1. The Explanatory Statement pursuant to Section 102 of the Companies Act, 2013 (the "Act"), setting out the material facts relating to the Special Business to be transacted at the Meeting, is annexed to this Notice.
2. Pursuant to the General Circular No. 03/2025 dated September 22, 2025, issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) and the Circulars issued from time to time by the SEBI (hereinafter collectively referred to as the "Circulars"), Companies are allowed to hold the Annual General Meeting ("AGM") through Video Conferencing ("VC")/Other Audio Visual Means ("OAVM"), without the physical presence of the members at a common venue. Hence, in compliance with the Circulars, the AGM of the Company will be held through VC/OAVM. The registered office of the Company shall be deemed to be the venue for the AGM.
3. Since this AGM is being held through VC/OAVM, pursuant to the Circulars, physical attendance of the Members has been dispensed with. Accordingly, the facility for appointment of proxies by the Members will not be available for the AGM. Hence the Proxy Form, Attendance Slip and Route Map are not annexed to this Notice.
4. Central Depository Services (India) Limited ("CDSL") will be providing facility for voting through remote e-voting, for participation in the 37th AGM through VC/OAVM facility and e-voting during the AGM.
5. In compliance with the aforesaid Circulars, Notice of the AGM along with the Annual Report is being sent only through electronic mode to those members whose email addresses are registered with the Company/Depositories. Members may note that the Notice of the AGM and Annual Report will also be available on the Company's website at www.zenithfibres.com, website of the Stock Exchange i.e. BSE Limited at www.bseindia.com and on the website of CDSL at www.evotingindia.com. Further, pursuant to Regulation 36 of the SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("SEBI Listing Regulations"), the Company shall send a letter to those shareholders who have not registered their email addresses, providing the web link, including the exact path, where the complete details of the Annual Report are available. A physical copy of the Notice along with the Annual Report shall be made available to any Member(s) who request the same in writing to the Company.
6. Members of the Company under the category of Institutional Investors/Corporate Members are encouraged to attend and vote at the AGM through VC. Institutional Investors/Corporate Members intending to authorize their representatives to participate and vote at the meeting are requested to send a certified copy of the Board Resolution/Authorization Letter to the Company at its registered email address to cs@zenithfibres.com or upload on the VC portal/e-voting portal.
7. Members attending the AGM through VC/OAVM shall be counted for the purpose of reckoning the quorum under Section 103 of the Act.
8. The details of the Director seeking appointment/re-appointment at the AGM as required under the applicable provisions of the SEBI Listing Regulations and Secretarial Standard on General Meetings ("SS-2") are provided in Annexure - A to this Notice.
9. The Company has fixed Tuesday, September 22, 2026, as the Cut-off Date for determining the eligibility of shareholders to vote through remote e-voting and e-voting during the meeting, for shareholders holding shares in physical or dematerialized form.
10. The Company has fixed Tuesday, September 22, 2026, as the Record Date, in connection with the AGM and for the purpose of determining eligibility for payment of dividend, if declared at the Meeting.

The dividend of Rs. 1/- per fully paid-up equity share of Rs. 10/- each, if declared by the Members at the AGM, will be paid subject to the deduction of income-tax at source ('TDS').
11. Please note that the SEBI has mandated that security holders holding securities in physical form, whose folio(s) do not have the prescribed KYC details, shall be eligible for dividend payments in respect of such folios only through electronic mode, with effect from April 01, 2024 and only upon furnishing all the required details. Accordingly, Members holding shares in physical form are requested to update the prescribed KYC details by completing the appropriate ISR forms with the Company's Registrar and Share Transfer Agent, Bigshare Services Pvt. Ltd. ("BSPL" or "RTA"), to ensure timely receipt of dividends.
12. Process for registration/updation, pertaining to the name, postal address, E-mail address, telephone/mobile numbers, Permanent Account Number (PAN), nominations, power of attorney, bank details such as name of the bank and branch details, bank account number, MICR code, IFSC code, etc.:
 - i) In case shares are held in physical mode, members are requested to submit their service requests in the formats prescribed under SEBI Master Circular for Registrars to an Issue and Share Transfer Agents bearing no. - ii) In case shares are held in demat mode, members are requested to update details with their respective Depository Participants.

13. As per the provisions of Section 125 of the Act read with Investor Education and Protection Fund Authority (Accounting, Audit, Transfer and Refund) Rules, 2016 ("IEPF Rules, 2016"), the amount of dividend remaining unpaid or unclaimed for a period of seven years from the date of transfer to Unpaid Dividend Account, shall be transferred to the Investor Education and Protection Fund ("IEPF"), a fund constituted by the Government of India under Section 125 of the Act.

Further, in accordance with the provisions of Section 124(6) of the Act and IEPF Rules, 2016, shares on which dividend has not been paid or claimed for seven consecutive years or more, are liable to be transferred to IEPF.

14. Members may kindly note that in accordance with SEBI Master Circular for Online Resolution of Disputes in the Indian Securities Market bearing no. SEBI/HO/OIAE/OIAE_IAD-3/P/CIR/2023/195 dated July 31, 2023 (as amended from time to time), the Company has registered on the SMART ODR Portal (Securities Market Approach for Resolution through Online Disputes Resolution Portal). SEBI has specified that a shareholder shall first take up his/her/their grievance with the listed entity by lodging a complaint directly with the concerned listed entity or its RTA and if the grievance is not redressed satisfactorily, the shareholder may, in accordance with the SCORES guidelines, escalate the same through the SCORES Portal in accordance with the process laid out therein. Only after exhausting all available options for resolution of the grievance, if the shareholder is not satisfied with the outcome, he/she/they can initiate dispute resolution through the SMART ODR Portal. This platform aims to enhance investor grievance resolution by providing access to Online Dispute Resolution Institutions for addressing complaints. Members may feel free to utilize this online conciliation and/or arbitration facility, as outlined in the circular, to resolve any outstanding disputes between Members and the Company (including RTA). 15. Members desirous of obtaining information/details about the Financial Statements, are requested to write to the Company at least one week before the meeting, so that proper information can be made available at the time of meeting. The Members desirous of inspection of documents may write to the Company through e-mail and the same shall be sent to them electronically.
16. Pursuant to SEBI Master Circular for Registrars to an Issue and Share Transfer Agents bearing no. HO/38/13/(4)2026-MIRSD-POD/I/4298/2026 dated February 06, 2026, the Company shall issue the securities in dematerialized form only while processing the service request(s) in the form(s) prescribed therein. These forms are available at https://www.bigshareonline.com/resources-sebi_circular.aspx#parentHorizontalTab3. It may be noted that the service request shall be processed only after the folio is KYC Compliant.
17. **CDSL e-Voting System - For e-Voting and Joining Virtual meetings:**
- As you are aware, the general meetings of the companies shall be conducted as per the guidelines issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) vide Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 08, 2020, Circular No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020 and Circular No. 20/2020 dated May 05, 2020, 22/2020 dated June 15, 2020, 33/2020 dated September 28, 2020, 39/2020 dated December 31, 2020, 10/2021 dated June 23, 2021, 20/2021 dated December 08, 2021, 03/2022 dated May 05, 2022, 11/2022 dated December 28, 2022, 09/2023 dated September 25, 2023, 09/2024 dated September 19, 2024 and General Circular No. 03/2025 dated September 22, 2025 ("MCA Circulars"). The forthcoming AGM will thus be held through video conferencing (VC) or other audio-visual means (OAVM). Hence, Members can attend and participate in the ensuing AGM through VC/OAVM.
 - Pursuant to the provisions of Section 108 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 (as amended) and Regulation 44 of SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations 2015 (as amended) and MCA Circulars dated April 08, 2020, April 13, 2020 and May 05,

2020, the Company is providing facility of remote e-voting to its members in respect of the business to be transacted at the AGM. For this purpose, the Company has entered into an agreement with Central Depository Services (India) Limited (CDSL) for facilitating voting through electronic means, as the authorized e-Voting agency. The facility of casting votes by a member using remote e-voting as well as the e-voting system on the date of the AGM will be provided by CDSL.

3. The Members can join the AGM in the VC/OAVM mode 15 minutes before and after the scheduled time of the commencement of the Meeting by following the procedure mentioned in the Notice. The facility of participation at the AGM through VC/OAVM will be made available to at least 1000 members on first come first served basis. This will not include large Shareholders (Shareholders holding 2% or more shareholding), Promoters, Institutional Investors, Directors, Key Managerial Personnel, the Chairpersons of the Audit Committee, Nomination and Remuneration Committee, Stakeholders Relationship Committee, Auditors etc. who are allowed to attend the AGM without restriction on account of first come first served basis.
4. The attendance of the Members attending the AGM through VC/OAVM will be counted for the purpose of ascertaining the quorum under Section 103 of the Companies Act, 2013.
5. Pursuant to MCA Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 08, 2020, the facility to appoint proxy to attend and cast vote for the members is not available for this AGM. However, in pursuance of Section 112 and 113 of the Companies Act, 2013, representatives of the members such as the President of India or the Governor of a State or body corporate can attend the AGM through VC/OAVM and cast their votes through e-Voting.
6. In line with the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) Circular No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020, the Notice calling the AGM has been uploaded on the website of the Company at www.zenithfibres.com. The Notice can also be accessed from the website of the Stock Exchange i.e. BSE Limited at www.bseindia.com. The AGM Notice is also disseminated on the website of CDSL (agency for providing the Remote e-Voting facility and e-voting system during the AGM) i.e. www.evotingindia.com.
7. The AGM has been convened through VC/OAVM in compliance with applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 read with various MCA Circulars as mentioned herein above.
8. In continuation to this Ministry's General Circular No. 20/2020 dated May 05, 2020, General Circular No. 02/2022 dated May 05, 2022 and General Circular No. 10/2022 dated December 28, 2022 and after due examination, it has been decided to allow companies whose AGMs are due in the Year 2026, to conduct their AGMs through VC or OAVM on or before September 30, 2026, in accordance with the requirements laid down in Para 3 and Para 4 of the General Circular No. 20/2020 dated May 05, 2020.

THE INTRUCTIONS OF SHAREHOLDERS FOR E-VOTING AND JOINING VIRTUAL MEETINGS ARE AS UNDER:

Step 1: Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.

Step 2: Access through CDSL e-Voting system in case of shareholders holding shares in physical mode and non-individual shareholders in demat mode.

- (i) The voting period begins on Saturday, September 26, 2026 at 9:00 a.m. (IST) and ends on Monday, September 28, 2026 at 5:00 p.m. (IST). During this period, shareholders of the Company holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the cut-off date (record date) i.e. Tuesday, September 22, 2026 may cast their vote electronically. The e-voting module shall be disabled by CDSL for voting thereafter.
- (ii) Shareholders who have already voted prior to the meeting date would not be entitled to vote at the meeting venue.
- (iii) Pursuant to SEBI Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated December 09, 2020, under Regulation 44 of Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, listed entities are required to provide remote e-voting facility to its shareholders, in respect of all shareholders' resolutions. However, it has been observed that the participation by the public non-institutional shareholders/retail shareholders is at a negligible level.

Currently, there are multiple e-voting service providers (ESPs) providing e-voting facility to listed entities in India. This necessitates registration on various ESPs and maintenance of multiple user IDs and passwords by the shareholders.

In order to increase the efficiency of the voting process, pursuant to a public consultation, it has been decided to enable e-voting to **all the demat account holders, by way of a single login credential, through their demat accounts/websites of Depositories/Depository Participants**. Demat account holders would be able to cast their vote without having to register again with the ESPs, thereby, not only facilitating seamless authentication but also enhancing ease and convenience of participating in e-voting process.

Step 1: Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.

- (iv) In terms of SEBI circular no. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated December 09, 2020 on e-Voting facility provided by Listed Companies, Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode are allowed to vote through their demat account maintained with Depositories and Depository Participants. Shareholders are advised to update their mobile number and email Id in their demat accounts in order to access e-Voting facility.

Pursuant to abovesaid SEBI Circular, **Login method for e-Voting and joining virtual meetings for Individual shareholders holding securities in Demat mode CDSL/NSDL is given below:**

Your directors have pleasure in presenting the 37th Annual Report of Zenith Fibres Limited on the business and operations of the Company along with the Audited Financial Statements for the Financial Year ended March 31, 2026.

01. Financial Highlights:

The financial performance of the Company for the year ended March 31, 2026 is summarized below:

The Company has prepared the Financial Statements in accordance with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 prescribed under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 (the "Act").

02. Operations Review:

During the year under review, the Company's revenue from operations stood at Rs. 4007.77 Lakhs as compared to Rs. 5219.70 Lakhs in the previous financial year, reflecting a decline of 23.22%.

Despite the decline in revenue, the Company recorded a significant improvement in profitability. Profit Before Tax (PBT) increased to Rs. 387.73 Lakhs from Rs. 239.71 Lakhs in the previous year, registering a growth of 61.75%. Profit After Tax (PAT) stood at Rs. 292.24 Lakhs as against Rs. 180.13 Lakhs in the preceding financial year, reflecting a growth of 62.24%.

During the year under review, the Company successfully commissioned a 300 KW rooftop solar power system at its manufacturing plant for captive consumption. The project reflects the Company's commitment towards sustainability, energy efficiency and the adoption of renewable energy sources.

With the commissioning of the rooftop solar power system, the Company's renewable energy portfolio now comprises both wind turbine and rooftop solar power. Revenue from renewable energy operations for the financial year ended March 31, 2026 stood at Rs. 154.86 Lakhs.

03. Dividend:

Considering the Financial Results and the overall performance of the Company during the year under review, as compared to the previous year, the Board of Directors is pleased to recommend a dividend of Rs. 1/- (10%) per equity share on 39,44,136 equity shares of the face value of Rs. 10/- each for the Financial Year 2025-26.

This dividend amounting to Rs. 39.44 Lakhs is payable after declaration by the Shareholders.

04. Transfer to Reserves:

The Board of Directors have decided to retain the entire amount of profit under Retained Earnings. Accordingly, your Company has not transferred any amount to General Reserves for the year ended March 31, 2026.

05. Management Discussion and Analysis Report:

Management Discussion and Analysis Report

1. Industry Structure and Development:

During the year under review, there was a decrease in the Company's top line on account of closure of one of the Company's leading customer's largest units based in USA due to unviability given the increase in US Import Tariffs. The domestic fibre products' margins remained steady despite increasing competition, the overall performance of the Company was satisfactory. The Company also noted an increase in expenses in employee benefit expenses and repairs to various old plant and machinery and Factory Building.

2. Opportunities and Threats:

Opportunities:

The Company has successfully developed some niche products and is working on commercializing the same with multiple potential customers globally. The company is also in the process of buying new machinery which shall definitely increase the Company's product portfolio and yield good volume sales in coming years.

Threats:

We face intense competition domestically and from Chinese suppliers due to which margins are getting eroded as well hit in volume offtake. This will continue in the years to come. Additionally, the Company's machinery is over three decades old and from time to time suffers breakdowns and the Company incurs exponential costs for repair and maintenance. Similarly, the factory building is quite old and requires substantial repairs.

Additionally, the Company's basic raw material - Polypropylene is a petroleum derivative product; derived from the processing of crude oil and therefore, its price is directly affected by increase/decrease in crude oil prices. The War in Middle East led to the sharpest increase in raw material prices in the last month of the Financial Year and also led to dip in product's demand.

Lastly, one of the key threats for the Company to sell and establish sales in the export market is the highly volatile freight costs, sudden surges in the same lead to drop in fibre offtake as it leads to products becoming unviable.

3. Segment wise Operational Performance:

The Company is engaged in the manufacturing of manmade fibres and in power generation through a wind turbine and rooftop solar power, classified as renewable energy, which supports its sustainability initiatives and captive energy requirements.

Renewable Energy:

Windmill

The Company's windmill continues to play a pivotal role in supporting the energy needs of its Fibre Division through captive consumption, significantly reducing dependency on conventional power sources and aligning with the Company's sustainability goals. Any surplus power generated beyond internal consumption is sold to the power grid in accordance with predefined commercial arrangements.

During the year under review, the windmill generated a total of 20,20,850 kWh, compared to 14,60,155 kWh generated in the previous year.

Rooftop Solar Power

During the year under review, the Company successfully commissioned a 300 KW rooftop solar power system at its manufacturing facility for captive consumption. This initiative reflects the Company's continued commitment towards sustainability, energy efficiency and the adoption of renewable energy sources.

The solar power generated is completely utilized within the Fibre Division for captive purposes, thereby reducing reliance on conventional energy and improving operational efficiency.

Revenue from Renewable Energy

Revenue from renewable energy operations for the financial year ended March 31, 2026 stood at Rs. 154.86 Lakhs.

The Company remains steadfast in its commitment to the efficient management and long-term sustainability of its renewable energy assets. This focus not only reinforces operational reliability but also supports the Company's broader environmental, social and governance (ESG) objectives.

4. Quality and Future Outlook:

The outlook for the Polypropylene Staple Fibre is encouraging yet challenging and extremely competitive globally. The Company is making great strides to develop niche products having good demand in the international market wherein substantial potential exists. The product quality of the Company is in consonance with international standards and all efforts are made to adhere to the same.

5. Risk and Concerns:

The Company is committed to manufacturing and deliver quality products strictly as per requirement of the customer. The constant feedback from customers is received and efforts are made for continuous improvement in process performance and product quality, wherever required. With established production base of almost three decades, the Company is in a position to maintain production and supply of quality products smoothly. This testifies to the fact that there are virtually nil rejections/returns of the Company's products. The Company has the benefit of its long-standing association with its customers and can match the prices suitably as per pricing policy as and when required. The Company has experienced some pressure on profit margins due to increase in operational costs, market competition and other industry related factors, given it is operating in a highly competitive industry with numerous organized and unorganized players both domestically and overseas, however, the Company is confident to tackle all such risks/concerns/threats. The Company is also maintaining healthy liquidity to meet any unforeseen exigencies.

6. Internal Control Systems and their adequacy:

The Company has appropriate Internal Control Systems for business processes, financial reporting & controls, compliance with applicable laws, regulations etc. The Company has appointed Statutory Auditors to evaluate Internal Control System. Regular internal audits and checks ensure that system and procedures are continuously improved. The Audit Committee reviews the adequacy and effectiveness of Internal Control Systems and suggests ways of further strengthening them from time to time.

7. Financial Performance:

The Financial performance with respect to operational performance are provided in the Board's Report.

8. Human Resources and Industrial Relations:

The Company has adequate and qualified human resources and enjoys cordial relations with its employees. Total number of employees were 76 (seventy-six) as on March 31, 2026. The Company continued to generally maintain harmonious and cordial relations with its workers in all its businesses.

Opinion

Notes Forming Part of Financial Statements

1. Corporate Information

Zenith Fibres Limited ("the Company"), having Corporate Identification Number (CIN) L40100MH1989PLC054580, is a public limited company incorporated and governed by the Companies Act, 2013 ("Act"). The Company's registered office is located at 311, Marol Co-operative Industrial Estate Limited, M.V. Road, Andheri (E), Mumbai - 400059.

The Company is engaged in the manufacturing of Manmade Fibres as well as green energy generation through its Wind Turbine and Solar Rooftop Plant. The equity shares of the Company are listed on the Bombay Stock Exchange of India.

2. Basis of Preparation and Measurement

2.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (hereinafter referred to as the 'Ind AS') as notified by Ministry of Corporate Affairs pursuant to Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 as amended from time to time.

These financial statements have been prepared on accrual and on going concern basis, under historical cost convention, except for certain class of assets and liabilities, defined benefit plans which are measured at fair values as required by relevant Ind AS.

Accounting policies have been consistently applied except where a newly-issued accounting standard is initially adopted or a revision to an existing accounting standard requires a change in the accounting policy hitherto in use.

The Board of Directors approved the financial statements of the Company for the year ended 31st March, 2026 and authorized for issue on 29th May, 2026.

2.2 Key Accounting estimates and judgements

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Ind AS requires the management to make estimates, judgments and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis and may change from period to period as the management becomes aware of changes in circumstances surrounding the estimates. Revisions in estimates are reflected in the financial statements in the period in which the changes are made and, if material, their effects are disclosed in the notes to the financial statements. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

Information about critical judgements in applying accounting policies, as well as estimates and assumptions that have the significant effect to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are included in the following notes:

2.3 Functional Currency

The functional currency of the company is the Indian Rupees (INR). These financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees in lakhs rounded to nearest digits, except when otherwise indicated.

2.4 Classification of current or non-current assets and liabilities

All assets and liabilities have been classified as current or non-current as per the Company's normal operating cycle and other criteria set out in the Schedule III (Division II) to the Companies Act, 2013. Based on the nature of products and the time between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realization in cash and cash equivalents, the Company has ascertained its operating cycle as 12 months for the purpose of current or non-current classification of assets and liabilities.

Current versus non-current classification:

The Company presents assets and liabilities in the balance sheet based on current/ non-current classification.

An asset is treated as current when it is:

- Expected to be realized or intended to be sold or consumed in normal operating cycle
- Held primarily for the purpose of trading
- Expected to be realized within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- Cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is current when it is:

- Expected to be settled in normal operating cycle
- Held primarily for the purpose of trading
- Due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- There is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

All other liabilities as non-current.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities, respectively.

2.5 Fair Value Measurement

The Company measures financial instruments, such as investments (other than equity investments in Associates) and derivatives at fair values at each Balance Sheet date.

Fair value is the price that would be received on sale of an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either in the principal market for the asset or liability, or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability. The principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible by the Company.

The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their economic best interest.

A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use.

The Company uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximizing the use of relevant observable inputs and minimizing the use of unobservable inputs.

All assets and liabilities (for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements) are categorized within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

Level - 1	Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.
Level - 2	Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is directly or indirectly observable.
Level - 3	Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable.

The cost of unquoted investments included in Level 3 of fair value hierarchy approximate their fair value because there is a wide range of possible fair value measurements and the cost represents estimate of fair value within that range.

For assets and liabilities, that are recognized in the financial statements on a recurring basis, the Company determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by re-assessing categorization (based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole) at the end of each reporting period.

The management determines the policies and procedures for both; recurring fair value measurement, such as derivative instruments and unquoted financial assets measured at fair value and for non-recurring measurement, such as assets held for disposal in discontinued operations.

3. Material Accounting Policies

3.1 Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Property, plant and equipment are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation (other than freehold land) and accumulated impairment losses, if any. Cost includes purchase price, borrowing cost and any other cost directly attributable to bringing the assets to its working condition for its intended use.

The cost of an item of Property, plant and equipment is recognized as an asset if, and only if, it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company in future periods and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. Expenditure incurred after the property, plant and equipment have been put into operations, such as repairs and maintenance expenses are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss during the period in which they are incurred.

Items such as spare parts, standby equipment and servicing equipment are recognized as property, plant and equipment when it is held for use in the production or supply of goods or services, or for administrative purpose and are expected to be used for more than one year.

An item of property, plant and equipment is de-recognized upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected to arise from the continued use of the assets. Any gain or loss arising on the disposal or retirement of an item of property plant and equipment, is determined as the difference between the sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

3.2 Depreciation and amortization

Depreciation has been provided as per straight-line method on pro rata basis from the date of such additions in the manner and at the rates specified in Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013 except that in case of expenditure on software. In the opinion of management useful life of fixed assets broadly corresponds to life as specified in schedule II of the Companies Act 2013 and the depreciation provided accordingly. Cost of software is amortized over 6 years considering its useful life.

The Company reviews the useful life and residual value of property, plant and equipment at the end of each reporting period. This reassessment may result in change in depreciation expense on a prospective basis.

3.3 Impairment of assets

Carrying amounts of fixed assets are reviewed at each Balance sheet date to ascertain whether there is any indication of impairment in their value caused by any internal / external factors. An impairment loss is recognized wherever the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount, recoverable amount being the greater of the assets' net selling price and value in use.

3.4 Intangible Assets

Intangible Assets are stated at cost of acquisition less accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment, if any. Amortization is done over their estimated useful life on straight line basis from the date that they are available for intended use, subjected to impairment test.

3.5 Amortization

Software, which is not an integral part of the related hardware is classified as an intangible asset and is amortized over the useful life of 6 years.

3.6 Investments and financial assets

a) Other investments and financial assets

i) Classification

The Company classifies its financial assets in the following measurement categories depending upon the Company's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual terms of the cash flows.

- those to be measured subsequently at fair value (either through other comprehensive income, or through profit or loss), and
- those measured at amortized cost.

For assets measured at fair value, gains and losses will either be recorded in profit or loss or other comprehensive income, as elected.

The Company reclassifies debt investments when and only when its business model for managing those assets changes.

ii) **Measurement**

At initial recognition, the Company measures a financial asset at its fair value including, in the case of 'a financial asset not at fair value through profit or loss', transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset. Transaction costs of financial assets carried at 'fair value through profit or loss' are expensed in the statement of profit or loss.

Debt instruments

Subsequent measurement of debt instruments depends on the Company's business model for managing the asset and the cash flow characteristics of the asset. There are two measurement categories into which the Company classifies its debt instruments:

Amortized cost: Assets that are held for collection of contractual cash flows where those cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest are measured at amortized cost e.g. Bonds. A gain or loss on a debt investment that is subsequently measured at amortized cost is recognized in profit or loss when the asset is derecognized or impaired. Interest income from these financial assets is included in investment income using the effective interest rate method.

Fair value through profit or loss: Assets that do not meet the criteria for amortized cost, are measured at fair value through profit or loss e.g. investments in mutual funds.

iii) **Impairment of financial assets**

The Company assesses on a forward looking basis the expected credit losses associated with its assets carried at amortized cost. The impairment methodology applied depends on whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk and if so, assess the need to provide for the same in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

iv) **Derecognition of financial assets**

A financial asset is derecognized only when Company has transferred the rights to receive cash flows from the financial asset. Where the entity has transferred an asset, the Company evaluates whether it has transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset. In such cases, the financial asset is derecognized.

3.7 Derivative financial instruments

The company holds derivative financial instruments such as foreign exchange forward contracts to mitigate the risk of changes in exchange rates on foreign currency exposures. The counterparty for these contracts is generally a bank.

These derivatives are measured at fair value through profit or loss and the resulting exchange gains or losses are included in other income. Assets/liabilities in this category are presented as current assets/current liabilities if they are either held for trading or are expected to be realized within 12 months after the Balance Sheet date.

3.8 Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Cost is computed on FIFO (First in, First Out) basis.

Cost of finished goods and work-in-progress include all costs of purchases, conversion costs and other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition.

The net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less the estimated costs of completion and estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

3.9 Revenue Recognition

Revenue from Operations:

The Company derives its revenue primarily from sale of Polypropylene Staple Fibre and P.P. Yarn. Revenue is recognised in accordance with Ind AS 115, which establishes a control-based model for revenue recognition and prescribes a five-step approach:

- Identification of the contract(s) with a customer;
- Identification of the performance obligations in the contract;

- Determination of the transaction price;
- Allocation of the transaction price to the performance obligations; and
- Recognition of revenue when or as the performance obligation is satisfied.

Revenue from contracts with customers is recognised when control of the goods or services are transferred to the customer at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the Company expects to be entitled in exchange for those goods or services. The Company has generally concluded that it acts as the principal in its revenue arrangements, as it typically controls the goods or services before transferring them to the customer.

Revenue is measured at the transaction price, which is the consideration, adjusted for volume discounts, price concessions and incentives that are ascertainable at the time of sale, and returns, if any, as specified in the contracts with the customers. Revenue excludes amounts collected on behalf of third parties.

Sale of Goods

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognized at the point in time when control of the goods is transferred to the customer, generally on delivery of the goods. On delivery of the goods, the customer obtains full discretion over the responsibility, manner of distribution, and pricing of the goods and assumes the associated risks and rewards, including risks related to obsolescence and loss.

A trade receivable is recognized by the Company when the goods are delivered as this represents the point in time at which the right to consideration becomes unconditional, as only the passage of time is required before payment is due. The normal credit period ranges from 0 to 45 days. The Company considers the effects of variable consideration, the existence of significant financing components, non-cash consideration and consideration payable to the customer including discounts and incentives (if any).

Variable consideration

Where contracts contain elements of variable consideration, the company estimates the amount of consideration to which it expects to be entitled in exchange for transferring the goods to the customer. The variable consideration is estimated at contract inception and is constrained until it is highly probable that a significant reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognized will not occur when the associated uncertainty with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved. The Company recognizes changes in the estimated amount of variable consideration in the period in which the change occurs.

Certain contracts for the sale of goods provide customers with rebates and pricing incentives which give rise to variable consideration. Rebates are adjusted against amounts receivable from the customer. To estimate the expected rebates, the Company applies the most likely amount method for contracts with a single-volume threshold and the expected value method for contracts with more than one volume threshold. The selected method that best predicts the amount of variable consideration is primarily driven by the number of volume thresholds contained in the contract. The Company then applies the requirements on constraining estimates of variable consideration and recognises a refund liability for the expected future rebates.

Contract balances

Trade receivables

A receivable represents the Company's unconditional right to consideration, where only the passage of time is required before payment becomes due.

Contract liabilities

A contract liability represents the obligation to transfer goods or services to a customer for which consideration has already been received or has become due from the customer. Contract liabilities are recognised as revenue when the related performance obligations are satisfied.

Cost to obtain or fulfil a contract

Costs to obtain a contract are generally expensed as incurred. Costs to fulfil a contract such as freight, insurance and other selling expenses are recognized as an expense in the same period in which the related revenue is recognised.

Critical judgments

The Company's contracts with customers include promises to transfer goods to the customers. The Company's contracts with customers may include fixed and variable components such as schemes, incentives and cash discounts. Significant judgement is required in determining the transaction price and estimating variable consideration. Variable consideration is

included in revenue only to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal in cumulative revenue recognised will not occur in future periods.

Estimates of rebates and discounts are sensitive to changes in circumstances and the Company's past experience regarding returns and rebate entitlements may not be representative of customers' actual returns and rebate entitlements in the future.

Revenue from sale of goods is disclosed Net of Goods and Service Tax, discounts, rebates and incentives ascertainable at the time of sale, and returns.

3.10 Other Income

Interest Income

Interest income from a financial asset is recognized when it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the amount of income can be measured reliably. Interest income is accrued on a time basis with reference to the principal outstanding and at the effective interest rate applicable.

Dividend Income

Dividend income from investments is recognized when the Company's right to receive payment is established.

3.11 Non-current assets held for sale

The Company classifies non-current assets as held for sale when their carrying amounts are expected to be recovered principally through a sale transaction rather than through continuing use. This condition is regarded as met only when the asset is available for immediate sale in its present condition subject only to terms that are usual and customary for sales of such asset; its sale is highly probable; and only if the management expects to complete the sale within one year from the date of classification.

3.12 Foreign currency transactions and translation

Transactions in currencies other than Company's functional currency (foreign currencies) are recorded at the rates of exchange prevailing on the date of transaction. At the end of the reporting period, monetary items denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated using the exchange rate prevailing as at reporting date. Exchange differences arising on the restatement and settlement of monetary items are recognised as income or expense in the year in which they arise.

Non-monetary items denominated in foreign currencies which are carried in terms of historical cost are reported using the exchange rate at the date of the transaction.

3.13 Employee Benefits

Short-Term Employee Benefits

Short-term employee benefits are recognized as an expense on accrual basis in the period in which the related services are rendered by employees. Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits that are expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the reporting period are recognised in respect of employee services rendered up to the reporting date and are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled. The liabilities are presented as current employee benefit obligations in the balance sheet.

Defined Contribution Plans

Contributions towards provident fund and employee state insurance schemes for eligible employees are made to the appropriate regulatory authorities in accordance with applicable laws and regulations.

These schemes are classified as defined contribution plans, as the Company's obligation is limited to the amount of contributions made on a periodic basis. The Company does not have any further obligation beyond such contributions.

Compensated Absences

Leave benefits are classified as defined benefit plans and are accounted for using the projected unit credit method, based on actuarial valuations carried out by independent actuaries at each balance sheet date. Actuarial gains and losses arising from experience adjustments and changes in actuarial assumptions are recognized in other comprehensive income in the year in which they arise. Other costs are accounted in statement of profit and loss.

Gratuity

The Company provides gratuity benefits to eligible employees under a defined benefit retirement plan ("Gratuity Plan") in accordance with applicable statutory provisions. The gratuity plan provides for a lump-sum payment to vested employees at retirement, incapacitation or death while in employment, or termination of employment, as per the provisions of the Code on

Social Security, 2020 or as per the Company Scheme, as applicable. Vesting occurs upon completion of contractual period of continuous years of service as defined in the Code on Social Security, 2020.

Liabilities with regard to the Gratuity Plan are determined by actuarial valuation, performed by an independent actuary, at each Balance Sheet date using the projected unit credit method. The Company contributes to a gratuity fund administered by the Life Insurance Corporation of India. Any shortfall between the plan assets managed by the fund and the actuarially determined present value of the obligation is recognised as a liability in the financial statements.

Actuarial gains and losses arising from experience adjustments and changes in actuarial assumptions recognized in other comprehensive income in the period in which they arise. Other costs are accounted in statement of profit and loss.

3.14 Borrowing Costs

Borrowing cost directly attributable to acquisition and construction of assets that necessarily takes substantial period of time are capitalised as part of the cost of such assets up to the date when such assets are ready for intended use or sale.

All other borrowing costs are expensed in the period in which they occur. Borrowing costs consist of interest and other costs that an entity incurs in connection with the borrowing of funds.

3.15 Taxation

Income tax expense comprises current tax expense and net change in the deferred tax asset or liability during the year. Current and deferred taxes are recognised in statement of profit and loss, except when they relate to items that are recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, in which case, the current and deferred tax are also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, respectively.

Current income tax

Current income tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities, based on the tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted as at the reporting date.

Management periodically evaluates positions taken in the tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulations are subject to interpretation and establishes provisions where appropriate.

Deferred tax

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognised for deductible and taxable temporary differences arising between the tax base of assets and liabilities and their carrying amount in the financial statements, except when the deferred income tax arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination, affects neither accounting nor taxable profit or loss at the time of the transaction.

Deferred tax assets are recognized to the extent it is probable that sufficient taxable profits will be available against which those deductible temporary difference can be utilized.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at the end of each reporting period and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow the benefits of all or part of such deferred tax assets to be utilized.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured using substantively enacted tax rates expected to apply to taxable income in the years in which the temporary differences are expected to be received or settled.

Uncertain Tax position:

Management periodically evaluates positions taken in the tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulations are subject to interpretation and establishes provisions where appropriate. The provision is estimated based on one of two methods, the expected value method (the sum of the probability weighted amounts in a range of possible outcomes) or the single most likely amount method, depending on which is expected to better predict the resolution of the uncertainty.

Presentation of current and deferred tax:

Current and deferred tax are recognized as income or an expense in the Statement of Profit and Loss, except when they relate to items that are recognized in Other Comprehensive Income or directly in equity.

The Company offsets tax assets and liabilities, where it has a legally enforceable right to set off the recognized amounts and where it intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

3.16 Earnings per share

Basic earnings per share is computed by dividing the net profit or loss for the year attributable to equity shareholders by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year.

Diluted earnings per share are computed by dividing profit after tax, adjusted for the effects of dividend, interest and other charges or income (net of any attributable taxes) relating to dilutive potential equity shares, by the weighted average number of equity shares considered for the computation of basic earnings per share, together with the weighted average number of equity shares that would have been issued on conversion of all dilutive potential equity shares.

3.17 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and cheques on hand, cash at banks, demand deposits from banks and short-term, highly liquid instruments that are readily convertible into cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Cash Flow Statements

The Statement of Cash Flows has been prepared under the "Indirect Method" as set out in the Indian Accounting Standard (Ind AS 7) - Statement of Cash Flows.

3.18 Segment Reporting

Identification of segments

An operating segment is a component of the Company that engages in business activities from which it earns revenues and incurs expenses, and whose operating results are regularly reviewed by the Chief Operating Decision Maker (CODM) for making decisions regarding resource allocation and performance assessment. Discrete financial information is available for such segments.

The Company's operating segments are organised and managed separately based on the nature of products and services provided, with each segment representing a distinct strategic business unit that offers different products and serves different markets.

Allocation of common costs

Common allocable costs are not significant and therefore are not allocated to individual segments.

Inter-segment transfers

Inter-segment revenue has been accounted for based on the transaction price agreed to between segments which is based on current market prices.

Unallocated items

Revenue, expenses, assets and liabilities that relate to the Company as a whole and not allocable to any specific segment on reasonable basis have been included under 'unallocated revenue / expenses / assets / liabilities'.

Segment Policies

The Company prepares its segment information in conformity with the accounting policies adopted for preparing and presenting the financial statements of the Company as a whole.

3.19 Leases

The Company's lease asset classes primarily consist of leases for land and buildings. The Company evaluates whether an arrangement qualifies as a lease as per the requirements of Ind AS 116. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a specified period of time in exchange for consideration. To assess whether a contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset, the Company assesses whether:

- i) the contract involves the use of an identified asset,
- ii) the Company has substantially all of the economic benefits from use of the asset through the period of the lease and
- iii) the Company has the right to direct the use of the asset.

At the date of commencement of the lease, the Company recognises a right-of-use asset ("ROU") and a corresponding lease liability for all lease arrangements in which it is a lessee, except for short term leases with a term of twelve months or less, and leases of low value assets. For these short term leases and leases of low value assets, lease payments are recognized as an operating expense on a straight line basis over the lease term.

The right-of-use assets are initially recognised at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or prior to the commencement date of the lease plus any initial direct costs incurred less any lease incentives received. They are subsequently measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, if any. Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis from the commencement date over the shorter of the lease term and useful life of the underlying asset.

The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the future lease payments discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease, where readily determinable, or, the incremental borrowing rate. The lease liability is subsequently remeasured by increasing the carrying amount to reflect interest on the lease liability and reducing the carrying amount to reflect the lease payments made. A lease liability is remeasured upon the occurrence of certain events such as a change in the lease term or a change in an index or rate used to determine lease payments. The remeasurement normally also adjusts the leased assets.

Lease liability and ROU asset have been presented separately in the Balance Sheet and lease payments have been classified as financing cash flows in the statement of cash flows.

3.20 Provisions and contingent liabilities

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event and it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the present obligation at the Balance Sheet date.

Contingencies

Contingent liabilities are disclosed when there is a possible obligation arising from past events, the existence of which will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Company or a present obligation that arises from past events where it is either not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation or a reliable estimate of the amount cannot be made. Contingent assets are neither recognised nor disclosed in the financial statements.

3.21 Recent accounting pronouncements

Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") notifies new standards or amendments to the existing standards under Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules as issued from time to time.

In May 2025, MCA notified amendments to Ind AS 21 – The Effects of Changes in Foreign Exchange Rates, applicable w.e.f. April 1, 2025. The Company has reviewed the amendment and based on its evaluation has determined that it does not have any significant impact in its financial statements.

In August 2025, MCA notified the following amendments to:

1. Ind AS 1, Presentation of Financial Statements, applicable w.e.f April 1, 2025 - The amendment relates to classification of liabilities as current or non-current and non-current liabilities with covenants. In the context of classifying a liability as current, it removes the requirement of existence of a right to defer settlement for at least 12 months after the reporting date, and instead requires that the said right should exist on the reporting date and have substance. The amendment also introduces guidance on classification of liabilities with covenants. The Company has no impact of these amendments in its classification criteria of current and non-current liabilities.
2. Ind AS 7, Statement of Cash Flows and Ind AS 107, Financial Instruments - Disclosures, applicable w.e.f April 1, 2025 - The amendment in Ind AS 7 requires to inform users of financial statements of the existence of supplier finance arrangements and explain the nature of the arrangements, the carrying amount of liabilities and the range of payment due dates. Ind AS 107 has been amended to add supplier finance arrangements as a factor that may cause concentration of liquidity risk. The Company has reviewed the amendment and based on its evaluation has determined that it does not have any significant impact in its financial statements.

Claims against the Company not acknowledged as debts:

Pursuant to GST proceedings relating to the period from 01 July 2017 to 31 March 2023, the Commissioner of CGST, Vadodara vide Order dated 11th November, 2025 confirmed a demand of Rs. 14.78 lakhs plus applicable interest and penalty.

Based on legal advice received, the Company has filed an appeal before the Appellate Authority on 10th February, 2026 under the provisions of the CGST Act, 2017 challenging the said order. The appeal is presently pending hearing and final adjudication.

The management believes that the Company has a strong case on merits and law, and that the appeal would be allowed. Consequently, it does not expect the aforesaid demand to crystallize into a liability thereby no provision has been made in the financial statements in respect of the aforesaid matter.

35.1.2 Contingent Assets

Insurance Claim

The Company's Wind Turbine Generator suffered a breakdown on 13th September, 2024. The same was subsequently repaired/refurbished and the WTG operations were restored w.e.f. 1st March, 2025. The Company had taken MBD policy cover against such potential expenses/losses and accordingly filed a claim with the insurance company in relation to the expenses incurred i.e. for an amount of Rs.185 lakhs. However, the claim was rejected by the insurance company.

The Company has obtained legal advice regarding the rejection of its claim by the insurance company. Based on such advice, the Company intends to take appropriate steps to institute legal proceedings seeking relief in the nature of *inter alia* payment of the amount of Rs. 185 lakhs together with applicable interest and costs from the insurance company. However, as the recovery of such amount is not virtually certain as of the reporting date, no asset has been recognized in the financial statements.

COMMITMENTS

Capital commitments

The company has contractually committed (net of advances) Rs. 45.86 lakhs as at 31st March, 2026 and Rs. NIL as at 31st March, 2025 for purchase of property, plant and equipment.

35.1.3 Accrued Expenses

Accrued expenses represent obligations in respect of services received and expenses incurred up to the reporting date, for which invoices from vendors/service providers are pending receipt and/or payment is pending as at the reporting date. Such expenses have been recognized based on contractual terms, management estimates, and other available supporting documents in accordance with the accrual basis of accounting.

35.1.4 Proposed Dividend

The Board of Directors in their meeting held on May 29, 2026 recommended dividend of Rs. 1.00 at the rate of 10% (Previous year: Rs. 1.00 at the rate of 10%) per equity share for the financial year ended 31st March, 2026. This payment is subject to the approval of shareholders in the Annual General Meeting (AGM) of the company and approved would result in a net cash outflow of approximately Rs. 39.44 lakhs (Previous year: Rs. 39.44 lakhs).

35.6 Financial Risk Management

The Financial risk management is practices and procedures that a Company uses to optimize the amount of risk it handles with financial interest. The Risk management is done to identify how risks associated with the Company will be identified, analyzed, and managed. It outlines how risk management activities will be performed, recorded, and monitored by the Company. The basic objective of risk management plan is to implement an integrated risk management approach to ensure all significant areas of risks are identified, understood and effectively managed, to promote a shared vision of risk management and encourage discussion on risks at all levels of the organization to provide a clear understanding of risk/benefit trade-offs, to deploy appropriate risk management methodologies and tools for use in identifying, assessing, managing and reporting on risks.

Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk of financial loss arising from counterparty failure to repay or service debt according to the contractual terms or obligations. Credit risk encompasses of both, the direct risk of default and the risk of deterioration of credit worthiness as well as concentration of risks. Credit risk is controlled by analyzing credit limits and credit worthiness of customers on a continuous basis to whom the credit has been granted after obtaining necessary approvals for credit. Financial instruments that are subject to concentrations of credit risk principally consist of trade receivables, loans, investments, derivative financial instruments, cash and cash equivalents, bank deposits and other financial assets.

Inter-corporate deposits are primarily with financial institutions having high credit-rating assigned by credit-rating agencies and short-term loans to companies also with sound ratings. Bank deposits are held with different banks.

The other exposure to the credit risk at the reporting date is primarily from trade receivables. Trade receivables are typically unsecured. Credit risk has always been managed by the Company through credit approvals, establishing credit limits and continuously monitoring the credit worthiness of the customers to which the Company grants credit terms in the normal course of business. Credit is normally extended to very limited number of domestic customers having dealings of over two decades with the company and huge conglomerates in the international market.

The Company's credit period generally ranges from 0-45 days. Counterparty credit limits are reviewed by the Company's Directors handling operations. The limits are set to minimize the concentration of risks and therefore mitigate financial loss through counterparty's potential failure to make payments or repay the deposits.

Commodity risk

The company is partly impacted by the price volatility of commodities towards contracts already entered into and delivery is pending. Company manufacture PP (Polypropylene) Fibre for which PP (Polypropylene) Resin is the key raw material for its manufacture. Due to significant volatility of the price of PP (Polypropylene) Resin, the company has developed and enacted risk management strategy of procuring the materials from domestic market as well as international market. Generally, the company has pending deliveries of up to one month. The company has also entered into MOU with the designated vendor for supply of materials to mitigate commodity price risk.

Notes Forming Part of Financial Statements

As PP resin is a derivative of crude oil, it remains highly sensitive to fluctuations in global crude oil prices. The ongoing conflict in the Middle East has resulted in one of the sharpest increases in PP prices witnessed in recent years. While the Company has, for the time being, been able to pass on the increased raw material costs to customers, however, if prices remain elevated for an extended period, there could be a temporary moderation in demand until the market conditions stabilize and pricing levels normalize.

Market Risk

PP (Polypropylene) Fibre is used primarily in India for three applications - in the manufacture of Filter Fabrics used for almost all kinds of liquid filtration, in the manufacture of automotive and exhibition carpets and for the construction and geo-textile sector.

Due to its inherent properties, PP fibre is the primary requirement for the filtration application and is more or less irreplaceable by any other synthetic fibre. Additionally, as long as automotive vehicles will be produced and as long as marriages and exhibitions will take place, there will always be the requirement of carpets thought their quantitative requirements will always fluctuate depending upon various market criterion. There is varied demand for PP Fibre in the construction and geo-textile sector. Depending upon technical requirements, PP Fibre is applied but wherever the specifications are not very stringent, some other synthetic fibres are also used.

The Company has experienced some pressure on profit margins due to increase in operational costs, market competition and other industry related factors given it is operating in a highly competitive industry with numerous organized and unorganized players both domestically and overseas. However, given the Company has a long-established brand, trust with customers in varied applications and its reputable excellent product quality and timely customer services; it shall utilize these strategies to enhance its position in the market. The Company is also focusing on diversifying its product-range into additional niche products and also simultaneously increase its customer base so as to not only introduce value-added products in its product-basket but reduce dependency from its current long standing customer base.

Foreign Currency Exchange Rate Risk

The Company's exposure to the risk of changes in foreign exchange rates relates primarily to the trade receivables and derivative assets/liabilities. The risks primarily relate to fluctuations in US Dollar against the functional currencies of the Company.

Reasons for major variations in ratios as compared to previous year:

- Marginal variation in current ratio is due to higher deployment of funds into long-term investments and fixed deposits as compared to last year.
- Variation in debt service coverage ratio is mainly due to increase in net profit before tax and lower debt obligations.
- Variation in return on equity ratio is mainly due to increase in net profit after tax.
- Variation in inventory turnover ratio is mainly due to better inventory management and operational efficiency resulting in faster inventory rotation.
- Variation in trade receivable turnover ratio is primarily due to a decrease in revenue from operations, while the reduction in trade receivables was not proportionate to the decline in sales.
- Variation in trade payables turnover ratio is attributable to faster settlement of trade payables during the year and changes in vendor credit cycle management.
- Variation in net capital turnover due to a decrease in sales, which was not accompanied by a proportionate decline in average working capital.
- The variation in Net Profit Ratio is primarily driven by higher other income during the year.
- Variation in return on capital employed is mainly due to increase in profit before tax and financial cost while the capital employed has increased on account of retained profit.
- Variation on return on investments ratio is mainly due to increase in income from investment funds.
