The Board of Directors hereby submits the report of the business and operations of Shish Industries Limited ("the Company"), along with the audited financial statements, for the financial year ended March 31, 2026.

Shish Industries Limited, founded in 2012, has emerged as one of India's fastest-growing industrial solution providers — recognized for engineering world-class industrial packaging and building envelope systems that meet the demanding needs of global and domestic markets.

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

On Standalone Basis

During the year under review, the revenue from operation of the Company was stood at INR 12,326.12 Lakh as against that of INR 11,778.82 Lakh for previous year. Revenue from operation of the Company was increased by 4.65% over previous year.

Profit before Tax for the financial year 2025-26 stood at INR 1,228.70 Lakh as against that of INR 1,467.66 Lakh making the net profit of INR 875.94 Lakh for the financial year 2025-26 as against the net profit of INR 1,095.21 Lakh for the financial year 2024-25.

During the year under review, the export sales of the Company were decreased by 10.01%, whereas domestic sales of the Company were increased by 20.96% than that of respective for previous year.

On Consolidated Basis

The consolidated revenue from operation of the Company for financial year 2025-26 stood at INR 13,439.12 Lakh as against that of INR 11,625.12 Lakh for previous year. The consolidated net profit after tax (after adjustment of minority interest) for the financial year 2025-26 was stood at INR 726.64 Lakh as compared to INR 874.03 Lakh for the previous financial year 2024-25.

Despite increase of 15.60% in consolidated revenue from operation for the FY 2025-26, the Company has reported decrease of 16.86% in consolidated net profit after tax as compared to the previous financial year 2024-25. The decrease in profit after tax was due to increase in raw material costs.

Headquartered in Surat, Gujarat, and publicly listed on the Bombay Stock Exchange, Shish Industries has built a reputation for innovation, quality excellence, and sustainability leadership.

Our state-of-the-art 400,000 sq. ft. manufacturing facility in Surat features cutting-edge extrusion lines, co-extrusion lamination, custom fabrication, assembly plants, and R&D innovation labs, giving us unmatched control over product quality, speed of execution, and product development.

Backed by patented technologies, global certifications, and a growing international footprint (including a fully-owned U.S. subsidiary), Shish Industries Limited is poised to set new benchmarks in industrial progress.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The audited financial statements of the Company drawn up both on standalone and consolidated basis, for the financial year ended March 31, 2026, in accordance with the requirements of the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 ("Ind AS") notified under Section 133 of the Act, read with relevant rules and other accounting principles. The Consolidated Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with Ind AS and relevant provisions of the Act based on the financial statements received from subsidiaries, as approved by their respective Board of Directors.

DIVIDEND

With a view to conserve and save the resources for future prospect of the Company, your directors regret to declare dividend for the financial year 2025-26 (Previous Year Nil).

TRANSFER TO GENERAL RESERVE

Your Directors do not propose to transfer any amount to the General Reserves. Full amount of net profit is carried to reserve & Surplus account of the Company.

ACQUISITION

On June 25, 2025, the Company acquired 65000 equity shares of face value INR 10.00 each aggregating to INR 6.50 Lakh in Shish Advanced Composites Private Limited (SACPL). SACPL is engaged in the design, development, manufacture, trading, import and export of advanced composite materials, components, assemblies, tooling, and related products using carbon fiber, glass fiber, aramid, hybrid prepregs, adhesives, honeycomb, foam, epoxy, polyurethane, and other advanced material technologies. Post the acquisition, the Company's equity stake in SACPL is 65.00%, making it a subsidiary of the Company.

CHANGE IN NATURE OF BUSINESS

During the year, your Company has not changed its business or object and continues to be in the same line of business as per the main object of the Company.

SHARE CAPITAL

During the year under review, following changes were carried out in the authorized and paid-up share capital of the Company:

Authorized Capital

During the year under review, vide Special Resolutions passed by the Members of the Company at the Extra ordinary General meeting held on January 22, 2026, the authorized share capital of the Company had been subdivided from INR 4,000.00 Lakh divided into 400000000 Equity Shares of INR 1.00/- each to INR 5,300.00 Lakh divided into 530000000 Equity Shares of INR 1.00/- each.

The Authorized share Capital of the Company, as at closure of financial year 2025-26, was INR 5,300.00 Lakh divided into 530000000 Equity Shares of INR 1.00/- each.

Constitution of Board

The Company has a balanced board with optimum combination of Executive and Non-Executive Directors, including Independent Directors, which plays a crucial role in Board processes and provides independent judgment on issues of strategy and performance. As on March 31, 2026, board comprises of 6 (Six) Directors out of which 2 (Two) Directors are Promoter Executive Directors, 1 (One) Director is Promoter - Non-Executive - Non-Independent Director and remaining 3 (Three) are Non-Promoter Non-Executive Independent Directors.

Disclosure by Directors

The Directors on the Board have submitted notice of interest under Section 184(1) i.e. in Form MBP 1, intimation under Section 164(2) i.e. in Form DIR 8 and declaration as to compliance with the Code of Conduct of the Company. None of the Directors of the Company is disqualified for being appointed as Director as specified in Section 164 (2) of the Companies Act, 2013.

Board Meeting

Regular meetings of the Board are held, inter-alia, to review the financial results of the Company. Additional Board meetings are convened, as and when required, to discuss and decide on various business policies, strategies and other businesses. The Board meetings are generally held at registered office of the Company.

During the year under review, Board of Directors of the Company met 14 (Fourteen) times, viz May 5, 2025, June 6, 2025, June 17, 2025, August 12, 2025, September 5, 2025, November 9, 2025, November 10, 2025, November 14, 2025, December 22, 2025, January 6, 2026, January 30, 2026, February 12, 2026, February 26, 2026 and March 5, 2026.

The details of attendance of each Director at the Board Meetings and Annual General Meeting are given in the Report on Corporate Governance.

Independent Directors

In terms of Section 149 of the Companies Act, 2013 and rules made there under and Listing Regulations, the Company has three Non-Promoter Non-Executive Independent Directors. In the opinion of the Board of Directors, all three Independent Directors of the Company meet all the criteria mandated by Section 149 of the Companies Act, 2013 and rules made there under and Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 and they are Independent of Management.

A separate meeting of Independent Directors was held on March 5, 2026 to review the performance of Non-Independent Directors and Board as whole and performance of Chairperson of the Company including assessment of quality, quantity and timeliness of flow of information between Company management and Board that is necessary for the board of directors to effectively and reasonably perform their duties.

The Company has received a declaration from the Independent Directors of the Company under Section 149(7) of Companies Act, 2013 and 16(1)(b) of Listing Regulations confirming that they meet criteria of Independence as per relevant provisions of Companies Act, 2013 for financial year 2026-27. The Board of Directors of the Company has taken on record the said declarations and confirmation as submitted by the Independent Directors after undertaking due assessment of the veracity of the same. In the opinion of the Board, they fulfill the conditions for Independent Directors and are independent of the Management. In the opinion of the Board, the Independent Directors possess the requisite expertise and experience and are persons of high integrity and repute. All the Independent Directors have confirmed that they are in compliance with Rules 6(1) and 6(2) of the Companies (Appointment and Qualification of Directors) Rules, 2014, with respect to registration with the data bank of Independent Directors maintained by the Indian Institute of Corporate Affairs. During the year under review, Mr. Nareshkumar Parshottambhai Lakhani (DIN: 09023300) had been reappointed as Non-Promoter Non-Executive Independent Director w.e.f. January 8, 2026 for a second term of 5 (five) consecutive years vide Special resolution passed through Postal ballot by the Members of the Company on March 16, 2026 through Video Conferencing ("VC") / Other Audio-Visual Means ("OAVM"). In the opinion of the Board, Mr. Nareshkumar Parshottambhai Lakhani (DIN: 09023300) is a person of integrity, possess relevant expertise/experience and fulfills the conditions of his reappointment as an Independent Director as specified in the Act, Rules made thereunder and the SEBI Listing Regulations.

Ms. Shital Tamakuwala (DIN: 11013824) had been appointed as Women - Non- Executive Independent Director of the Company with effect from March 21, 2025 as approved by the members of the Company vide Special Resolutions passed on May 3, 2025 through postal ballot. The board is of the opinion that Ms. Shital Tamakuwala (DIN: 11013824), is independent of the management and that she also possesses appropriate skills, expertise and competencies in the context of the Company's businesses, particularly in the areas of technology and marketing.

Information on Directorate

In accordance with the provisions of the Articles of Association and Section 152 of the Companies Act, 2013, Mr. Satishkumar Dayabhai Maniya (DIN 02529191), Chairman and Managing Director of the Company retires by rotation at the ensuing annual general meeting. He, being eligible, has offered himself for re-appointment as such and seeks re-appointment. The Board of Directors recommends his appointment on the Board.

The relevant details, as required under Regulation 36 (3) of SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("SEBI Listing Regulations") and Secretarial Standards-II issued by ICSI, of the person seeking re-appointment as Director is annexed to the Notice convening the Ninth annual general meeting.

Key Managerial Personnel

In accordance with Section 203 of the Companies Act, 2013, during the year under review, the Company had already appointed Mr. Satishkumar Maniya as Chairman and Managing Director of the Company, Mr. Nishit Rameshbhai Lakhani as Chief Financial Officer of the Company (till 06-06-2025) and Ms. Suman Mohanlal Jat as Company Secretary and Compliance Officer of the Company.

However, Mr. Nishit Rameshbhai Lakhani has resigned from the post of Chief financial officer of the Company with effect from June 07, 2025.

As on date of this report, the Company has Mr. Satishkumar Maniya as Chairman and Managing Director and Ms. Suman Mohanlal Jat as Company Secretary and Compliance Officer who are acting as Key Managerial Personnel in accordance with Section 203 of the Companies Act, 2013.

Performance Evaluation

The Board of Directors has carried out an annual evaluation of its own performance, board committees and individual directors pursuant to the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 in the following manners;

- The board and the nomination and remuneration committee reviewed the performance of the individual directors on the basis of the criteria such as the contribution of the individual director to the board and committee meetings like preparedness on the issues to be discussed, meaningful and constructive contribution and inputs in meetings, etc.
- In addition, the performance of chairperson was also evaluated on the key aspects of his role.

Separate meeting of independent directors was held to evaluate the performance of non-independent directors, performance of the board as a whole and performance of the chairperson, considering the views of executive directors and non-executive directors. Performance evaluation of independent directors was done by the entire board, excluding the independent director being evaluated.

Recommendations of Audit Committee, wherever/whenever given, have been accepted by the Board of Directors.

Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) Committee

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

GLOBAL ECONOMIC AND BUSINESS ENVIRONMENT

The global economic environment during FY 2025-26 remained characterised by resilience in economic activity alongside heightened uncertainty arising from geopolitical developments, changing trade policies, commodity-price movements and continuing adjustments in global supply chains. For manufacturing companies, these factors influenced procurement costs, production economics, freight rates, inventory planning and customer ordering patterns. The global operating environment consequently remained one in which businesses continued to focus on efficiency, supply-chain resilience, cost optimisation and diversification of sourcing and manufacturing bases.

International merchandise trade remained an important driver of industrial activity. According to the World Trade Organization, world merchandise trade volume increased by approximately 4.6% during 2025. However, the WTO's March 2026 outlook indicated that the pace of growth could moderate to approximately 1.9% in 2026 under its baseline scenario, before recovering to 2.6% in 2027. The outlook also highlights the sensitivity of international trade to energy-price shocks and geopolitical developments. For manufacturers of industrial packaging and cargo-protection products, the continuing expansion of international trade provides an underlying demand opportunity, while the expected moderation in trade growth reinforces the importance of cost competitiveness, product differentiation and geographical diversification.

The evolution of global supply chains is also changing the nature of packaging demand. Manufacturers and logistics operators increasingly require packaging systems that can protect goods during longer and more complex transportation cycles while optimising storage and freight utilisation. This has supported demand for bulk packaging, protective packaging, dunnage systems and reusable material-handling products. At the same time, customers are increasingly evaluating packaging on the basis of lifecycle economics, durability, material efficiency and environmental considerations rather than acquisition price alone.

INDIAN ECONOMIC ENVIRONMENT

India continued to provide a relatively favourable domestic operating environment during FY 2025-26, supported by domestic consumption, manufacturing activity, infrastructure investment and increasing formalisation of logistics and supply chains. India's economic expansion is particularly relevant to manufacturers of industrial packaging because demand for packaging and material-handling products is closely linked to manufacturing volumes, movement of raw materials and finished goods, agricultural output, construction activity and organised logistics.

The packaging sector has emerged as an important component of India's broader manufacturing ecosystem. According to a March 2026 report by Avendus Capital, India's packaging industry is expected to grow at approximately 9% CAGR over the five years to FY2030 and reach approximately US\$92 billion. The report attributes this growth to consumption-led expansion and demand from food and beverages, pharmaceuticals, personal care, agriculture, consumer durables and e-commerce, together with increasing penetration of organised retail and quick commerce.

The implications extend beyond consumer packaging. Growth in manufacturing and consumption generates secondary demand for industrial packaging, protective packaging, palletisation, bulk material handling and transportation solutions. Consequently, the expansion of India's manufacturing and logistics ecosystem provides a favourable structural backdrop for companies operating across industrial packaging and related material-handling applications.

INDUSTRIAL AND FLEXIBLE PACKAGING INDUSTRY

Industrial packaging performs a fundamentally different role from conventional consumer packaging. It is required to protect raw materials, components and finished products throughout manufacturing, storage and transportation. The increasing scale and geographical complexity of supply chains has consequently increased the importance of packaging systems capable of protecting products against mechanical damage, contamination, moisture, movement and handling-related risks.

A significant trend within industrial packaging is the movement towards lightweight, reusable and application-specific solutions. Customers increasingly seek packaging that can reduce product damage, optimise storage and transportation, facilitate handling and, where commercially feasible, be reused across multiple logistics cycles. These requirements have created opportunities for polymer-based packaging solutions, particularly where durability, moisture resistance and flexibility are important.

The Indian market is particularly well placed to benefit from these trends because manufacturing activity is expanding while logistics infrastructure is becoming increasingly organised. The National Logistics Policy provides an overarching framework aimed at improving the efficiency of India's logistics ecosystem, reducing inefficiencies and improving the competitiveness of Indian goods. The Government has also been developing Multi-Modal Logistics Parks, with 35 locations approved as of April 2025, with the objective of improving logistics efficiency and reducing logistics costs.

The formalisation and modernisation of logistics therefore creates a supportive environment for industrial packaging manufacturers. As supply chains become more integrated and cargo moves through multiple transportation modes, the importance of standardised, durable and efficient packaging and cargo-protection solutions is expected to increase.

FIBC / FLEXIBLE INTERMEDIATE BULK CONTAINERS

Flexible Intermediate Bulk Containers, commonly referred to as FIBCs, bulk bags or jumbo bags, constitute an important segment of industrial packaging. These containers are generally manufactured from woven polypropylene and are used for the storage and transportation of dry and flowable materials such as chemicals, agricultural commodities, food products, construction materials, minerals and pharmaceutical ingredients.

Independent market research indicates that the global FIBC industry is expected to maintain a sustained growth trajectory. Grand View Research estimates that the global FIBC market could reach approximately US\$9.69 billion by 2033, representing a CAGR of approximately 6.2% between 2025 and 2033. The principal demand drivers identified include growth in food and pharmaceutical industries and the need to reduce the weight and handling costs associated with bulk packaging.

The underlying economics of FIBC products are particularly relevant to industrial supply chains. Their ability to handle relatively large quantities of material while occupying comparatively limited storage space can improve handling and transportation efficiency. Their use across multiple industries also provides a degree of diversification to the overall market.

For Indian manufacturers, the opportunity is supported by India's manufacturing, agriculture, chemicals, construction and export ecosystems. However, the FIBC industry is competitive and customers generally place significant emphasis on product specifications, load-bearing capability, consistency, certification, safety and delivery reliability. Consequently, sustainable competitiveness is likely to depend not only on manufacturing volumes but also on quality, customisation, process control and customer relationships.

POLYPROPYLENE CORRUGATED SHEETS AND REUSABLE INDUSTRIAL PACKAGING

Polypropylene corrugated sheets occupy a specialised position within industrial packaging because they combine relatively low weight with durability, moisture resistance and fabrication flexibility. Such characteristics make them suitable for applications where packaging is expected to withstand repeated handling or where protection against moisture and physical damage is required.

The market opportunity for polypropylene-based corrugated packaging is supported by the broader movement towards lightweight and reusable packaging solutions. Independent market research indicates that the global polypropylene corrugated packaging market is expected to record sustained growth during the coming decade, driven by increasing use across industrial, automotive, agriculture, logistics and other applications.

The broader packaging industry is also experiencing a shift towards solutions that provide greater material efficiency and lifecycle value. Reusable packaging can, depending on application and utilisation rates, reduce the need for repeated consumption of single-use packaging materials. This consideration is particularly relevant in closed-loop industrial supply chains where packaging can be returned and reused.

For India, growth in automotive manufacturing, engineering, warehousing, e-commerce fulfilment and organised logistics provides potential demand across several application areas. The ability to manufacture customised sheets and fabricate them into application-specific packaging can also enable suppliers to address customer requirements beyond standard sheet products.

DUNNAGE AND PROTECTIVE PACKAGING

The growth of global supply chains has increased the importance of protective packaging capable of minimising movement and damage during transportation. Dunnage packaging is used to secure products within transportation units and to protect individual components against impact, vibration and movement.

According to Grand View Research, the global dunnage packaging market was valued at approximately US\$4.0 billion in 2024 and is projected to reach approximately US\$5.8 billion by 2030, representing a CAGR of approximately 6.2% between 2025 and 2030. Asia-Pacific accounted for approximately 34.6% of the global market in 2024.

The market is supported by the increasing movement of high-value and damage-sensitive products across automotive, aerospace, electronics, healthcare and consumer durable supply chains. As supply chains become longer and more geographically dispersed, the economic cost of product damage during transit becomes more significant, thereby increasing the value proposition of effective protective packaging.

The increasing adoption of e-commerce and organised logistics is another structural demand driver. Businesses increasingly seek packaging systems that are lightweight, efficient, reusable where appropriate and capable of reducing product damage. This creates opportunities for manufacturers of air dunnage bags and other protective packaging products.

At the same time, the industry remains highly competitive because customers can choose among multiple protective-packaging materials and formats. Product performance, reliability, cost, ease of use and application-specific design are therefore important determinants of competitive positioning.

LOGISTICS AND CARGO PROTECTION

The evolution of India's logistics ecosystem represents an important structural opportunity for industrial packaging manufacturers. The National Logistics Policy seeks to establish a more integrated, technology-enabled and efficient logistics ecosystem, while the Government's initiatives around multimodal transportation, digital logistics platforms and logistics parks are intended to improve supply-chain efficiency.

The Government reported in September 2025 that the Unified Logistics Interface Platform had facilitated more than 160 crore transactions and that the logistics ecosystem was being strengthened through digital integration, multimodal infrastructure, skill development and green-logistics initiatives. Separately, 35 locations had been approved for development of Multi-Modal Logistics Parks by April 2025.

For packaging manufacturers, the implications are significant. Greater integration between road, rail, ports, warehouses and containerised transportation increases the need for efficient palletisation, load securing and cargo protection. Products such as dunnage bags, composite straps, bulk bags and protective sheets can form part of this wider logistics infrastructure.

The opportunity is therefore not limited to the growth of packaging consumption itself. It also arises from the increasing professionalisation of logistics operations and the greater economic emphasis being placed on reducing product damage, improving cargo utilisation and ensuring safe transportation.

THERMAL INSULATION INDUSTRY

Thermal insulation represents an adjacent market with exposure to construction, industrial infrastructure, warehousing and energy-efficiency requirements. Increasing awareness of building energy consumption and the need to improve thermal performance are supporting demand for insulation products globally.

Independent market research estimates that the global building thermal insulation market will continue to expand through the current decade, supported by new construction, refurbishment activity, energy-efficiency requirements and increasing awareness of building performance.

The Indian opportunity is particularly relevant because the country's industrial and commercial building stock continues to expand while climatic conditions create significant cooling requirements. Better thermal management can reduce heat transfer through roofs and building envelopes and can consequently contribute to lower cooling loads in appropriate applications.

For manufacturers offering reflective and other specialised insulation systems, the opportunity is therefore connected not merely to construction volumes but also to the broader movement towards energy-efficient buildings and industrial facilities.

GEOMEMBRANES AND WATER MANAGEMENT

Geomembranes and polymeric liners have applications across water storage, agriculture, aquaculture, environmental protection, mining and civil infrastructure. Their principal value proposition lies in providing a barrier between contained material and the surrounding soil or structure, thereby reducing seepage and improving containment efficiency.

Independent industry research estimates that the global geomembrane market was approximately US\$2.23 billion in 2025 and is projected to reach approximately US\$3.59 billion by 2034, representing a CAGR of approximately 5.46%. Water management, agriculture, environmental protection and infrastructure are among the principal applications supporting market demand.

The long-term opportunity in India is linked to increasing attention towards water conservation, irrigation efficiency and agricultural water storage. As water availability becomes a more important economic and environmental consideration, technologies that improve storage efficiency and reduce water losses can find increasing applications.

This creates an opportunity for manufacturers of pond liners and other polymeric containment products. Nevertheless, the market requires attention to product quality, thickness, puncture resistance, installation practices and long-term durability because failure of a liner can result in significant economic consequences for the customer.

SUSTAINABILITY AND REGULATORY ENVIRONMENT

The plastics industry is undergoing a fundamental change in the way products are evaluated. Historically, price and performance were the primary considerations for many applications; increasingly, customers, regulators and other stakeholders are also evaluating recyclability, material efficiency, product life and end-of-life management.

India's Extended Producer Responsibility framework for plastic packaging has strengthened the regulatory focus on collection, recycling and responsible management of plastic waste. The regulatory framework continues to evolve, increasing the importance of compliance, documentation and traceability for participants in the plastics value chain.

For manufacturers, the changing regulatory environment presents both challenges and opportunities. Compliance requirements may increase operating complexity and costs, particularly where customers require specific material compositions or recycling documentation. At the same time, products that offer extended service life, reusability or efficient use of material may benefit from the increasing emphasis on lifecycle performance.

The Company's product portfolio should therefore increasingly be evaluated through the broader lens of material efficiency, durability, reuse and recyclability, rather than simply through production volumes.

RAW MATERIAL ENVIRONMENT

Polymer-based manufacturing is inherently exposed to movements in petrochemical and polymer prices. Polypropylene and other polymer inputs are ultimately linked to the global petrochemical value chain, and their prices can be influenced by crude-oil prices, refinery and petrochemical capacity, global demand, supply disruptions, freight costs and currency movements.

The Indian chemicals and petrochemicals sector remain an important part of the country's manufacturing ecosystem. Government data indicate that the chemicals and petrochemicals sector contributed approximately 8.1% of India's manufacturing GVA in FY2024, while production of selected major chemicals and petrochemicals increased substantially over the past decade.

For downstream processors, a stable and expanding domestic petrochemical ecosystem can improve material availability and supply-chain resilience. However, input-price volatility remains an important margin risk because the ability to immediately pass cost increases to customers depends upon contractual arrangements, competitive intensity and market conditions.

Consequently, procurement discipline, inventory management, product pricing, manufacturing efficiency and a diversified customer base remain important tools for managing raw-material risk.

BUSINESS OPPORTUNITIES FOR THE COMPANY

Against this industry backdrop, the Company's diversified product portfolio provides exposure to several structural growth themes. Its industrial packaging products participate in the expanding manufacturing and logistics ecosystem, while its building-related products provide exposure to thermal efficiency, roofing and water-management applications.

The most significant opportunity is likely to arise from the Company's ability to move towards higher-value and application-specific products. Markets such as FIBC, dunnage and industrial packaging are sizeable and growing, but they also contain a large number of manufacturers. Competing purely on manufacturing capacity or price can therefore limit margin expansion. Differentiation through product design, customisation, quality, certification and reliability can provide a stronger basis for sustainable customer relationships.

The Company's presence across multiple applications also provides an opportunity to diversify revenue sources. Industrial packaging demand is influenced by manufacturing and trade cycles, whereas insulation and geomembrane demand is more closely linked to construction, energy efficiency, agriculture and infrastructure. A broader portfolio can therefore moderate the impact of weakness in any one end-use sector.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The Company's principal business risks arise from raw-material price volatility, competition, changes in customer demand, global trade

conditions, regulatory developments, foreign-exchange movements and technological changes.

Raw-material risk is particularly relevant because polymer prices are influenced by global petrochemical markets. A sudden increase in input costs can compress margins if selling prices cannot be revised correspondingly.

Competition is another structural risk. The Company's markets include both organised and unorganised manufacturers, domestic competitors and international suppliers. Customers can often compare products on price, specifications, quality and delivery timelines. Consequently, the Company's ability to differentiate through quality, customisation, product development and customer service is important.

The Company's exposure to international trade also creates sensitivity to freight rates, geopolitical disruptions, currency movements and changes in trade policies. The WTO's 2026 outlook highlights the continuing uncertainty surrounding global merchandise trade, making geographical and end-market diversification increasingly important.

Environmental regulation represents both a compliance risk and a strategic opportunity. Increasing regulation of plastic packaging can raise compliance requirements, but it can also favour products designed for longer service life, reuse and efficient material utilisation.

OUTLOOK

The long-term outlook for the Company's principal addressable markets remains constructive, although the near-term operating environment is expected to remain competitive.

India's packaging industry is projected to grow at approximately 9% CAGR through FY2030, supported by consumption, manufacturing, e-commerce, organised retail and increasing demand from several end-use sectors.

The global FIBC market is projected to grow at approximately 6.2% CAGR through 2033, while the global dunnage packaging market is projected to grow at approximately 6.2% CAGR through 2030.

These industry trends indicate that the Company's addressable markets possess underlying structural growth. However, the Company's future performance will depend on its ability to capture this growth profitably. Market expansion alone does not guarantee margin expansion, particularly in competitive polymer-processing markets.

The strategic priorities should therefore remain focused on increasing value addition, strengthening customer relationships, expanding domestic and export opportunities, improving manufacturing efficiency, developing differentiated products and maintaining disciplined working-capital and cost management.

The Company's diversification into insulation, geomembrane and specialised composite applications can additionally provide exposure to markets with different demand drivers, thereby potentially improving the resilience of the overall business over the medium to long term.

MANAGEMENT'S STRATEGIC PERSPECTIVE

The Company's operating environment presents a combination of structural opportunities and execution challenges. India's expanding manufacturing base, formalising logistics ecosystem and growing packaging market provide favourable demand conditions. At the same time, global trade uncertainty, polymer-price volatility and competitive intensity require disciplined execution.

The Company's strategic opportunity lies in building upon its existing manufacturing and product capabilities to serve increasingly specialised requirements. Instead of treating packaging as a standardised commodity, the industry is progressively moving towards solutions that are designed around specific products, transportation conditions and customer processes. This creates scope for manufacturers that can combine material knowledge, product engineering, fabrication and customer-specific design.

The Company's broader portfolio also creates the possibility of building multiple growth engines. Industrial packaging can benefit from manufacturing and trade expansion; protective packaging can benefit from logistics growth; insulation can benefit from energy-efficiency requirements; geomembranes can benefit from water-management needs; and advanced composites can benefit from India's efforts to deepen domestic aerospace and high-performance manufacturing capabilities.

The principal management challenge will therefore be to convert these external market opportunities into sustainable returns by maintaining cost competitiveness while increasing the proportion of differentiated, higher-value products.

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

On Standalone Basis

During the year under review, the revenue from operation of the Company was stood at INR 12,326.12 Lakh as against that of INR 11,778.82 Lakh for previous year. Revenue from operation of the Company was increased by 4.65% over previous year.

Profit before Tax for the financial year 2025-26 stood at INR 1,228.70 Lakh as against that of INR 1,467.66 Lakh making the net profit of INR 875.94 Lakh for the financial year 2025-26 as against the net profit of INR 1,095.21 Lakh for the financial year 2024-25.

During the year under review, the export sales of the Company were decreased by 10.01%, whereas domestic sales of the Company were increased by 20.96% than that of respective for previous year.

On Consolidated Basis

The consolidated revenue from operation of the Company for financial year 2025-26 stood at INR 13,439.12 Lakh as against that of INR 11,625.12 Lakh for previous year. The consolidated net profit after tax (after adjustment of minority interest) for the financial year 2025-26 was stood at INR 726.64 Lakh as compared to INR 874.03 Lakh for the previous financial year 2024-25.

Despite increase of 15.60% in consolidated revenue from operation for the FY 2025-26, the Company has reported decrease of 16.86% in consolidated net profit after tax as compared to the previous financial year 2024-25. The decrease in profit after tax was due to increase in raw material costs.

RISK AND CONCERNS

The Company recognizes risk management as an integral part of business operations and continuously evaluates potential risks that could impact its performance.

Key risks include:

Raw Material Risk

Fluctuations in crude oil prices and petrochemical markets may impact raw material costs and profitability.

Market Risk

Changes in customer preferences, competitive pressures, and demand fluctuations may affect sales volumes and margins.

Regulatory Risk

Changes in environmental, taxation, labor, or industry-specific regulations may influence operating costs and business practices.

Operational Risk

Unexpected equipment breakdowns, utility interruptions, labor shortages, or supply chain disruptions may affect manufacturing operations.

Credit Risk

Delays in collection from customers may impact cash flows and working capital management.

The Company continuously monitors these risks and implements appropriate mitigation measures through prudent business practices, process controls, customer diversification, and operational efficiencies.

INTERNAL FINANCIAL CONTROL SYSTEMS AND THEIR ADEQUACY

Internal Control system and adequacy Internal Control measures and systems are established to ensure the correctness of the transactions and safe guarding of the assets. Thus, internal control is an integral component of risk management. The Internal control checks and internal audit programmes adopted by the Company plays an important role in the risk management feedback loop, in which the information generated in the internal control process is reported back to the Board and Management. The internal control systems are modified continuously to meet the dynamic change. Further the Audit Committee of the Board of Directors reviews the internal audit reports and the adequacy and effectiveness of internal controls.

NOTES TO THE STANDALONE FINANCIAL STATEMENT FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED MARCH 31, 2026
NOTE 1: NOTES TO ACCOUNTS
A. CORPORATE INFORMATION

Shish Industries Limited ('the company') is a public limited company domiciled in India and incorporated under the provisions of the Company Act, 2013. Its shares are listed on BSE. The registered office of the Company is located at 1502, 15th Floor, Junomoneta Tower, Pal RTO BRTS Road, Near Rajhans Cinema, Adajan Gam, Surat, Gujarat - 395009. Factory of the company is situated at Unit No. 1 and Unit No. 2, Block No. 390/1, 01 A Type Plot, Techno Zone, Mahuvej, United Wolfram, Mangrol, Mahuvej, Surat, Gujarat, 394125. The company is primarily engaged in manufacturing, trading and marketing of PP Corrugated Sheet and Rolls, Insulation and Building Products, Industrial Packaging Products, Consumer Products etc.

B. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES
a) Basis of Preparation

These financial statements are the separate financial statements of the Company (also called as standalone financial statements). The company has prepared and presented the financials as per reporting requirements u/s 133 of Companies Act, 2013 and Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 ("Ind AS") as amended by Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2016 effective from 1st April 2016 on the accruals basis. Ind AS comprises mandatory accounting standards notified under the Companies Act, 2013. Accounting policies have been consistently applied except where a newly issued accounting standard is initially adopted or a revision to an existing accounting standard requires a change in the accounting policy hitherto in use. The Management evaluates all recently issued or revised accounting standards on an ongoing basis.

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern and accrual basis. The accounting policies are applied consistently to all the periods presented in the financial statements. The financial statements of the Company for the year ended 31st March 2026 were approved by the Board of Directors on 29/05/2026.

b) Use of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Ind AS requires the management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported balances of assets and liabilities and disclosures relating to contingent assets and liabilities as at the date of the financial statements and reported amounts of income and expenses during the period. Examples of such estimates include provisions for doubtful debts, future obligations under employee retirement benefit plans, income taxes, post-sales customer support and the useful lives and dismantling expenses of fixed assets and intangible assets. The management periodically assesses using, external and internal sources, whether there is an indication that an asset may be impaired.

An impairment occurs where the carrying value exceeds the present value of future cash flows expected to arise from the continuing use of the asset and its eventual disposal. The impairment loss to be expensed is determined as the excess of the carrying amount over the higher of the asset's net sales price or present value as determined above. Contingencies are recorded when it is probable that a liability will be incurred, and the amount can be reasonably estimated. Where no reliable estimate can be made, a disclosure is made as contingent liability. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

c) Fair Value Measurement

Some of the Company's accounting policies and disclosures require the measurement of fair values, for both financial and non-financial assets and liabilities.

The company regularly reviews significant unobservable inputs and valuation adjustments. If third party information, such as pricing services, is used to measure fair values, then the company assesses the evidence obtained from the third parties to support the conclusion that these valuations meet the requirements of Ind

AS, including the level in the fair value hierarchy in which the valuations should be classified.

Fair values are categorised into different levels in a fair value hierarchy based on the inputs used in the valuation techniques as follows.

- Level 1: quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.
- Level 2: inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (i.e. as prices) or indirectly (i.e. derived from prices).
- Level 3: inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data (unobservable inputs).

When measuring the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Company uses observable market data as far as possible. If the inputs used to measure the fair value of an asset or a liability fall into different levels of the fair value hierarchy, then the fair value measurement is categorised in its entirety in the same level of the fair value hierarchy as the lowest level input that is significant to the entire measurement.

The Company recognises transfers between levels of the fair value hierarchy at the end of the reporting period during which the change has occurred.

d) Current and Non-Current Classification

The Company presents assets and liabilities in the Balance Sheet based on Current/ Non- Current classification.

An asset is treated as Current when it is –

- Expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in normal operating cycle;
- Held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- Expected to be realised within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- Cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is current when:

- It is expected to be settled in normal operating cycle;
- It is held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- It is due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- There is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

The Company classifies all other liabilities as non-current.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities.

e) Property, plant and equipment

Property, Plant & Equipment are carried at the cost of acquisition or construction less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. The cost of Property, Plant & Equipment includes non-refundable taxes, duties, freight and other incidental expenses related to the acquisition and installation of the respective assets as per Para 11 of Ind AS - 16, (Property Plant and Equipment). Borrowing and incidental costs directly attributable to acquisition or construction of those Property, Plant & Equipment which necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use are capitalised as per Para 8 of Ind AS - 8 (Borrowing Costs).

Advances paid towards the acquisition of Property, Plant & Equipment outstanding at each balance sheet date and the cost of Property, Plant & Equipment not ready for their intended use before such date are disclosed under capital work-in-progress.

Depreciation on Property, Plant & Equipment is provided using the written down value method at the rates specified in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013 or based on the useful life of the assets as estimated by Management. Depreciation is calculated on a pro-rata basis from the date of installation till the date the assets are sold or disposed. Disclosure as per Para 75-76 of Ind AS-16 (Property, Plant and Equipment) relating to dismantling cost is unascertainable. The management is unable to estimate the dismantling cost of individual assets as the same is impracticable, due to the complexity and size of the company.

f) Impairment of Assets

The Company assesses at each balance sheet date whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If any such indication exists, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the asset. If such recoverable amount of the asset or the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit to which the asset belongs is less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount is reduced to its recoverable amount. The reduction is treated as an impairment loss and is recognised in the profit and loss account. If at the balance sheet date there is an indication that if a previously assessed impairment loss no longer exists, the recoverable amount is reassessed and the asset is reflected at the recoverable amount subject to a maximum of depreciated historical cost.

No impairment loss for any assets have been identified and recorded during the year in terms of Para 58-64 of AS - 36, Impairment of Assets.

g) Inventories

Inventories are valued at cost (including cost for bringing the inventory to its current location and condition) or net realisable value whichever is less. Inventory as appearing in the financial statements is inclusive of duties, taxes and freight, in terms of Para 10 to 19 of Ind AS - 2, Inventories. Inventory excludes Goods and Services Tax.

h) Investments

Long-term investments are carried at cost less any other-than-temporary diminution in value, determined separately for each individual investment.

i) Retirement Benefits

Retirement Benefits, are accounted on Actuarial Basis.

j) Foreign currency transactions and balances

Export Sales have been recorded at the prevailing customs rate as on the date of removal of goods from the factory. The relevant debtor ledger is debited / credited with appropriate profit / loss on foreign exchange transactions when the sale proceeds are actually received as per Para 21 of AS - 21, (The Effect of Changes in Foreign Exchange Rates).

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies as at the balance sheet date, not covered by forward exchange contracts, are translated at year-end rates. The resultant exchange differences are recognised as Other Comprehensive Income under the group Other Equity. Non-monetary assets are recorded at the rates prevailing on the date of the transaction.

k) Revenue Recognition

Revenue from sale of goods is recognised when significant risks and rewards in respect of ownership of products are transferred to customers. Revenue from domestic sales of products is recognised on dispatch of products to customers from the factory premises. Revenue from export sales is recognised on shipment of products from the port.

Revenue from product sales is stated exclusive of returns, applicable trade discounts, allowances, and GST.

Dividend income is recognised when the unconditional right to receive the income is established. Income from interest on deposits, loans and interest bearing securities is recognised on the time proportionate method.

Export entitlements are recognised as income when the right to receive credit as per the terms of the scheme is established in respect of the exports made and where there is no significant uncertainty regarding the ultimate collection of the relevant export proceeds.

The Customs Duty Drawback benefits have been recognized as recommended by the Expert Advisory Committee of ICAI. In the opinion of the Expert Advisory Committee on the accounting treatment of Duty Drawback benefit, wherein it has been opined that the benefit under the Duty Drawback Scheme should be recognised as income when the exports (against which the credit has been granted) are made, provided the criteria for recognition of revenue under AS 9 have been fulfilled (query No. 28 of Vol. XX of Compendium of Opinions, page 96).

In the said opinion, the Committee has stated, inter alia, the following: "Under the facts and circumstances of the query, the Duty Drawback benefit should be recognised in the books of account when no significant uncertainties as to the amount of consideration that would be derived and as to its ultimate collection exist. In the case of drawback benefit on post-export basis when the company applies for the credit on realisation of export proceeds and the benefit is to be utilised for imports by the company, there seems to be no such significant uncertainty and, therefore, the drawback benefit should be recognised in the year in which the export was made."

l) Income Tax Expense

Income tax expense comprises current tax and deferred tax charge or credit.

Current Tax

The current charge for income taxes is calculated in accordance with the relevant tax regulations applicable to the Company.

Deferred Tax

Deferred tax charge or credit reflects the tax effects of timing differences between accounting income and taxable income for the period. The deferred tax charge or credit and the corresponding deferred tax liabilities or assets are recognised using the tax rates that have been enacted or substantially enacted by the balance sheet date. Deferred tax assets are recognised only to the extent there is reasonable certainty that the assets can be realised in future; however, where there is unabsorbed depreciation or carry forward of losses, deferred tax assets are recognised only if there is a virtual certainty of realisation of such assets. Deferred tax assets are reviewed at each balance sheet date and is written-down or written-up to reflect the amount that is reasonably/virtually certain (as the case may be) to be realised. The break-up of the major components of the deferred tax assets and liabilities as at balance sheet date has been arrived at after setting off deferred tax assets and liabilities where the Company has a legally enforceable right to set-off assets against liabilities and where such assets and liabilities relate to taxes on income levied by the same governing taxation laws.

m) Financial instruments

Initial Recognition

All financial instruments are recognized initially at fair value. Transaction costs that are attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset (other than financial assets recorded at fair value through OCI) are included in the fair value of the financial assets. Purchase or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within a time frame established by regulation or convention in the market place (regular way trade) are recognised on trade date. While, loans and borrowings and payables are recognised net of directly attributable transaction costs.

Subsequent Measurement

The classification of financial instruments depends on the objective of the business model for which it is held. Management determines the classification of its financial instruments at initial recognition.

a) Non-derivative Financial Assets

(i) Financial assets at amortized cost

A financial asset shall be measured at amortised cost if both of the following conditions are met:

- (a) the financial asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows and
- (b) the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest (SPPI) on the principal amount outstanding. They are presented as current assets, except for those maturing later than 12 months after the reporting date which are presented as non-current assets. Financial assets are measured initially at fair value plus transaction costs and subsequently carried at amortized cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment loss. Trade receivables, security deposits, cash and cash equivalents, employee and other advances and eligible current and non-current assets are measured at Amortized Cost.

(ii) Debt instruments at FVTOCI

A debt instrument shall be measured at fair value through other comprehensive income if both of the following conditions are met:

- (a) the objective of the business model is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows and selling financial assets and
- (b) the asset's contractual cash flow represent SPPI Debt instruments included within FVTOCI category are measured initially as well as at each reporting period at fair value plus transaction costs. Fair value movements are recognised in other comprehensive income (OCI). However, the Company recognises interest income, impairment losses & reversals and foreign exchange gain loss in statement of profit and loss. On derecognition of the asset, cumulative gain or loss previously recognised in OCI is reclassified from equity to profit and loss. Interest earned is recognised under the effective interest rate (EIR) model.

(iii) Equity instruments at FVTOCI

All equity instruments are measured at fair value. Equity instruments held for trading is classified as FVTPL. For all other equity instruments, the Company may make an irrevocable election to present subsequent changes in the fair value in OCI. The Company makes such election on an instrument-by- instrument basis. If the Company decides to classify an equity instrument as at FVTOCI, then all fair value changes on the instrument, excluding dividend are recognised in OCI which is not subsequently recycled to statement of profit and loss.

(iv) Financial assets at FVTPL

FVTPL is a residual category for financial assets. Any financial asset which does not meet the criteria for categorization as at amortised cost or as FVTOCI, is classified as FVTPL.

In addition, the Company may elect to designate the financial asset, which otherwise meets amortised cost or FVTOCI criteria, as FVTPL if doing so eliminates or significantly reduces a measurement or recognition inconsistency. The Company has not designated any financial asset as FVTPL.

Financial assets included within the FVTPL category are measured at fair values with all changes in the statement of profit and loss.

b) Non-derivative financial Liabilities

Financial liabilities at amortized cost

Financial liabilities at amortised cost represented by borrowings, trade and other payables are initially recognized at fair value, and subsequently carried at amortized cost using the effective interest rate method.

n) Current Assets Balances

Balances of Sundry Creditors, Sundry Debtors and loans and advances are subject to confirmation. In the opinion of the Board of Directors, the current assets, loans and advances have a realisable value at least equal to the amounts at which they are stated in the Balance Sheet.

o) Employee Benefits

Provisions of Gratuity is applicable to the company. All the provisions required to be made for the applicability of gratuity as required under Para 11 of Ind AS-19 (Employee Benefits) has been complied with. The company has made the provision of Gratuity as per the Consultancy services taken by the Management and same has been treated in the Profit & loss Statement.

p) Segment Reporting

The company is primarily engaged in manufacturing, trading and marketing of PP Corrugated Sheet and Rolls, Insulation and Building Products, Industrial Packaging Products, Consumer Products etc., which constitute a single reportable segment in accordance with Ind AS 108 - "Segment Reporting".

q) Events Occurring after the Balance Sheet Date

There were no such events occurred after balance sheet date which required material disclosure by the management and auditors.

r) Change in Accounting Policies

There has been no other changes in the accounting policy, in terms of Para 14 to 21 of Ind AS - 8 (Accounting Policies, Change in Accounting Estimates and Errors).

s) Prior Period Items

During the year we had not found any prior period item. But there was a short provision for earlier years of which now given effect in profit & loss A/c.

Shish Industries Limited continues to deploy a well-articulated risk management framework. This is based upon a three tiered approach encompassing (i) enterprise risks, (ii) process risks, and (iii) compliance risks.

- I. Enterprise risk: The Company continue to evaluate the risk and also ensures that the mitigation processes are in place.
- II. Process risk management involves assurances by the Company's Management regarding the effectiveness of business and financial controls and processes in all key activities across the various business processes.
- III. Compliance risk management comprises a detailed mechanism of assurances with respect to adherence of all laws and regulations with a comprehensive reporting process that cascades upwards from the accountable business line executives to Shish Industries Limited's Audit Committee and then on to the Board of Directors.

The outcomes of business review meetings conducted by management regarding processes and their compliance, as well as observations of the Audit Committee and the Board of Directors are continuously incorporated to capture new risks and update the existing ones. All three dimensions of Shish Industries Limited's Risk Management framework are reviewed annually for their relevance and modifications, as required. The risk management process, including its tracking and adherence, is substantially enabled for greater consistency and better reporting capabilities.

NOTE 1: NOTES TO ACCOUNTS
A. CORPORATE INFORMATION

Shish Industries Limited ('the company') is a public limited company domiciled in India and incorporated under the provisions of the Company Law. Its shares are listed on BSE. These consolidated financial statements comprise financial statement of the company and its subsidiaries (collectively referred to as the "Group") (Individually referred to as the "Entity"). The company is having its head quarters in Surat and plants at Mahuvej. The company is primarily engaged in manufacturing, trading and marketing of PP Corrugated Sheet and Rolls, Insulation and Building Products, Industrial Packaging Products, Consumer Products etc.

Shish Polylam Private Limited is a 100% Subsidiary company of Shish Industries Limited and the company is primarily engaged in manufacturing, trading, and marketing of all types of lamination of Woven fabrics, PP Woven Fabrics, Alluminum Foil & Metallizing on Woven Fabrics.

Shish Global Solution Private Limited is a 100% subsidiary company of Shish Industries Limited and the company is primarily established to own, run, manage, and to carry on the business as traders, buyers, sellers, exporters, importers, merchants, resellers, dealers, distributors and/or in any other capacity in which the business may be carried on all kind of products.

Greenenergy INC is a 100% Foreign Subsidiary Company of Shish Industries limited and the company is primarily engaged in sales and marketing of all types of lamination of woven fabrics, PP Woven Fabrics, Aluminum Foil & Metalizing on Woven Fabrics.

Dunnage Bag Private Limited is a 100% subsidiary company of Shish Industries Limited and the company is primarily engaged in the business of Manufacturing, Trading and Marketing of Dunnage Bags.

Interstar Polyfab Private Limited is a 76.67% subsidiary company of Shish Industries Limited and the company is primarily engaged in the business of Manufacturing, Trading and Marketing of PP/PE Woven Fabrics.

Shish Advanced Composites private limited is a 65% subsidiary of Shish Industris Limited from 26th June 2025 and the company is primarily established to in the Manufacturing and trading of Composite materials or components or assemblies of all kinds.

B. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES
a) Basis of Preparation

The company has prepared and presented the financials as per reporting requirements u/s 133 of Companies Act, 2013 and Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 ("Ind AS") as amended by Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2016 effective from 1st April 2016 on the accruals basis. Ind AS comprises mandatory accounting standards notified under the Companies Act, 2013. Accounting policies have been consistently applied except where a newly issued accounting standard is initially adopted or a revision to an existing accounting standard requires a change in the accounting policy hitherto in use. The Management evaluates all recently issued or revised accounting standards on an ongoing basis.

Basis of Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements have comprised financial statements of the Holding Company and its subsidiaries. Subsidiaries are all entities (including structured entities) over which the Group has control. The Group controls an entity when the Group is exposed to, or has rights to, variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power to direct the relevant activities of the entity. The Group can have power over the investee even if it owns less than majority voting rights i.e. rights arising from other contractual arrangements. Subsidiaries are fully consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the Group. They are

deconsolidated from the date that control ceases. Statement of profit and loss (including other comprehensive income ('OCI')) of subsidiaries acquired or disposed of during the period are recognized from the effective date of acquisition, or up to the effective date of disposal, as applicable.

The Group combines the financial statements of the Holding Company and its subsidiaries line by line adding together like items of assets, liabilities, equity, income and expenses. Intercompany transactions, balances and unrealized gains on transactions between group companies are eliminated. Accounting policies of subsidiaries have been changed where necessary to ensure consistency with the policies adopted by the Group.

Greenenergy International Inc is a foreign subsidiary of the holding company. The tax return filing of the foreign subsidiary has been under process for the year ending on 31/12/2025. We have relied on the work done by the other professional upto 31/12/2025 and for the period between 01/01/2026 to 31/03/2026 we are relying on the financial statement provided to us by the management of the foreign subsidiary for the consolidated financial statement.

b) Use of Estimates

The preparation of the consolidated financial statements in conformity with Ind AS requires the management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported balances of assets and liabilities and disclosures relating to contingent assets and liabilities as at the date of the financial statements and reported amounts of income and expenses during the period. Examples of such estimates include provisions for doubtful debts, future obligations under employee retirement benefit plans, income taxes, post-sales customer support and the useful lives and dismantling exps of fixed assets and intangible assets. The management periodically assesses using, external and internal sources, whether there is an indication that an asset may be impaired.

An impairment occurs where the carrying value exceeds the present value of future cash flows expected to arise from the continuing use of the asset and its eventual disposal. The impairment loss to be expensed is determined as the excess of the carrying amount over the higher of the asset's net sales price or present value as determined above. Contingencies are recorded when it is probable that a liability will be incurred, and the amount can be reasonably estimated. Where no reliable estimate can be made, a disclosure is made as contingent liability. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

c) Fair Value Measurement

Some of the Company's accounting policies and disclosures require the measurement of fair values, for both financial and non-financial assets and liabilities.

The company regularly reviews significant unobservable inputs and valuation adjustments. If third party information, such as pricing services, is used to measure fair values, then the company assesses the evidence obtained from the third parties to support the conclusion that these valuations meet the requirements of Ind AS, including the level in the fair value hierarchy in which the valuations should be classified.

Fair values are categorised into different levels in a fair value hierarchy based on the inputs used in the valuation techniques as follows.

When measuring the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Company uses observable market data as far as possible. If the inputs used to measure the fair value of an asset or a liability fall into different levels of the fair value hierarchy, then the fair value measurement is categorised in its entirety in the same level of the fair value hierarchy as the lowest level input that is significant to the entire measurement.

The Company recognises transfers between levels of the fair value hierarchy at the end of the reporting period during which the change has occurred.

d) Current and Non-Current Classification

The Company presents assets and liabilities in the Balance Sheet based on Current/ Non- Current classification.

An asset is treated as Current when it is –

- Expected to be realized or intended to be sold or consumed in normal operating cycle;
- Held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- Expected to be realized within twelve months after the reporting period or
- Cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is current when:

- It is expected to be settled in normal operating cycle;
- It is held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- It is due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period or
- There is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

The Company classifies all other liabilities as non-current.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities.

e) Property Plant & Equipment and Depreciation

Property, Plant & Equipment are carried at the cost of acquisition or construction less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. The cost of Property, Plant & Equipment includes non-refundable taxes, duties, freight and other incidental expenses related to the acquisition and installation of the respective assets as per Para 11 of Ind AS - 16, (Property Plant and Equipment). Borrowing and incidental costs directly attributable to acquisition or construction of those Property, Plant & Equipment which necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use are capitalised as per Para 8 of Ind AS - 8 (Borrowing Costs).

Advances paid towards the acquisition of Property, Plant & Equipment outstanding at each balance sheet date and the cost of Property, Plant & Equipment not ready for their intended use before such date are disclosed under capital work-in-progress.

Depreciation on Property, Plant & Equipment is provided using the written down value method at the rates specified in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013 or based on the useful life of the assets as estimated by Management. Depreciation is calculated on a pro-rata basis from the date of installation till the date the assets are sold or disposed. Disclosure as per Para 75-76 of Ind AS-16 (Property, Plant and Equipment) relating to dismantling cost is unascertainable. The management is unable to estimate the dismantling cost of individual assets as the same is impracticable, due to the complexity and size of the company.

f) Impairment of Assets

The Company assesses at each balance sheet date whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If any such indication exists, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the asset. If such recoverable amount of the asset or the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit to which the asset belongs is less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount is reduced to its recoverable amount. The reduction is treated as an impairment loss and is recognised in the profit and loss account. If

at the balance sheet date there is an indication that if a previously assessed impairment loss no longer exists, the recoverable amount is reassessed and the asset is reflected at the recoverable amount subject to a maximum of depreciated historical cost.

No impairment loss for any assets have been identified and recorded during the year in terms of Para 58-64 of AS - 36, Impairment of Assets.

g) Inventories

Inventories are valued at cost (including cost for bringing the inventory to its current location and condition) or net realisable value whichever is less. Inventory as appearing in the financial statements is inclusive of duties, taxes and freight, in terms of Para 10 to 19 of Ind AS - 2, Inventories. Inventory excludes Goods and Services Tax.

h) Investments

Long-term investments are carried at cost less any other-than-temporary diminution in value, determined separately for each individual investment.

i) Retirement Benefits

Retirement Benefits are accounted on Actuarial Basis.

j) Foreign currency transactions and balances

Export Sales have been recorded at the prevailing customs rate as on the date of removal of goods from the factory. The relevant debtor ledger is debited / credited with appropriate profit / loss on foreign exchange transactions when the sale proceeds are actually received as per Para 21 of AS - 21, (The Effect of Changes in Foreign Exchange Rates).

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies as at the balance sheet date, not covered by forward exchange contracts, are translated at year-end rates. The resultant exchange differences are recognised as Other Comprehensive Income under the group Other Equity. Non-monetary assets are recorded at the rates prevailing on the date of the transaction.

k) Revenue Recognition

Revenue from sale of goods is recognised when significant risks and rewards in respect of ownership of products are transferred to customers. Revenue from domestic sales of products is recognised on dispatch of products to customers from the factory premises. Revenue from export sales is recognised on shipment of products from the port.

Revenue from product sales is stated exclusive of returns applicable trade discounts allowances and GST.

Dividend income is recognised when the unconditional right to receive the income is established. Income from interest on deposits, loans and interest bearing securities is recognised on the time proportionate method.

Export entitlements are recognised as income when the right to receive credit as per the terms of the scheme is established in respect of the exports made and where there is no significant uncertainty regarding the ultimate collection of the relevant export proceeds.

The Customs Duty Drawback benefits have been recognized as recommended by the Expert Advisory Committee of ICAI. In the opinion of the Expert Advisory Committee on the accounting treatment of Duty Drawback benefit, wherein it has been opined that the benefit under the Duty Drawback Scheme should be recognised as income when the exports (against which the credit has been granted) are made, provided the criteria for recognition of revenue under AS 9 have been fulfilled (query No. 28 of Vol. XX of Compendium of Opinions, page 96).

In the said opinion, the Committee has stated, inter alia, the following: "Under the facts and circumstances of the query, the Duty Drawback benefit should be recognised in the books of account when no significant uncertainties as to the amount of consideration that would be derived and as to its ultimate collection exist. In the case of drawback benefit on post-export basis when the company applies for the credit on realisation of export proceeds and the benefit is to be utilised for imports by the company, there seems to be no such significant uncertainty and, therefore, the drawback benefit should be recognised in the year in which the export was made."

l) Income Tax Expense

Income tax expense comprises current tax and deferred tax charge or credit.

Current Tax

The current charge for income taxes is calculated in accordance with the relevant tax regulations applicable to the Company.

Deferred Tax

Deferred tax charge or credit reflects the tax effects of timing differences between accounting income and taxable income for the period. The deferred tax charge or credit and the corresponding deferred tax liabilities or assets are recognised using the tax rates that have been enacted or substantially enacted by the balance sheet date. Deferred tax assets are recognised only to the extent there is reasonable certainty that the assets can be realised in future; however, where there is unabsorbed depreciation or carry forward of losses, deferred tax assets are recognised only if there is a virtual certainty of realisation of such assets. Deferred tax assets are reviewed at each balance sheet date and is written-down or written-up to reflect the amount that is reasonably/virtually certain (as the case may be) to be realised. The break-up of the major components of the deferred tax assets and liabilities as at balance sheet date has been arrived at after setting off deferred tax assets and liabilities where the Company has a legally enforceable right to set-off assets against liabilities and where such assets and liabilities relate to taxes on income levied by the same governing taxation laws.

m) Financial instruments

Initial Recognition

All financial instruments are recognized initially at fair value. Transaction costs that are attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset (other than financial assets recorded at fair value through OCI) are included in the fair value of the financial assets. Purchase or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within a time frame established by regulation or convention in the market place (regular way trade) are recognised on trade date. While, loans and borrowings and payables are recognised net of directly attributable transaction costs.

Subsequent Measurement

The classification of financial instruments depends on the objective of the business model for which it is held. Management determines the classification of its financial instruments at initial recognition.

a) Non-derivative Financial Assets

(i) Financial assets at amortized cost

A financial asset shall be measured at amortized cost if both of the following conditions are met:

- the financial asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows and
- the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest (SPPI) on the principal amount outstanding. They are presented as current assets, except for those maturing later than 12 months after the reporting date which are presented as non-current assets. Financial assets are measured initially at fair value plus transaction costs and subsequently carried at amortized cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment loss. Trade receivables, security deposits, cash and cash equivalents, employee and other advances and eligible current and non-current assets are measured at Amortized Cost.

(ii) Debt instruments at FVTOCI

A debt instrument shall be measured at fair value through other comprehensive income if both of the following conditions are met:

- the objective of the business model is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows and selling financial assets and
- the asset's contractual cash flow represents SPPI Debt instruments included within FVTOCI category are measured

initially as well as at each reporting period at fair value plus transaction costs. Fair value movements are recognised in other comprehensive income (OCI). However the Company recognises interest income impairment losses & reversals and foreign exchange gain loss in statement of profit and loss. On derecognition of the asset cumulative gain or loss previously recognised in OCI is reclassified from equity to profit and loss. Interest earned is recognised under the effective interest rate (EIR) model.

(iii) Equity instruments at FVTOCI

All equity instruments are measured at fair value. Equity instruments held for trading is classified as FVTPL. For all other equity instruments, the Company may make an irrevocable election to present subsequent changes in the fair value in OCI. The Company makes such election on an instrument-by-instrument basis. If the Company decides to classify an equity instrument as at FVTOCI, then all fair value changes on the instrument, excluding dividend are recognised in OCI which is not subsequently recycled to statement of profit and loss.

(iv) Financial assets at FVTPL

FVTPL is a residual category for financial assets. Any financial asset which does not meet the criteria for categorization as at amortised cost or as FVTOCI is classified as FVTPL.

In addition the Company may elect to designate the financial asset which otherwise meets amortised cost or FVTOCI criteria as FVTPL if doing so eliminates or significantly reduces a measurement or recognition inconsistency. The Company has not designated any financial asset as FVTPL.

Financial assets included within the FVTPL category are measured at fair values with all changes in the statement of profit and loss.

b) Non-derivative financial Liabilities

(i) Financial liabilities at amortized cost

Financial liabilities at amortised cost represented by borrowings trade and other payables are initially recognized at fair value and subsequently carried at amortized cost using the effective interest rate method.

n) Current Assets Balances

Balances of Sundry Creditors, Sundry Debtors and loans and advances are subject to confirmation. In the opinion of the Board of Directors, the current assets, loans and advances have a realisable value at least equal to the amounts at which they are stated in the Balance Sheet.

o) Employee Benefits

Provisions of Gratuity are applicable to the company. All the provisions required to be made for the applicability of gratuity as required under Para 11 of Ind AS-19 (Employee Benefits) has been complied with. The company has made the provision of Gratuity as per the Consultancy services taken by the Management and same has been treated in the Profit & loss Statement.

p) Segment Reporting

The company is primarily engaged in manufacturing, trading and marketing of PP Corrugated Sheet and Rolls, Insulation and Building Products, Industrial Packaging Products, Consumer Products etc., which constitute a single reportable segment in accordance with Ind AS 108 - "Segment Reporting".

q) Events Occurring after the Balance Sheet Date

There were no such events occurred after balance sheet date which required material disclosure by the management and auditors.

r) Change in Accounting Policies

There has been no other changes in the accounting policy in terms of Para 14 to 21 of Ind AS - 8 (Accounting Policies Change in Accounting Estimates and Errors).

s) Prior Period Items

During the year we had not found any prior period item. But there was a short provision for earlier years of which now given effect in profit & loss A/c.

A copy of the existing Articles of Association of the Company together with the proposed amended Articles incorporating the new Article 165 will be available for inspection by the Members in accordance with the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 and the applicable Secretarial Standards up to the date of the Annual General Meeting and shall also be made available electronically for inspection by the Members upon request.

None of the Directors, Key Managerial Personnel of the Company or their respective relatives is, in any way, concerned or interested, financially or otherwise, in the proposed Special Resolution, except to the extent of their shareholding, if any, in the Company.

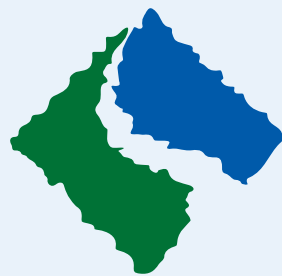
