risks associated with physical shares and for ease of portfolio management, members holding shares in physical form are requested to consider converting their holdings to dematerialized form. Members can contact the RTA for assistance in this regard.

Pursuant to SEBI Circular NO SEBI/HO/MIRSD/MIRSD-PoD/P/CIR/2025/97 dated July 02, 2025, to facilitate ease of investing for investors and to secure the rights of investors, a special window had been opened only for re-lodgment of transfer deeds, which were logged prior to the deadline of April 01, 2019 and rejected/returned/not attended to due to deficiency of the documents/process/or otherwise, for a period of six months from July 07, 2025 till January 06, 2026.

Further, in order to further facilitate the investors to get rightful access to their securities, the Board has decided to open another special window for transfer and dematerialisation ("demat") of physical securities which were sold/purchased prior to April 01, 2019. This special window shall be open for a period of one year from February 05, 2026 to February 04, 2027. 29. In case of joint holders, the Member whose name appears as the first holder in the order of names as per the Register of Members of the Company will be entitled to vote at the AGM.

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 72 of the Act the Member(s) holding shares in physical form may nominate, in the prescribed manner, any person to whom all the rights in the shares shall vest in the event of death of the sole holder or all the joint holders. 31. Member(s) holding shares in physical form is/ are requested to notify immediately any change of their respective addresses and bank account details. THE INTRUCTIONS OF SHAREHOLDERS FOR E-VOTING AND E-VOTING DURING AGM/EGM AND JOINING MEETING THROUGH VC/OAVM ARE AS UNDER:

Step 1: Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.

Step 2: Access through CDSL e-Voting system in case of shareholders holding shares in physical mode and non individual shareholders in demat mode

- (i) The Remote E-voting period begins on Sunday, 27th September, 2026 at 9:00 a.m.(IST) and ends on Tuesday, 29th September, 2026 at 5:00 p.m. During this period shareholders' of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the cut-off date (record date) of Wednesday, 23rd September, 2026 may cast their vote electronically. The e-voting module shall be disabled by CDSL for voting thereafter.
- (ii) Shareholders who have already voted prior to the meeting date would not be entitled to vote at the meeting venue.
- (iii) Pursuant to SEBI Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated 09.12.2020, under Regulation 44 of Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, listed entities are required to provide remote e-voting facility to its shareholders, in respect of all shareholders' resolutions. However, it has been observed that the participation by the public non-institutional shareholders/retail shareholders is at a negligible level.

Currently, there are multiple e-voting service providers (ESPs) providing e-voting facility to listed entities in India. This necessitates registration on various ESPs and maintenance of multiple user IDs and passwords by the shareholders.

In order to increase the efficiency of the voting process, pursuant to a public consultation, it has been decided to enable e-voting to all the demat account holders, by way of a single login credential, through their demat accounts/ websites of Depositories/ Depository Participants. Demat account holders would be able to cast their vote without having to register again with the ESPs, thereby, not only facilitating seamless authentication but also enhancing ease and convenience of participating in e-voting process.

Step 1 : Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode

- (iv) In terms of SEBI circular no. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated December 9, 2020 on e-Voting facility provided by Listed Companies, Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode are allowed to vote through their demat account maintained with Depositories and Depository Participants. THE MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS REPORT

ECONOMIC AND INDUSTRY OVERVIEW:

Global Economy

The global economy remained resilient in 2025 despite evolving uncertainty and macro economic volatility. Key challenges included uncertainties surrounding the impacts of tariffs on global growth. However, the effects remained contained, largely due to the agility and responsiveness of fiscal policies and the private sector, which adapted by rapidly and effectively adjusting supply chains and trade flows to mitigate the disruptions. The front-loading of imports in the first half of the calendar year, coupled with the rapid reconfiguration of supply chains helped minimise disruptions. Moreover, the restraint exhibited by the rest of the world in maintaining an open trading system despite the imposition of tariffs, played a crucial role in averting a more pronounced economic downturn. Consequently, global growth is estimated at 3.4%¹ in 2025. Larger than anticipated investments in AI and allied sectors surged to unprecedented levels, creating strong global spillover benefits and cushioning economies against headwinds from higher US tariffs. A defining feature of 2025 was the divergence between advanced and emerging economies. Advanced economies grew at a subdued pace of 1.9%¹, weighed down by weak manufacturing activity, tighter credit conditions, and slower consumer demand. In contrast, emerging markets and developing economies maintained stronger momentum, expanding at 4.4%¹, supported by domestic demand, improving labour markets, and relatively resilient financial systems. Countries like India and parts of Southeast Asia continued to act as global growth engines. However, global trade growth remained at 5.1%¹, reflecting supply chain realignments, rising protectionism and a shift toward regionalisation. According to insights from the Press Information Bureau and policy commentary aligned with the Reserve Bank of India, these trends have also influenced capital flows and external sector dynamics for emerging economies, including India. From a macro-financial standpoint, elevated global debt levels continued to pose structural risks. The International Monetary Fund (IMF) estimates that global public debt remained above 90%¹ of GDP, limiting fiscal space for many governments, especially in advanced economies. At the same time, tighter global liquidity conditions and higher borrowing costs increased vulnerabilities in highly leveraged sectors and emerging markets with external financing needs. Commodity markets remained volatile, particularly crude oil, where geopolitical developments caused intermittent price spikes, adding to inflationary pressures and impacting current account balances globally. Despite these headwinds, financial systems remained broadly stable, supported by strong bank capitalisation and regulatory oversight in major economies. These global trends influence capital flows, funding costs, and risk appetite in emerging markets including India.

Outlook

As 2026 commenced, this resilience came under strain from escalating geopolitical tensions in West Asia. Disruptions to critical energy infrastructure and a near halt in shipments through the Strait of Hormuz constrained the global flow of crude oil, petroleum products, and liquefied natural gas. This triggered sharp increases in energy prices, accompanied by heightened volatility driven by uncertainty over the duration and impact of the conflict, while also posing broader risks to global supply chains. Assuming a relatively short-lived conflict, the IMF projects global growth to moderate to 3.1%¹ in 2026 and 3.2%¹ in 2027. However, this masks significant divergence across regions. Lower-income, commodity-importing economies are likely to be disproportionately affected by elevated energy and food prices, as well as currency depreciation. Advanced economies are expected to grow at 1.8%¹ in 2026, with the U.S. leading at 2.3%¹. Growth in the euro area is projected to ease from 1.4%¹ in 2025 to 1.1%¹ in 2026, before inching up to 1.2%¹ in 2027. Emerging market and developing economies may see growth moderate to 3.9%¹, with China expanding at 4.4%¹. In the Middle East and Central Asia, growth is expected to decline sharply from 3.6%¹ in 2025 to 1.9%¹ in 2026, before rebounding to 4.6%¹ in 2027 as the region absorbs the immediate impact of the conflict and subsequently recovers.

Global inflation is expected to temporarily stall its downward trajectory, rising from 4.1%¹ in 2025 to 4.4%¹ in 2026, before easing to 3.7%¹ in 2027. Overall, risks remain skewed to the downside. While growth could surprise on the upside if tailwinds such as AI-led investment remain stronger than anticipated or financial conditions stay supportive, these benefits may prove transitory. These are likely to be outweighed by downside risks stemming from the ongoing conflict. Over the medium-term, risks remain elevated, including potential resource misallocation driven by AI exuberance and the persistence of policies that could exacerbate real, fiscal, and financial vulnerabilities, potentially amplified through financial market channels.

Indian Economy

India's economy in FY26 remained one of the fastestgrowing among major global economies despite external challenges. The growth was supported by robust domestic demand, sustained government capital expenditure, and macroeconomic stability. The economy is estimated to grow by 7.7%² in FY26 against 7.1%² in FY25. High-frequency indicators, including GST collections (averaging H 1.7-1.8 Lakh Crore per month) and e-way bill generation reflected sustained economic activity and formalisation.

Among major emerging market and developing economies (EMDEs), India has recorded one of the sharpest declines in headline inflation. Over the past four years, average retail inflation, as measured by CPI, has followed a clear downward trajectory, declining from 6.7%² in FY23 to 3.40%² up to March 2026. Inflation eased further to 0.3%² in October 2025, marking the lowest level recorded in the current CPI series. The Reserve Bank of India initiated a monetary easing cycle in 2025 through calibrated repo rate cuts to support economic growth. A 25-basis-point reduction in February 2025 brought the repo rate down to 6.25%³, followed by another 25-bps cut in April 2025,

along with a shift in the policy stance from 'neutral' to 'accommodative'. In June 2025, the central bank accelerated its easing measures with a 50-bps cut and a return to a 'neutral' stance, followed by a further 25-bps reduction in December, bringing the repo rate to 5.25%. In April 2026, the Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) kept the repo rate unchanged at 5.25% and maintained a 'neutral' stance, in line with market expectations. The prevailing rate environment is expected to support economic activity by enabling banks to sustain lending rates, thereby encouraging borrowing and consumption. From a sectoral perspective, services continued to be the primary growth driver, while manufacturing showed gradual improvement supported by Production-Linked Incentive (PLI) schemes and supply chain diversification. Investment activity remained strong, with gross fixed capital formation contributing significantly to GDP growth. Fiscal consolidation also progressed steadily, with the fiscal deficit budgeted 4.4% of GDP in FY26, reflecting a balance between growth support and fiscal prudence. FY26 was characterised by resilient growth, macroeconomic stability, controlled inflation, and strong policy support, positioning India as a key driver of global economic expansion despite external headwinds. This macroeconomic environment continues to support credit growth across retail and MSME segments..

NBFC Industry Overview

NBFCs play a critical role in advancing financial inclusion by catering to the unbanked and underbanked population, including informal sector participants and first-time borrowers. Their proximity to customers, underwriting practices, and ability to design customised financial solutions have made them important contributors to bridging credit gaps. This grassroots connectivity also enables NBFCs to support government initiatives aimed at inclusive growth and economic formalisation.

India's NBFC sector has emerged as a vital pillar of the country's financial ecosystem, demonstrating sustained growth, adaptability, and deepening relevance in enabling credit access. Historically outpacing GDP growth, NBFC credit expansion continues to reflect the sector's structural importance in supporting consumption, entrepreneurship, and financial inclusion. From a modest asset base of less than H 2 Trillion at the turn of the century, the sector has expanded exponentially to approximately H 50 Trillion in assets under management (AUM) by the end of FY25. Between FY19 and FY25, NBFC credit grew at a compounded annual growth rate (CAGR) of around 13%, with AUM doubling from H 24 Trillion to H 50 Trillion-underscoring both scale and resilience.

MSME financing remains a core structural growth driver, accounting for approximately 22% of total NBFC credit outstanding in FY25. This segment is projected to grow at a strong pace of 20% in FY26, driven by increasing adoption of loans against property, enhanced policy support, and improving credit penetration. NBFCs are uniquely positioned to serve MSMEs, which often face constraints in accessing formal credit due to limited collateral, lack of formal documentation, or thin credit histories. Corporate and commercial real estate lending is expected to witness a moderate uptick, while infrastructure financing may see some moderation due to higher repayments, declining repo rates, and the completion of certain large-scale government programmes.

A defining characteristic of the NBFC sector is its complementary role to the banking system. While banks continue to dominate the financial landscape, their retail loan portfolio accounted for around 40-45% of total credit as of FY25, with a greater focus on large corporates, agriculture, and services. In comparison, NBFCs exhibit a relatively stronger retail orientation, with nearly half of their portfolios dedicated to retail lending.

The growth outlook for NBFCs is supported by India's strong economic fundamentals. Following a strong double-digit credit growth in FY25, NBFCs are expected to sustain momentum, with overall credit growth projected at approximately 17-18% over the next two years. Retail lending is anticipated to remain the primary driver, reflecting both rising consumer aspirations and the sector's strong distribution capabilities. Segments such as gold loans, personal loans, and auto finance are likely to remain key growth engines. Elevated gold prices, improving consumer sentiments, and rising disposable incomes are expected to support demand, while policy support may drive adoption of retail credit products, especially Gold, Consumer Durable & Personal Loans.

The sector has also undergone a significant transformation in terms of technological adoption and operational sophistication. The rise of digital infrastructure, including mobile internet, digital authentication, and neo-banking platforms, has enabled modularisation of financial services, making credit more accessible and efficient. Fintech partnerships have further accelerated innovation, particularly in unsecured lending, where data-driven underwriting models have expanded reach to new-to-credit segments and customers in Tier II and Tier III cities.

However, rapid expansion in unsecured lending has introduced emerging risks. The unsecured segment witnessed a sharp expansion over the past five years, with a CAGR of approximately 30% between FY21 and FY25, compared to 15% in the secured segment. This raised concerns around borrower overleveraging, especially in microfinance and personal loans, where rising inflation and stagnant incomes affected repayment capacity. In response, regulatory interventions, including higher risk weights and prudential norms introduced by the RBI has led to moderation in credit growth and recalibration of lending strategies.

Consequently, NBFCs have recalibrated their portfolios, reducing exposure to unsecured loans and strengthening risk management frameworks. The share of unsecured lending is expected to stabilise in near terms (25-30%) with gradual expansion supported by industry initiatives, borrower discipline and economic recovery.

Looking ahead, growth across both secured and unsecured segments is expected to remain balanced. Secured lending is likely to be supported by strong demand in gold loans and vehicle financing, while unsecured lending will continue to grow at a healthy pace, albeit with tighter underwriting standards. The regulatory environment is

also evolving constructively, with the central bank introducing guidelines on co lending, securitisation, digital lending, and collateral based financing. These measures are expected to enhance transparency, improve underwriting standards, and unlock incremental growth opportunities over the medium term.

Overall, NBFCs are well positioned to benefit from continued formalisation, rising digital credit penetration and expanding access to credit across segments, reinforcing their role as a key driver of India's financial deepening.

Outlook

The outlook for the Indian NBFC sector for FY 2026-27 remains positive, supported by strong credit demand, improving liquidity and continued economic growth.

NBFC credit growth reached 14.4% YoY in June 2026, with retail credit growing particularly strongly at 20.3%.

Retail NBFC AUM is expected to grow by around 16–18% in FY27, indicating healthy loan demand. Growth is likely to be led by vehicle finance, housing, gold loans, consumer finance and MSME lending. Improving asset quality and better collections should support profitability, although microfinance and unsecured lending remain areas of concern. Funding costs and regulatory tightening could put some pressure on margins, making liability diversification and strong capitalisation important.

Competition from banks is also expected to remain high. Overall, NBFCs with strong underwriting, diversified funding, prudent risk management and a focus on secured lending are likely to outperform. Hence, FY27 should see sustainable, quality-led growth rather than aggressive balance-sheet expansion.

INDUSTRY STRUCTURE AND DEVELOPMENT

NBFCs are key pillars of India's financial intermediation ecosystem. They complement scheduled commercial banks (SCBs) by extending credit to customer segments and geographies where conventional channels are less penetrated. Their specialised underwriting, product innovation and last-mile delivery capabilities — supported by increasing digital origination and servicing — have facilitated greater access to finance for micro and small enterprises, self-employed borrowers, affordable housing customers and microfinance-linked households, thereby advancing financial inclusion and supporting broad-based economic activity.

In line with this expanding role, NBFC credit as a proportion of GDP has increased steadily over the past decade from 8.9% in FY2015 to 14.6% in FY2025.

The regulatory landscape for NBFCs has continued to evolve towards a more proportionate, risk-aligned framework under the Reserve Bank of India's (RBI's) scale-based regulation (SBR), which applies differentiated requirements based on size, complexity, activity profile and systemic importance across base, middle, upper and top layers, with enhanced governance, prudential and disclosure expectations for upper-layer entities.

In addition to statutory oversight, greater emphasis is being placed on industry-led standard setting through self-regulation initiatives, intended to strengthen best practices, transparency and consumer protection. In May 2025, the RBI issued digital lending directions that formalise and consolidate regulatory expectations for the digital credit ecosystem. These measures reinforce conduct standards and customer safeguards by improving transparency, accountability and controls over data practices and servicing as digital first lending models expand.

During the year the Reserve Bank of India has undertaken a significant rationalisation of its regulatory framework, including the consolidation of over 9,000 regulatory instructions into 238 Master Directions out of which 35 Master Directions were issued for Non-Banking Finance Companies (NBFCs). The RBI further completed a similar consolidation exercise covering all supervisory instructions, reinforcing consistency and ease of compliance across regulated entities. This simplification enhances regulatory clarity, reduces interpretational complexity and supports more efficient engagement with the regulator. We view these measures as strengthening the operating environment for well governed NBFCs and as being aligned with our disciplined approach to compliance, governance and risk management.

The NBFC sector performance indicators have remained supportive of GDP growth. Credit growth for NBFCs in the aggregate upper and middle layers reached 21.3% year-on-year as of September 2025. Asset quality has further improved, with the overall gross non-performing assets (GNPA) ratio declining to 2.9% as of September 2025 from 3.4% a year earlier — which reflects continued strengthening in portfolio performance, underwriting discipline and collection outcomes.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Corporate Information

Inter Globe Finance Limited (CIN: L65999WB1992PLC055265) is a public limited company incorporated on April 24, 1992. The Company is classified as a non-government company and is registered with the Registrar of Companies, Kolkata I (Eastern Region Directorate). The Company has an authorized share capital of U6,00,00,000 and a paid-up share capital of U3,56,42,950. The registered office of the Company is 68, Bentinck Street, Aloka House, 1st Floor, Kolkata, West Bengal, India, 700001. The Company is maintaining its books of Accounts at 85, Bentinck Street, 4th Floor, Kolkata, West Bengal, India, 700 001.

The last Annual General Meeting (AGM) of the Company was held on September 25, 2025. As per the records available with the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA), the financial statements of the Company have been filed up to the financial year ended March 31, 2025.

The NIC Code corresponding to the Company's CIN is 6599. As per this classification, the Company is engaged in "Other financial intermediation n.e.c." This class includes other financial intermediation primarily concerned with distributing funds other than by making loans. This includes investment in securities including dealing for own account by securities dealers. (Security dealing on behalf of others is classified in class 6712).

Basis of preparation:

1. Statement of Compliance:

The accompanying financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with the Generally Accepted Accounting Principles in India ("Indian GAAP") and comply in all material respects with the Accounting Standards notified under the Companies (Accounting Standards) Rules, 2006, as amended, read with the relevant provisions of the Companies Act, 2013.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention on an accrual basis and on the assumption that the Company is a going concern. The accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements have been applied consistently and are consistent with those followed in the previous year.

2. Basis of Measurement:

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis and on a going concern basis, except for certain financial instruments and defined benefit obligations, which are measured at fair value or amortised cost at the end of each reporting period, in accordance with the applicable Indian Accounting Standards.

The accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are consistent with those followed in the previous year. Previous year figures have been regrouped and/or reclassified wherever necessary to conform to the current year's presentation.

3. Current and Non-current Classification

The Company presents its assets and liabilities in the Balance Sheet based on the current and non current classification.

Current Classification:

- A. An asset is classified as current when it is:
- i) Expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the normal operating cycle;
 - ii) Held primarily for the purpose of trading;
 - iii) Expected to be realised within twelve months after the reporting period; or
 - iv) Cash or cash equivalent unless the asset is restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

- B. A liability is current when it is:
- i) Expected to be settled in the normal operating cycle;
 - ii) Held primarily for the purpose of trading;
 - iii) Expected to be realised within twelve months after the reporting period; or
 - iv) There is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period. Terms of a liability that could, at the option of the counterparty, result in its settlement by the issue of equity instruments, do not affect its classification.

Non-Current Classification:

An asset or liability will be classified as non-current if it does not meet the criteria for a current assets current liability.

Others:

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities.

Assets and liabilities are classified between current and non-current considering 12 months period as normal operating cycle.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with the applicable Indian Accounting Standards ("Ind AS") requires the management to make estimates, judgments and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities at the reporting date. Actual results may differ from these estimates and assumptions. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis, and revisions to accounting estimates are recognised prospectively in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future periods affected.

Significant Accounting Policies:

A summary of the significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of the financial statements is presented below. These accounting policies have been applied consistently to all the periods presented in these financial statements.

Tangible Fixed Assets:

Tangible Fixed Assets are stated at cost of acquisition or construction, net of accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, if any. The cost of Tangible Fixed Assets comprises the purchase price, duties and taxes, and any directly attributable cost for bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use.

Subsequent expenditure related to an item of Tangible Fixed Asset is capitalised only if it increases the future economic benefits from the existing asset beyond its previously assessed standard of performance. All other repair and maintenance costs are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss as and when incurred.

Capital Work-in-Progress includes expenditure incurred on assets under installation or under development as at the reporting date and is carried at cost.

The Company reviews the carrying amount of Tangible Fixed Assets at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. Any impairment loss is recognised whenever the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount.

Intangible Fixed Assets:

Intangible Fixed Assets are stated at cost less accumulated amortisation and impairment losses, if any. Cost includes the purchase price and expenditure directly attributable to the asset's readiness for use.

Impairment of Assets:

The Company assesses at each reporting date whether there is any indication that a tangible or intangible asset may be impaired. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated. The recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's net selling price and its value in use. If the carrying amount of the asset exceeds its recoverable amount, the asset is considered impaired and the carrying amount is reduced to its recoverable amount. The impairment loss is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

An impairment loss recognised in prior periods is reversed if there has been a change in the estimate of the recoverable amount. Such reversal is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss to the extent that carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined (net of depreciation amortisation) had no impairment loss been recognised earlier.

Depreciation and Amortization:

Depreciation on tangible assets is provided on the Written Down Value Method (WDV) in accordance with the useful lives prescribed under Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013, or at the rates permissible under applicable local laws, so as to allocate the cost of the assets over their estimated useful lives. The depreciation methods, useful lives, and residual values are reviewed at the end of each financial year.

However, the following specific policies are applied:

- (i) Leasehold land and leasehold improvements are amortised over the primary period of lease.
- (ii) Intangible assets are amortised over their useful live of 5 years.

Investments:

Investments are classified as Current Investments and Long-Term Investments based on the intention of the management and the expected period of holding. Investments that are readily realisable and intended to be held for not more than one year from the date of acquisition are classified as Current Investments. All other investments are classified as Long-Term Investments.

All investments are initially recognised at cost, which includes the purchase price and directly attributable acquisition costs such as brokerage, fees and duties. Where investments are acquired, wholly or in part, through the issue of the Company's own shares or other securities, the acquisition cost is measured at the fair value of the securities issued. In cases where the investment is acquired in exchange for another asset, the cost is determined with reference to the fair value of the asset given up or the fair value of the investment acquired, whichever is more clearly evident.

Current Investments are carried in the financial statements at the lower of cost and fair value, determined on an individual investment basis. Long-Term Investments are carried at cost, subject to provision for diminution in value to recognise any decline that is considered other than temporary.

On disposal of an investment, the difference between the carrying amount and the net disposal proceeds is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss for the period.

Employee Benefits:

Employee benefits include salaries and wages, bonus, contribution to provident fund and employee state insurance scheme, gratuity, and compensated absences.

Trade Receivable:

Trade receivables represent amounts receivable from share brokers against transactions in shares and securities and dividend income accrued/ pending for receipt as at the reporting date, arising in the ordinary course of the Company's business activities.

Inventories:

The Company is engaged in the business of trading in shares and securities. Inventories comprise stock of shares and securities held for trading purposes and are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Net realisable value represents the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less the estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

The valuation of shares and securities held as inventory at the year-end has been certified by the Management, and the same has been relied for the purpose of valuation and reporting in the financial statements.

Borrowing Cost:

Borrowing costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition, construction, exploration, development, or erection of qualifying assets are capitalized as part of the cost of such assets until the time the assets are substantially ready for their intended use. Qualifying assets are those that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale. Capitalization of borrowing costs ceases when substantially all the activities necessary to prepare the qualifying asset for its intended use are complete.

All other borrowing costs are recognized as an expense in the year in which they are incurred. Borrowing costs consist of interest, exchange differences arising from foreign currency borrowings to the extent that they are regarded as an adjustment to the interest cost, and other costs incurred in connection with the borrowing of funds.

Share Capital:

Based upon the audit procedures performed and the information and explanations given by the management, during the Financial Year 2023-24, the company had obtained the shareholder's approval for Preferential issue and allotment of 76,60,000 Convertible Warrants into equity shares of face value of Rs. 10/- each to promoters and non-promoter(s) of company at a price determined in accordance with the provisions of SEBI (Issue of Capital and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2018 amounting to Rs. 46.50/-.

Pursuant to obtaining the necessary approvals and after due deliberation & in accordance with the Companies (Prospectus and Allotment of Securities) Rules, 2014 and other applicable laws & regulations, the Company approved the Allotment of 68,35,000 Convertible Warrants to promoters and non-promoters on preferential basis on 27th May 2024.

Subsequently, out of the subscribed 68,35,000 convertible warrants, the Company allotted 21,35,000 warrants to Non promoters on preferential basis on 14th August, 2024.

The Company was in receipt of the Allotment money aggregating to Rs. 9,97,72,500 from Non-Promoters and there was no circulation of funds or mere passing of book entries in this regard.

Further, the Company obtained trading approval (w.e.f. 10.10.2024) from BSE for the afore 21,35,000 warrants (converted into equity shares) & the same were held in lock upto 15.05.2025.

During the year under review, the remaining balance i.e. 75% full payment was received against 46,07,000 warrants - 19,95,000 warrants were duly converted into Equity Shares on 26.10.2025 & 26,12,000 warrants were converted into Equity Shares on 06.11.2025 & subsequently the Equity Share Capital increased to Rs. 13,56,42,950/-

The Remaining 93,000 warrants subscribed to by Mr. Pramod Jain were forfeited. The subscription money received on the aforesaid 93,000 warrants amounting to Rs. 10,81,125/- have been transferred to General Reserve.

Revenue Recognition: Revenue from Operations

The Company is engaged in the business of trading in shares and securities and lending activities.

- Sale and operating income include sale of Shares and Interest Income on Loans and Advances, etc.
- Interest income is recognized on a time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding and the applicable rate of interest.
- Dividend income is recognized when the Company's right to receive the dividend is established.
- Fee and commission income, other than those which are integral to the Effective Interest Rate (EIR), is recognized in accordance with the terms of the relevant agreements/contracts when it is probable that the consideration will be collected.
- Other income represents income arising from activities incidental to the business of the Company and is recognized when the right to receive such income is established in accordance with the terms of the relevant arrangement.

Taxation:

Tax expense comprises current tax and deferred tax. Current income tax expense includes taxes on income arising from operations in India and foreign jurisdictions. Income tax expense or credit for the period represents the tax payable on the current period's taxable income based on the applicable tax rates, adjusted for changes in deferred tax assets and liabilities arising from temporary differences, unused tax losses, and unused tax credits. Income tax payable in India is determined in accordance with the provisions of the Income Tax Act, 1961.

1. Current Tax

- Current tax expense is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss, except to the extent that it relates to items recognized directly in other comprehensive income (OCI) or in equity, in which case the tax is recognized in OCI or equity, respectively.
- Current tax represents the expected tax payable on the taxable income for the year, computed in accordance with the provisions of the Income Tax Act, 1961, using the tax rates enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period, and includes adjustments, if any, to tax payable for prior years.

2. Deferred tax

- Deferred tax is recognised in respect of temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities for financial reporting purposes and the corresponding amounts used for taxation purposes. Deferred tax is also recognised in respect of carried forward tax losses and tax credits.
- Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured using the tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date. Deferred income tax relating to items recognized directly in equity is recognized in equity and not in the statement of profit and loss. Deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities are offset, if a legally enforceable right exists to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities relate to the taxes on income levied by the same governing taxation laws.
- Deferred tax liabilities are recognized for all taxable timing differences. Deferred tax assets are recognized only to the extent that there is reasonable certainty that sufficient future taxable income will be available against which such deferred tax assets can be realized. In situations where the Company has unabsorbed depreciation or carry forward tax losses, all deferred tax assets are recognized only if there is virtual certainty supported by convincing evidence that they can be realized against future taxable profits. In the situations where the Company is entitled to a tax holiday under the Income realized against future taxable profits. In the situations where the Company is entitled to a tax holiday under the Income Tax Act, 1961 enacted in India, no deferred

tax (asset or liability) is recognized in respect of timing differences which reverse during the tax holiday period, to the extent the Company's gross total income is subject to the deduction during the tax holiday period. Deferred tax in respect of timing differences which reverse after the tax holiday period is recognized in the year in which the timing differences originate.

- At each balance sheet date, the Company re-assesses recognized and unrecognized deferred tax assets. The Company writes-down the carrying amount of a deferred tax asset to the extent that it is no longer reasonably certain or virtually certain, as the case may be, that sufficient future taxable income will be available against which the deferred tax asset can be realized. Any such write-down is reversed to the extent that it becomes reasonably certain or virtually certain, as the case may be, that sufficient future taxable income will be available. The Company recognizes unrecognized deferred tax assets to the extent that it has become reasonably certain or virtually certain, as the case may be, that sufficient future taxable income will be available against which such deferred tax assets can be realized.
- Minimum Alternative tax (MAT) credit is recognized as an asset only when and to the extent there is convincing evidence that the Company will pay normal income tax during the specified period. In the year in which the MAT Credit becomes eligible to be recognized as an asset in accordance with the recommendations contained in guidance note issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India, the said asset is created by way of a credit to the statement of profit and loss and MAT Credit Entitlement. The Company reviews the MAT Credit Entitlement at each balance sheet date and writes down the carrying amount of the MAT Credit Entitlement to the extent there is no longer convincing evidence to the effect that Company will pay normal income tax during the specified period.

Earnings per share:

Basic earnings per equity share is computed by dividing the net profit or loss attributable to equity shareholders of the Company by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the financial year.

Diluted earnings per equity share is computed by dividing the net profit or loss attributable to equity shareholders of the Company by the weighted average number of equity shares considered for deriving basic earnings per equity share and also the weighted average number of equity shares that could have been issued upon conversion of all dilutive potential equity shares.

Provisions:

A provision is recognized when there exists a present obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. These estimates are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

Contingent liabilities:

A contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the Company or a present obligation that is not recognized because it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation. A contingent liability also arises in extremely rare cases where there is a liability that cannot be recognized because it cannot be measured reliably, the Company does not recognize a contingent liability but discloses its existence in the financial statements.

Cash and cash equivalent:

Cash and cash equivalents for the purposes of cash flow statement comprise cash at bank and in hand and short-term deposits with banks. For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents consists of cash and cash at Bank and Fixed Deposits.

NOTES to the Financial Statements

1 Significant Accounting Policies:

Basis of preparation:

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles in India (Indian GAAP). These financial statements have been prepared to comply in all material respects with the Accounting Standards notified by Companies (Accounting Standards) Rules, 2006, (as amended) and the relevant provisions of the Companies Act, 2013. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention on an accrual basis and going concern basis. The accounting policies have been consistently applied by the company are consistent with those used in the previous year.

Use of Estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the results of operations during the reporting period. Although these estimates are based upon management's best knowledge of current events and actions, actual results could differ from these estimates.

2. Tangible Fixed Assets:

Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses if any. Cost comprises the purchase price and directly attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use. Any trade discounts and rebates are deducted in arriving at the purchase price.

3. Intangible Fixed Assets:

Intangible assets are recognized when it is probable that the future economic benefits that are attributable to the asset will flow to the enterprise and the cost of the asset can be measured reliably.

4. Impairment of Assets:

- ▶ The carrying amounts of assets are reviewed at each balance sheet date if there is any indication of impairment based on internal / external factors. An impairment loss is recognized wherever the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the greater of the asset's net selling price and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and risks specific to the asset. Net selling price is the amount obtainable from the sale of an asset in an arm's length transaction between knowledgeable, willing parties, less the costs of disposal.
- ▶ After impairment, depreciation is provided on the revised carrying amount of the asset over its remaining useful life.

5. Depreciation and Amortization:

Depreciation on the fixed assets is provided under straight-line method as per the rates prescribed in Schedule XIV to the Companies Act, 1956 or at rates permissible under applicable local laws so as to charge off the cost of assets to the Statement of Profit and Loss over their estimated useful life, except on the following categories of assets:

- (i) Leasehold land and leasehold improvements are amortized over the primary period of lease.
- (ii) Intangible assets are amortized over their useful life of 5 years.

6. Share Capital:

Based upon the audit procedures performed and the information and explanations given by the management, during the Financial Year 2023-24, the company had obtained the shareholder's approval for Preferential issue and allotment of 76,60,000 Convertible Warrants into equity shares of face value of Rs. 10/- each to promoters and non-promoter(s) of company at a price determined in accordance with the provisions of SEBI (Issue of Capital and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2018 amounting to Rs. 46.50/-.

Pursuant to obtaining the necessary approvals and after due deliberation & in accordance with the Companies (Prospectus and Allotment of Securities) Rules, 2014 and other applicable laws & regulations, the Company approved the Allotment of 68,35,000 Convertible Warrants to promoters and non-promoters on preferential basis on 27th May 2024.

Subsequently, out of the subscribed 68,35,000 convertible warrants, the Company allotted 21,35,000 warrants to Non promoters on preferential basis on 14th August, 2024.

The Company was in receipt of the Allotment money aggregating to Rs. 9,97,72,500 from Non-Promoters and there was no circulation of funds or mere passing of book entries in this regard.

NOTES to the Financial Statements

Further, the Company obtained trading approval (w.e.f. 10.10.2024) from BSE for the afore 21,35,000 warrants (converted into equity shares) & the same were held in lock upto 15.05.2025.

During the year under review, the remaining balance i.e. 75% full payment was received against 46,07,000 warrants - 19,95,000 warrants were duly converted into Equity Shares on 26.10.2025 & 26,12,000 warrants were converted into Equity Shares on 06.11.2025 & subsequently the Equity Share Capital increased to Rs. 13,56,42,950/-

The Remaining 93,000 warrants subscribed to by Mr. Pramod Jain were forfeited. The subscription money received on the aforesaid 93,000 warrants amounting to Rs. 10,81,125/- have been transferred to General Reserve.

7. Investments:

- ▶ Investments, which are readily realizable and intended to be held for not more than one year from the date on which such investments are made, are classified as current investments. All other investments are classified as long-term investments.
- ▶ On initial recognition, all investments are measured at cost. The cost comprises the purchase price and directly attributable acquisition charges such as brokerage, fees and duties. If an investment is acquired, or partly acquired by the issue of shares or the other securities, the acquisition cost is the fair value of securities issued. If an investment is acquired in exchange for another asset, the acquisition is determined by reference to the fair value of the asset given up or by reference to the fair value of the investment acquired, whichever is more clearly evident.
- ▶ Current investments are carried at the lower of cost and fair value determined on an individual investment basis. Long-term investments are carried at cost. However, provision for diminution in value is made to recognize a decline other than temporary in the value of the long-term investments.
- ▶ On disposal of an investment, the difference between its carrying amount and net disposal proceeds is charged or credited to the statement of profit and loss.

8. Employee Benefits:

Employee benefits include provident fund, employee state insurance scheme, gratuity fund and Compensated absences.

9. Inventories:

Stock in trade, stores and spares are valued at the lower of the cost or net realizable value. Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less estimated costs of completion and estimated costs necessary to make the sale. Cost of stock in trade procured for specific projects is assigned by specific identification of individual costs of each item. Costs of stock in trade, that are interchangeable and not specific to any project is determined using the weighted average cost formula. Cost of stores and spare parts is determined using weighted average cost. The Valuation of Shares held at the year-end has been certified by the management and we have relied on the same for the valuation purpose.

10. Borrowing Costs:

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of an asset that necessarily takes a substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use or sale are capitalized as part of the cost of the respective asset. All other borrowing costs are expensed in the period they occur. Borrowing costs consist of interest, exchange differences arising from foreign currency borrowings to the extent they are regarded as an adjustment to the interest cost and other costs that an entity incurs in connection with the borrowing of funds.

11. Revenue Recognition:

Revenue from Operations

- Sale and operating income include sale of Shares and Interest Income on Loans and Advances, etc.
- Interest income is recognized on time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding and the rate applicable.
- Dividend income is recognized when right to receive is established.
- Fee and commission income include fees other than those that are an integral part of EIR. The Company recognizes the fee and commission income in accordance with the terms of the relevant contracts lagreement and when it is probable that the Company will collect the consideration.
- Income from Rent are recognized in the statement of profit and loss as per the contractual rentals unless another systematic basis is more representative of the time pattern in which benefits are derived from the Rented assets.
- Other Income represents income earned from the activities incidental to the business and is recognized when the right to receive the income is established as per the terms of the contract.

NOTES to the Financial Statements

12. Taxation:

Tax expense comprises current and deferred tax. Current income tax expense comprises taxes on income from operations in India and in foreign jurisdictions. Income tax payable in India is determined in accordance with the provisions of the Income Tax Act, 1961 and tax expense relating to overseas operations is determined in accordance with tax laws applicable in countries where such operations are domiciled.

- Deferred tax expense or benefit is recognized on timing differences being the difference between taxable income and accounting income that originate in one period and are capable of reversal in one or more subsequent periods.
- Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured using the tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date. Deferred income tax relating to items recognized directly in equity is recognized in equity and not in the statement of profit and loss. Deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities are offset, if a legally enforceable right exists to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities relate to the taxes on income levied by the same governing taxation laws.
- Deferred tax liabilities are recognized for all taxable timing differences. Deferred tax assets are recognized only to the extent that there is reasonable certainty that sufficient future taxable income will be available against which such deferred tax assets can be realized. In situations where the Company has unabsorbed depreciation or carry forward tax losses, all deferred tax assets are recognized only if there is virtual certainty supported by convincing evidence that they can be realized against future taxable profits. In the situations where the Company is entitled to a tax holiday under the Income realized against future taxable profits. In the situations where the Company is entitled to a tax holiday under the Income tax Act, 1961 enacted in India, no deferred tax (asset or liability) is recognized in respect of timing differences which reverse during the tax holiday period, to the extent the Company's gross total income is subject to the deduction during the tax holiday period. Deferred tax in respect of timing differences which reverse after the tax holiday period is recognized in the year in which the timing differences originate.
- At each balance sheet date, the Company re-assesses recognized and unrecognized deferred tax assets. The Company writes-down the carrying amount of a deferred tax asset to the extent that it is no longer reasonably certain or virtually certain, as the case may be, that sufficient future taxable income will be available against which the deferred tax asset can be realized. Any such write-down is reversed to the extent that it becomes reasonably certain or virtually certain, as the case may be, that sufficient future taxable income will be available. The Company recognizes unrecognized deferred tax assets to the extent that it has become reasonably certain or virtually certain, as the case may be, that sufficient future taxable income will be available against which such deferred tax assets can be realized.
- **Minimum Alternative tax (MAT) credit** is recognized as an asset only when and to the extent there is convincing evidence that the Company will pay normal income tax during the specified period. In the year in which the MAT Credit becomes eligible to be recognized as an asset in accordance with the recommendations contained in guidance note issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India, the said asset is created by way of a credit to the statement of profit and loss and shown as MAT Credit Entitlement. The Company reviews the MAT Credit Entitlement at each balance sheet date and writes down the carrying amount of the MAT Credit Entitlement to the extent there is no longer convincing evidence to the effect that Company will pay normal income tax during the specified period.

13. Earnings per share:

Basic earnings per share are calculated by dividing the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders by the weighted average number of the equity shares outstanding during the period. For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders and the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the year are adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares.

14. Fine and Penalties:

During the financial year no fines and Penalties were levied on the Company.

15. Provisions:

A provision is recognized when there exists a present obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. Provisions are not discounted to present value and are determined based on best estimates required to settle the obligation at the reporting date. These estimates are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

16. Contingent liabilities:

A contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the Company or a present obligation that is not recognized because it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation. A contingent liability also arises in extremely rare cases where there is a liability that cannot be recognized because it cannot be measured reliably, the Company does not recognize a contingent liability but discloses its existence in the financial statements.

17. Cash and cash equivalent:

Cash and cash equivalents for the purposes of cash flow statement comprise cash at bank and in hand and short-term deposits with banks with an original maturity of three months or less.
