In the above situation, the Company decided to expedite the development of Land owned by the Company at Kakinada beach and dispose it off to prospective buyers. It is estimated that these funds will cover renovation funding requirement, without waiting for the Term Loan from the Bank. Efforts are on to secure necessary statutory approvals for this purpose to enable the Company to raise funds as above through this avenue at the earliest. I sincerely appreciate the patience, understanding, and continued confidence of our shareholders, lenders, customers, employees, and all other stakeholders during this period.

Looking ahead, the completion of the renovation and expansion project, including the addition of new guest rooms and the upgradation of existing facilities, will significantly enhance the Company's operational capabilities and competitive positioning. These strategic investments are expected to improve guest experience, increase occupancy levels, strengthen revenue generation, and support sustainable growth and long-term profitability.

On behalf of the Board of Directors, I express my sincere gratitude to our shareholders for their unwavering trust and continued support. I also thank our bankers, customers, business associates, suppliers, the Central and State Governments, regulatory authorities, and all our stakeholders for their valuable cooperation and encouragement.

I place on record my heartfelt appreciation for the dedication, commitment, and perseverance of our employees, whose efforts continue to drive the Company forward despite the challenges faced during the year.

The Ministry of Corporate Affairs ('MCA') vide its circular nos. 14/2020 dated April 8, 2020, 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020, 20/2020 dated May 5, 2020, 02/2021 dated January 13, 2021, 21/2021 dated December 14, 2021 and 2/2022 dated May 5, 2022 (collectively referred to as 'MCA Circulars') and the Securities and Exchange Board of India ('SEBI') vide its circular nos. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD1/CIR/P/2020/79 dated May 12, 2020, SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD2/CIR/P/2021/11 dated January 15, 2021 and SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD2/ CIRP/P/2022/62 dated May 13, 2022 ('SEBI Circulars') has permitted the holding of the Annual General Meeting ('AGM') through Video Conferencing ('VC') / Other Audio Visual Means ('OAVM'), without the physical presence of the Members at a common venue. In compliance with these MCA and SEBI Circulars, applicable provisions of the Act (including any statutory modifications or re-enactments thereof for the time being in force) read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014, as amended and pursuant to Regulation 44 of the SEBI (Listing Obligations & Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ('SEBI Listing Regulations'), the 33rd AGM of the Company is being conducted through VC/OAVM on **September 26, 2026 at 5.30 P.M. (IST)**. The deemed venue for the 33rd AGM shall be the Registered Office of the Company.
2. Pursuant to the provisions of the act, a member entitled to attend and vote at the Annual General Meeting is entitled to appoint a proxy to attend and vote on his/her behalf and the proxy need not be a member of the company. Since this AGM is being held pursuant to the MCA circulars through VC/OAVM, the requirement of physical attendance of members has been dispensed with. Accordingly, in terms of the MCA circulars and the SEBI circular, the facility for appointment of proxies by the members will not be available for this AGM and hence the proxy form, attendance slip and route map of the AGM venue are not annexed to this notice.
3. This will not include large Shareholders (Shareholders holding 2% or more shareholding), Promoters, Institutional Investors, Directors, Key Managerial Personnel, the Chairpersons of the Audit Committee, Nomination and Remuneration Committee and Stakeholders Relationship Committee, Auditors etc. who are allowed to attend the AGM without restriction on account of first come first served basis.
5. The attendance of the Members attending the AGM through VC/OAVM will be counted for the purpose of reckoning the quorum under Section 103 of the Companies Act, 2013.

7. As per the provisions of Section 72 the Act, the facility for making nomination is available to the Members in respect of the shares held by them. Nomination forms can be obtained from the Company's RTA by Members holding shares in physical form. Members who have not yet registered their nomination are requested to register the same by submitting Form No. SH-13. If a Member desires to cancel the earlier nomination and record a fresh nomination, he may submit the same in Form SH-14. Members holding shares in electronic form may obtain Nomination forms from their respective DPs.
8. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 108 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 (as amended) and Regulation 44 of SEBI (Listing Obligations & Disclosure Requirements) Regulations 2015 (as amended), and the Circulars issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs and SEBI the Company is providing facility of remote e-voting to its Members in respect of the business to be transacted at the AGM. The Explanatory Statement pursuant to Section 102 of the Companies Act, 2013 (the Act), given hereunder sets out all material facts relating to the resolution mentioned at Item No.3 and Item No.4 of the accompanying Notice dated 03.09.2026.

Item No. 3

This is informed that the shareholders of the company earlier approved to issue and allot 4,55,00,000 sweat equity shares subject to the maximum limit equivalent to 15% of the Paid up capital of the Company in the last annual general meeting of the company held on September 20, 2025. As the Resolution passed in the previous AGM is valid only for one year from the date of the AGM, a fresh Resolution is required to be passed in the present AGM for re-validation of the issue of Sweat Equity. To comply with the Regulation No: 166A of the SEBI (ICDR) Regulations, 2018 and Regulation No: 3 of SEBI (SAST) Regulations, 2011, the Company during the Year 2025-2026 made an application to the Stock Exchanges for their approval to issue and allot 1,50,00,000 sweat equity shares equivalent to less than 5% of the paid up capital of the company. The company is awaiting the approval of the Stock Exchanges for the same.

The validity of the Resolution dated 20th September, 2025 for sweat equity is one year from the date of passing the resolution by the shareholders of the company. Consequently the Resolution lapses by period of limitation on 19th September, 2026. The then National Airports Authority (NAA) through a public tender allotted to Mr. Venkat Manohar Dontamsetti land admeasuring 4.38 acres (17,759 Sqm) on lease for a period of 30 years at Begumpet Airport for constructing and operating Airport Hotel along with related business activities. Mr. Manohar has transferred that land to Shri Shakti Resorts & Hotels Ltd without taking any consideration whatsoever and implemented the project and successfully running the hotel and related businesses. Shri Shakti Resorts & Hotels Ltd is merged with your Company viz., Sri Havisha Hospitality and Infrastructure Ltd as per NCLT Order dated 16th Nov, 2021. The lease expired on 19th Nov, 2019 and Mr. Manohar has put in herculean efforts starting from 2017 itself for the renewal of the lease. Due to his persistent and perseverant efforts, the above land lease is renewed by Airports Authority of India in the name of Sri Havisha Hospitality and Infrastructure Ltd for a period of 30 years starting from 1st Jan, 2023. The lease deed to this effect is signed between Airports Authority of India and Sri Havisha represented by Mr. Venkat Manohar Dontamsetti on 27th July, 2023.

It is an irrefutable fact that the business growth and future prospects of your company are substantially enhanced consequent to the above.

Further Mr. Manohar is instrumental in turning around your Company from accumulated losses of about Rs 100 crores to the present profitable position. When Govt. of India couldn't implement it's commitment to remove subsidy on LPG over 3 years, entire private LPG Industry was badly affected. In such situation, Mr. Manohar cleared Bank loans of about Rs 106 Crores under One Time Settlement and made your Company debt - free in FY 2007-08. Thereafter he ensured your Company's survival all these years despite nil revenues. After the merger with Shri Shakti Resorts & Hotels Ltd, your Company is now turned profitable.

The efforts of Mr. Manohar for one time settlement is more in the nature of physical stress and involvement and quantification of such efforts in monetary terms is not possible. His value addition remains an appreciative contribution to the overall growth of the Company and has become a decisive factor for the shareholders to consider and approve sweat equity to Mr. Manohar.

Therefore it is proposed that Mr. Manohar shall be adequately compensated for his efforts as above through issue and allotment of 1,50,00,000 Sweat Equity Shares of Rs. 2 each fully paid up for his Non-cash consideration and value addition to the company.

First proviso to Section 188 (1) further stipulates that no contract or arrangement, in the case of a company having a paid-up share capital of not less than such amount, or transactions exceeding such sums, as may be prescribed, shall be entered into except with the prior approval of the company by a Resolution. The second proviso further states that no member of the company shall vote on such Resolution, to approve any contract or arrangement which may be entered into by the company, if such member is a related party.

The Audit Committee and Board of Directors of the Company have granted prior approval for the Related Party Transactions as stated in the Resolution and Explanatory Statement.

Regulation 23(4) of SEBI Listing Regulations, inter alia, prescribes that all material related party transactions and subsequent material modifications as defined by the audit committee under sub-regulation (2), shall require prior approval of the shareholders through Resolution and no related party shall vote to approve such Resolutions whether the entity is a related party to the particular transaction or not. First proviso to sub-Regulation (1) of the said Regulation 23 states that a

transaction with a related party shall be considered material if the transaction(s) to be entered into individually or taken together with previous transactions during a financial year, exceeds rupees Rs 1000 Crore (Rupees One Thousand Crore) or ten per cent of the annual consolidated turnover of the listed entity as per the last audited financial statements of the listed entity, whichever is lower.

3. PERFORMANCE REVIEW:

Performance

The total revenue for FY 2025-26 is Rs. 1491.93 Lakhs, which is slightly lesser than the previous year's total revenue of Rs. 1584.15 Lakhs. The Company reported after tax loss of Rs. 501.66 Lakhs for the FY 2025-26 as against the loss of Rs. 426.61 Lakhs for FY 2024-25.

The Company executed the lease agreement with Airports Authority of India (AAI) for renewal of the leasehold rights of the land for another 30 years from the year 2023. Interest Expense on lease liability has been provided as per Ind AS 116 and the Finance Cost for the year ended 31 March 2026 of Rs. 478.55 Lakhs includes Interest expense on lease liability of INR 440.07 lakhs which is notional.

Borrowings

Total long-term borrowings of the Company (other than lease liabilities) were Rs. 15.24 Lakhs as on March 31, 2026. Short term borrowings (other than lease liabilities) were maintained as Rs. 1064.95 Lakhs as on March 31, 2026.

Capital Expenditure

During FY 2025-26, the Company's outlay towards capital expenditure was Rs. 185.79 Lakhs.

4. STATE OF AFFAIRS AND FUTURE OUTLOOK OF THE COMPANY:

The legacy of the business of Hotel reflects a sustained journey of committed leadership in the hospitality sector and establishing a reputation of operational discipline, service consistency, and sustained efforts to mark overall guests' satisfaction. We care to maintain mutual respect in Guest relationship with humility.

The outlook for India's hospitality sector remains positive supported by sustained growth in domestic tourism in recent years. Domestic travel has emerged as stable demand for the hospitality sector. Policy measures such as GST rate rationalization, income tax reduction, and monetary easing are expected to further support discretionary consumption in the near term.

Your Company has taken up renovation of the Property after securing the renewal of land lease for another 30 years from Airports Authority of India (AAI). Consequently the available number of rooms has come down due to which the overall revenues are affected. The Company believes that the ongoing renovation of the hotel, together with the addition of new guest rooms and the upgradation of existing facilities, will significantly enhance its operational capacity and overall guest experience. These initiatives are expected to improve occupancy levels, increase average room revenue and strengthen the Company's competitive position in the hospitality sector. Upon completion of the renovation and expansion, the Company anticipates a positive impact on its operating performance resulting in improved revenues, enhanced operational efficiencies and sustained profitability in the coming years. The Board is confident that these strategic investments will create long-term value for the Company and its shareholders.

As informed during the previous meeting, the renovation of the hotel has been dependent on the disbursement of Term Loan from the bank. In the meantime, the Company started much awaited renovation of the Property and nearly completed rooms in the Fourth Floor. As the Bank is insisting for No Objection Certificate from Airports Authority Of India despite there being a specific clause in this respect in the Lease Deed, the Term Loan disbursement is delayed. In the above situation, the Company decided to expedite the development of Land owned by the Company at Kakinada beach and dispose it off to prospective buyers. It is estimated that these funds will cover renovation funding requirement, without waiting for the Term Loan from the Bank. Efforts are on to secure necessary statutory approvals for this purpose to enable the Company to raise funds as above through this avenue at the earliest.

The resolution previously passed by the shareholders in the general meeting of the company held on September 20, 2025 for the issuance of 4,55,00,000 Sweat Equity Shares of Rs.2 each to Mr. Manohar , the Chairman And Managing Director of the Company, subject to the maximum limit equivalent to 15% of the Paid up capital of the Company. To comply with the Regulation No:166A of the SEBI (ICDR) Regulations, 2018 and Regulation No: 3 of SEBI (SAST) Regulations, 2011, the Company during the Year 2025-2026 made an application to the Stock Exchanges for their approval to issue and allot 1,50,00,000 sweat equity shares of Rs.2 each equivalent to less than 5% of the paid up capital of the company. The company is awaiting the approval of the Stock Exchanges for the same. The resolution passed in the previous General Meeting is approaching the end of its validity period and will lapse on 19th September, 2026 if not acted upon within the prescribed time. As the proposed issuance could not be completed during the validity of the earlier approval, it is necessary to obtain fresh approval from the shareholders in accordance with the applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 and the rules made there under. Accordingly, the Board recommends that the shareholders consider and approve a fresh resolution in the place of earlier approved resolution authorizing the issuance of 1,50,00,000 Sweat Equity Shares on the terms and conditions set out.

Your Company's independent and robust internal audit processes provide assurance on the existence, adequacy, and effectiveness of internal controls and compliance with policies, procedures and regulatory requirements. The primary aim of the Internal Audit function is to enhance and protect organizational value and improvement of your Company's internal control systems.

5. DIVIDEND:

In view of the accumulated losses and the need to conserve available funds for the renovation and operations of the Company, your Company has considered it prudent to not to propose dividend for the financial year ended March 31, 2026.

7. MATERIAL CHANGES AND COMMITMENTS AFFECTING FINANCIAL POSITION BETWEEN END OF THE FINANCIAL YEAR AND DATE OF REPORT:

There are no material changes and commitments which may likely affect financial position of the company between end of the financial year and the date of the report.

8. MATERIAL ORDERS OF REGULATORS/COURTS/TRIBUNALS:

(i).Update on Cross Subsidy Surcharge (CSS) Matter

As reported in the previous year's Directors' Report, the Company had challenged the demand raised by Telangana State Power Distribution Company Limited (TGSPDCL) towards Cross Subsidy Surcharge (CSS) in respect of electricity procured from third-party power generators. The matter is pending before the Hon'ble Telangana High Court and remains sub judice.

There has been no final adjudication by the Hon'ble High Court during the financial year under review. Accordingly, the amount of ₹99.91 lakhs deposited by the Company under protest pursuant to the interim directions of the Hon'ble High Court continues to be disclosed under "Other Current Assets – Deposits" in the financial statements. Based on legal advice, the management continues to believe that the Company has a strong case on merits and that the likelihood of any liability crystallizing is remote. Consequently, no provision has been made in the books of account.

(ii).Litigation Matter – Percept Advertising Limited

During the year under review, the Company reviewed and disclosed the status of a litigation involving Percept Advertising Limited relating to a money recovery suit. The suit culminated in a decree dated March 5, 2010, directing the Company to pay a sum of ₹30,63,706. Prior to the passing of the decree, pursuant to an order dated April 17, 2009 of the then Hon'ble High Court of Andhra Pradesh in Company Petition No. 35 of 2003, the Company had deposited an amount of ₹23,15,648 under protest. The said deposit was directed solely on account of the amount being reflected against the claimant in Form A filed before the Board for Industrial and Financial Reconstruction (BIFR), without prejudice to the outcome of O.S. No. 66 of 2004. Consequently, upon passing of the decree, the balance amount outstanding was ₹6,51,978.

Aggrieved by the decree, the Company preferred an appeal before the Hon'ble High Court of Andhra Pradesh (now the Hon'ble High Court for the State of Telangana) in CCCA No. 70 of 2010. The Hon'ble High Court granted interim relief, subject to the Company depositing an additional sum of ₹2,00,000. The Court also permitted withdrawal of the deposited amounts by the parties in accordance with the conditions stipulated in the interim order.

The appeal remained pending until March 3, 2025, when it came to be dismissed for non-prosecution owing to an inadvertent communication gap between the Company and its counsel. Subsequently, on September 10, 2025, the Company filed an appropriate petition seeking restoration of the appeal. The restoration petition is presently pending before the Hon'ble High Court, and upon its consideration, the appeal is expected to be restored and heard on merits.

Based on legal advice received, the management believes that the Company has substantial grounds in support of its case. As the decree is under challenge and the matter is pending before the Hon'ble High Court, the liability has not attained finality. Accordingly, the management is of the opinion that no present obligation requiring recognition as a liability has arisen as of March 31, 2026, and the matter has been appropriately considered in the preparation of the financial statements in accordance with the applicable accounting standards.

Apart from this, no other significant or material orders were passed by the regulators or courts or tribunals which may impact the going concern status and Company's operations in future.

9. TRANSFER TO RESERVES:

As permitted under the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013, the Board feels that the profit of the Company can be utilised in other profitable way and considering the same no amount of the Profit has been transferred to the Reserve.

10. DEPOSITS:

The Company has not accepted any deposits covered under chapter V of the Companies Act, 2013 and the Companies (Acceptance of Deposits) Rules, 2014 for the year under review.

11. PARTICULARS OF LOAN, GUARANTEE OR INVESTMENTS:

Your Company has complied with the provisions of Section 185 and 186 of the Companies Act, 2013 with respect to Loans, guarantees or investments made.

12. REPORT ON PERFORMANCE OF SUBSIDIARIES, ASSOCIATES AND JOINT VENTURE COMPANIES:

During the year under review, the Company did not have any subsidiary, associate and joint venture company.

M/s P. Suryanarayana & Co. earlier completed its first term as the Statutory Auditors of the Company and were re-appointed as the Statutory Auditors of the Company for another term of five years.

The Report given by Auditors on Financial Statements of the Company is part of this report. There has been no qualification, reservation, adverse remark or disclaimer given by the Auditors in their report.

We further report that:

Subsequent to the financial year ended March 31, 2026, the Company received a letter dated June 25, 2026 from the Securities and Exchange Board of India ("SEBI") in relation to non-compliance with Regulation 30(4) read with Schedule III of the SEBI (LODR) Regulations, 2015, relating to non-disclosure of material litigation. The aforesaid non-compliance, relating to the delayed disclosure, has been addressed by the Company as at the date of this Report.

We further report that:

- a) The Board of Directors of the Company is duly constituted with proper balance of Executive Directors, Non Executive Directors and Independent Directors. The changes in the composition of the Board of Directors if any that took place during the period under review were carried out in compliance with the provisions of the Act.
- b) Adequate notice is given to all directors to schedule the Board Meetings, agenda and detailed notes on agenda were sent at least seven days in advance, and a system exists for seeking and obtaining further information and clarifications on the agenda items before the meeting and for meaningful participation at the meeting.
- c) The minutes of the meetings were duly recorded and signed by the Chairman, the decisions of the Board were unanimous and no dissenting views have been recorded.
- d) There are adequate systems and processes in the company commensurate with the size and operations of the company to monitor and ensure compliance with applicable laws, rules, regulations and guidelines.
- e) We have relied on the information supplied and representation made by the Company, its officers and its Authorised Representatives for systems and mechanism followed by the Company for compliance under the applicable Acts, Laws and Regulations to the Company.

We further report that:

- ii. Additional meetings are held, when necessary. Committees of the Board meet before the Board Meeting, or whenever the need arises for transacting business.

The recommendations of the Committees are placed before the Board for necessary approval and/or noting. During the Financial Year 2025-26, 4 (Four) Board Meetings were held. The Board meetings were held on May 27, 2025, August 11, 2025, November 12, 2025 and February 13, 2026. The gap between any two consecutive Board Meetings during this period did not exceed 120 days.

The Board has a formal schedule of matters reserved for its consideration and decision. These include approving business strategy, setting performance targets, reviewing performance, approving investments, ensuring adequate availability of financial resources and reporting to the Shareholders. The Board generally meets 4 times during the year. The Directors are also given option of attending the Board Meeting through video conferencing. All relevant information as required under Schedule II of the SEBI (LODR) Regulations, 2015 was placed before the Board from time to time.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Economic Environment and Industry Insight

INDIAN ECONOMY: THE YEAR IN REVIEW

India remained the fastest-growing major economy in 2025, with a nominal GDP estimated at \$4.2 trillion. The economy remained resilient amid an evolving global environment marked by uneven growth, tight monetary conditions in advanced economies, commodity price volatility, and geopolitical developments. Against this backdrop, domestic economic activity was supported by policy continuity, stable demand, and sustained public capital expenditure.

India's GDP growth in FY 2025-26 stood at 7.6% (FY 2024-25: 7.1%), supported by government capital expenditure, private consumption, and steady performance across manufacturing and services. Inflation moderated during the year, with CPI inflation remaining broadly within the RBI's tolerance band ($\sim 4\% \pm 2\%$), aided by easing food prices. The Current Account Deficit (CAD) is expected to remain around $\sim 0.8\text{-}1.0\%$ of GDP in FY 2025-26 (FY 2024-25 $\sim 0.6\%$) with some estimates indicating a possible widening amid trade tariff pressures and the prevailing geopolitical environment.

The overall unemployment rate was estimated at 4.9% in February 2026, marginally lower than the 5.0% recorded in January 2026. The labour force participation rate (LFPR) for persons aged 15 years and above remained steady at 55.9% in February 2026, unchanged from January.

Macroeconomic Outlook for the Year Ahead

India's economic outlook for FY 2026-27 remains strong, with real GDP growth projected at approximately 6.9% and CPI inflation at around 4.6% (RBI), although the inflation outlook remains sensitive to movements in food and energy prices. Growth is expected to be driven by strong domestic demand, sustained government capital expenditure, and ongoing structural reforms.

On the sectoral front, services are expected to remain the principal growth engine, particularly across financial services and hospitality. Manufacturing is gaining momentum under initiatives such as production-linked incentives (PLI), with continued expansion in sectors including electronics, automotive, and pharmaceuticals.

Financial policy is expected to progress along the consolidation path while retaining a strong emphasis on capital expenditure. Monetary policy is likely to remain calibrated and data-dependent, with an ongoing focus on maintaining price stability.

External sector conditions will be influenced by global growth and trade developments and by crude oil prices, which could influence the current account balance and imported inflation. Services exports are expected to provide a partial offset to these pressures

Sectoral Performance

Services remained the primary driver of economic growth, expanding by 8.7% in FY 2025-26 (FY 2024-25: 7.8%) and contributing ~55-60% of GVA, reflecting the increasing importance of modern, tradable, and digitally enabled services. Financial, real estate, and professional services recorded growth by 9.9%, while trade, hotels, transport, and communication services expanded by around 10.1%.

Manufacturing is estimated to have grown by 11.5% (FY 2024-25: 9.3%), supported by policy initiatives, supply chain diversification, and steady domestic demand. Construction grew at 7.1% (FY 2024-25: 7.3%), supported by sustained infrastructure spending. Agriculture grew by 2.4% (FY 2024-25: 4.2%), aided by an above-normal monsoon and strong rabi and kharif output, which helped lower food inflation and supported rural incomes.

INDUSTRY INSIGHT

Global Hospitality and Tourism Industry

The global tourism industry reached a new post-pandemic peak in 2025, fully surpassing pre-COVID levels. According to the UNWTO Barometer (January 2026), international tourist arrivals are estimated to have reached 1.52 billion in 2025, representing a 4% increase over 2024 and reaffirming a return to long-term growth trends. Growth was supported by strong demand from large source markets, expanded air connectivity, and continued visa facilitation initiatives across destinations.

Europe remained the most visited region, accounting for about 52% of global international arrivals, with 794 million visitors. International arrivals in Europe grew by 4% Y-o-Y and marginally exceeded pre-pandemic levels.

The Americas recorded approximately 218 million international arrivals, reflecting ~1% growth over 2024 and reaching 99% of 2019 levels.

The Middle East continued to outperform pre-pandemic benchmarks, with international tourist arrivals exceeding 2019 levels by 39%, although growth over the previous year remained modest at 3%. Africa also surpassed pre-pandemic performance, registering a 17% increase over 2019 and an 8% Y-o-Y growth in arrivals during 2025.

The Asia-Pacific (APAC) region made significant progress in its recovery, recording 331 million international arrivals in 2025. The region's share of global arrivals increased to ~22%, while overall arrivals recovered to 91% of pre-pandemic levels.

In revenue terms, total export earnings from tourism, including passenger transport, are estimated to have reached a record USD 2.2 trillion in 2025, representing an approximately 5% increase from 2024. International tourism receipts also recorded extraordinary growth during the year, with several destinations reporting higher growth in receipts than in arrivals.

Indian Hospitality and Tourism Industry

The Indian travel and tourism industry remained on a positive trajectory in FY 2025-26, led by strong domestic leisure demand and improving corporate travel. Inbound travel also continued its gradual recovery, supported by better connectivity and visa facilitation. As per World Travel & Tourism Council (WTTC) Economic India Impact Report 2025, the tourism sector accounted for an estimated 9.4% of total employment in India during FY 2023-24 and contributed 6.6% to India's GDP, underlining its significant role in supporting economic growth and employment generation.

During calendar year 2025, India recorded 9.02 million foreign tourist arrivals and foreign exchange earnings of ₹27,363.8 crores. Domestic tourist visits stood at 4,132.8 million during the same period. A facilitative visa regime remains a key enabler for inbound tourism. As of December 2025, India's e-visa facility covered nationals of 172 countries, with entry permitted through 33 international airports, 16 seaports, and 2 land ports.

Performance and Outlook

Resilient leisure demand and improving corporate travel supported occupancy levels during the year, while continued supply discipline helped sustain pricing momentum across ADR and RevPAR. The sector extended the upcycle witnessed between FY 2023-24 and FY 2025-26, with occupancy, ADR and RevPAR remaining at or above pre-COVID levels. As per Horwath HTL, national occupancy stood at 64% in 2025 (2024: 63.0%), while ADR increased to ₹8,624 (+8.5% Y-o-Y) and RevPAR rose to ₹5,522 (+8.7% Y-o-Y). Looking ahead, a structural demand-supply imbalance across key markets, coupled with improving infrastructure may support sustained occupancy levels and healthy pricing, including in select Tier 2 and 3 markets, subject to macroeconomic conditions and any event-related disruptions.

Outlook for FY 2026–27

The hospitality sector is expected to remain stable in FY 2026-27, supported by domestic leisure travel and MICE demand, with room rates likely to remain firm. According to ICRA, industry revenues are projected to grow by ~7–9% Y-o-Y in FY 2026-27, with occupancy and ARR continuing to improve. Near-term performance, however, may be affected by geopolitical developments in West Asia and related aviation disruptions, which could temporarily impact select international and corporate travel corridors while keeping fuel, logistics and utility costs elevated.

Over the medium to long term, structural drivers, including rising discretionary spending, an expanding middle class and continued business travel, are expected to support industry growth. India's rising prominence in the global economy is also expected to contribute to sectoral growth by attracting higher inflows of foreign visitors, including heads of states and senior business executives.

BUSINESS REVIEW

The legacy of the business of Hotel reflects a sustained journey of committed leadership in the hospitality sector and establishing a reputation of operational discipline, service consistency, and sustained efforts to mark overall guests' satisfaction. We care to maintain mutual respect in Guest relationship compassion and humility.

The outlook for India's hospitality sector remains positive supported by sustained growth in domestic tourism in recent years. Domestic travel has emerged as stable demand for the hospitality sector. Policy measures such as GST rate rationalization, income tax reduction, and monetary easing are expected to further support discretionary consumption in the near term.

As informed during the previous meeting, the renovation of the hotel has been dependent on the disbursement of Term Loan from the bank. In the meantime, the Company started much awaited renovation of the Property and nearly completed rooms in the Fourth Floor. As the Bank is insisting for No Objection Certificate from Airports Authority of India despite there being a specific clause in this respect in the Lease Deed, the Term Loan disbursement is delayed. In the above situation, the Company decided to expedite the development of Land owned by the Company at Kakinada beach and dispose it off to prospective buyers. It is estimated that these funds will cover renovation funding requirement, without waiting for the Term Loan from the Bank. Efforts are on to secure necessary statutory approvals for this purpose to enable the Company to raise funds as above through this avenue at the earliest.

The Company believes that the ongoing renovation of the hotel, together with the addition of new guest rooms and the upgradation of existing facilities, will significantly enhance its operational capacity and overall guest experience. These initiatives are expected to improve occupancy levels, increase average room revenue, and strengthen the Company's competitive position in the hospitality sector. Upon completion of the renovation and expansion, the

Company anticipates a positive impact on its operating performance, resulting in improved revenues, enhanced operational efficiencies, and sustained profitability in the coming years. The Board is confident that these strategic investments will create long-term value for the Company and its shareholders.

Your Company's independent and robust internal audit processes provide assurance on the existence, adequacy, and effectiveness of internal controls and compliance with policies, procedures and regulatory requirements. The primary aim of the Internal Audit function is to enhance and protect organizational value and improvement of your Company's internal control systems.

Capital Allocation

SHHIL's capital allocation process is aimed at creating value by funding and allocating capital to meet its strategy. This process is based on the following plans:

1. Build a strategic reserve fund with a strong cash position to meet any contingency the Company may face.
2. Operating capital expenditure for replacement of assets, renovations and refurbishments to be in line with annual depreciation.

COMPLIANCE

SHHIL deploys a robust internal check process to prevent and limit the risk of non-compliance. The Company approaches compliance from a proactive standpoint and believes in responsive intervention. Compliance with laws and regulations is an essential part of its business operations and it adheres to all national and regional laws and regulations in such diverse areas as product safety, product claims, trademark, copyright, patents, competition, employee health and safety, the environment, corporate governance, listing and disclosure, employment and taxes. Nevertheless, it is focussing on increasing awareness, documentation and supplementing the expertise of internal professionals with that of independent consultants, as may be required from time to time.

INTERNAL CONTROL SYSTEMS AND THEIR ADEQUACY

The Company has institutionalised an adequate system of internal controls, with documented procedures covering all corporate functions and hotel operating unit. Internal controls provide reasonable assurance regarding the effectiveness and efficiency of operations, the adequacy of safeguards for assets, the reliability of financial controls, and compliance with applicable laws and regulations.

Internal controls are reviewed through the audit process, which is undertaken for operational unit and all major corporate functions under the direction of the Internal Audit. These reviews focus on:

- Identification of weaknesses and improvement areas
- Compliance with defined policies and processes
- Compliance with applicable statutes
- Safeguarding tangible and intangible assets
- Managing risk environment, including operational, financial, social and regulatory risks
- Conformity with the Code of Conduct

The Board's Audit Committee oversees the adequacy of the internal control environment through periodic reviews of audit findings as also of the resolution mechanism for critical audit issues. The statutory auditors have opined in their report that there are adequate internal controls over financial reporting.

Your Company's Audited Financial Statements are prepared in accordance with Ind AS prescribed under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, as amended. The Company reported loss amounting to Rs. 503.72 Lakhs as per Audited Financial Statements for Financial Year ended March 31, 2026. Your Company has also taken various initiatives to improve sales and optimize costs to improve profitability in the forthcoming years.

REVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE**TOTAL REVENUE**

The Total Income for FY 2025-26 is Rs. 1,491.93 Lakhs, which is lower than the previous year's total income of Rs. 1584.15 Lakhs.

EXPENDITURE

Total expenses increased from Rs. 2051.31 Lakhs to 2,062.22 Lakhs during the current year. While Total Income decreased by 5.82%, Total Expenditure increased by 0.53% which includes interest expense of Rs 440.07 lakhs on lease liability which is notional as elaborated below.

The Company executed the lease agreement with Airports Authority of India (AAI) for renewal of the leasehold rights of the land for another 30 years from the year 2023. Interest Expense on lease liability has been provided as per Ind AS 116 and the Finance Cost for the year ended 31 March 2026 of Rs. 478.55 Lakhs includes Interest expense on lease liability of INR 440.07 lakhs which is notional. It may be noted that as IND AS 116 is made applicable for the FY 2023-24 onwards.

PROFIT/ (LOSS) AFTER TAX

During the current year, the Company reported a loss of Rs. 503.72 Lakhs, as against Rs 426.58 lakhs in the previous year. It is important to note that IND AS 116, which became applicable from FY 2023-24, has impacted the financials. This accounting standard introduces a notional interest expense on lease liabilities amounting to Rs. 440.07 Lakhs for the current year which is notional.

Report on the audit of the financial statements

Opinion

1. We have audited the accompanying financial statements of M/s Sri Havisha Hospitality and Infrastructure Limited (formerly known as Shri Matre Power and Infrastructure Limited and Shri Shakti LPG Limited) ("the Company"), which comprise the balance sheet as at March 31, 2026, and the statement of Profit and Loss (including Other Comprehensive Income), statement of changes in equity, statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of material accounting policies and other explanatory information.
2. In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the aforesaid financial statements give the information required by the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, of the state of affairs of the Company as at March 31, 2026, and total comprehensive income (comprising of loss and other comprehensive expense), changes in equity and its cash flows for the year then ended.

Basis for opinion

3. We conducted our audit in accordance with the Standards on Auditing (SAs) specified under section 143(10) of the Act. Our responsibilities under those Standards are further described in the "Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements" section of our report. We are independent of the Company in accordance with the Code of Ethics issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements under the provisions of the Act and the Rules thereunder, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the Code of Ethics. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Key audit matters

4. Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were of most significance in our audit of the financial statements of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters. 5. The Company's Board of Directors is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Director's report, but does not include the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we will not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

Significant Accounting policies

Note 1:

Corporate information

Shri Havisha Hospitality and Infrastructure Limited (formerly known as Shri Matre Power and Infrastructure Limited and Shri Shakti LPG Ltd.) was in the business of LPG marketing. In the FY 2021-22, M/s Shri Shakti Resorts and Hotels Limited (Transferor Company) merged into the company vide NCLT Order, Hyderabad Bench, Telanagana dated November 16, 2021. Now the company is primarily engaged in the business of owning, operating & managing hotel. The registered office of the company is located at Venus Plaza, Adjacent to Old Airport, Begumpet, Hyderabad – 500016, Telangana State.

The financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2026 were adopted by the Board of Directors and authorized for issue on May 27, 2026.

Note 2: Summary of significant accounting policies

This note provides a list of the significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

(a) Basis for preparation

The financial statements comply in all material aspects with the Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) notified under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 (the Act) [Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015] and other relevant provisions of the Act.

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis, except for the following:

- certain financial assets and liabilities (including derivative instruments) and contingent consideration is measured at fair value
- assets held for sale – measured at fair value less cost to sell
- defined benefit plans – plan assets measured at fair value
- share-based payments.

(b) Statement of Compliance

These financial statement of the Company have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standard (Ind AS) under the historical cost convention on the accrual basis except for certain financial instruments which are measured at fair values, the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 ('the Act') (to the extent notified). The Ind AS are prescribed under Section 133 of the Act read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and relevant amendment rules issued thereafter.

(c) Use of estimates and judgement

The preparation of financial statement in conformity with Ind AS requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amount of assets and liabilities, revenues and expenses and disclosure of contingent liabilities. Such estimates and assumptions are based on management's evaluation of relevant facts and circumstances as on the date of financial statement. The actual outcome may diverge from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an on-going basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

- (i) Useful lives of property, plant and equipment - refer note no. 3
- (ii) recognition of deferred tax assets for carried forward tax losses - refer note no. 20
- (iii) Provisions and contingent liabilities : refer note no. 39

(d) Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statement of the Company are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Company operates (i.e. the "functional currency"). The financial statement are presented in Indian Rupee, the national currency of India, which is the functional currency of the Company.

(e) Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the Company expects to be entitled in exchange for transferring the goods or services to a customer i.e. on transfer of control of the goods or service to the customer. Revenue from sales of goods or rendering of services is net of Indirect taxes, returns and discounts.

a) Rooms, Food and Beverage & Banquets - Revenue is recognised at the transaction price that is allocated to the performance obligation. Revenue includes room revenue, food and beverage sale and banquet services which is recognised once the rooms are occupied, food and beverages are sold and banquet services have been provided as per the contract with the customer.

b) Space and shop rentals: Rentals basically consists of rental revenue earned from letting of spaces for retails and office at the properties. These contracts for rentals are generally of short-term in nature. Revenue is recognised in the period in which services are being rendered.

c) Other Allied services: In relation to laundry income, communication income, health club income, airport transfers income and other allied services, the revenue has been recognised by reference to the time of service rendered.

d) Interest income: Interest income from a financial asset is recognised when it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the amount of income can be measured reliably. Interest income is accrued on a time basis, by reference to the principal outstanding and at the effective interest rate applicable, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset of that asset's net carrying amount on initial recognition.

(f) Leases

The Company, at the inception of a contract, assesses whether the contract is a lease or not lease. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a time in exchange for a consideration. This policy has been applied to contracts existing and entered into on or after April 1, 2019 (standard effective date). The Company recognises a right-of-use asset and a lease liability at the later of lease commencement date or April 01, 2019. The right-of-use asset is initially measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or before the commencement date, plus any initial direct costs incurred and an estimate of costs to dismantle and remove the underlying asset or to restore the underlying asset or the site on which it is located, less any lease incentives received. The right-of-use asset is subsequently depreciated using the straight-line method from the commencement date to the end of the lease term. The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date, discounted using the Company's incremental borrowing rate. It is premeasured when there is a change in future lease payments arising from a change in an index or rate, if there is a change in the Company's estimate of the amount expected to be payable under a residual value guarantee, or if the Company changes its assessment of whether it will exercise a purchase, extension or termination option.

When the lease liability is premeasured in this way, a corresponding adjustment is made to the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset, or is recorded in profit or loss if the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset has been reduced to zero.

The Company has elected not to recognise right-of-use assets and lease liabilities for short-term leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less and leases of low-value assets. The Company recognises the lease payments associated with these leases as an expense over the lease term.

(g) Foreign currencies

Transactions in currencies other than the entity's functional currency (foreign currencies) are recognized at the rates of exchange prevailing at the date of the transaction. At the end of each reporting period, monetary items denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing at that date. Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are not retranslated. Exchange differences on monetary items are recognised in the statement of profit and loss in the period in which they arise except for exchange differences on transactions designated as fair value hedge, if any.

(h) Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying assets, which are assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale are added to the cost of those assets, until such time the assets are substantially ready for their intended use or sale.

All other borrowing costs are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they are incurred.

(i) Employee benefits

Leave Encashment : Compensatory absence which accrue to the employees which are expected to be availed or encashed within twelve months after the end of the period in which the employees render the related service are short-term in nature. These compensatory absences require measurement on an actual basis and not on actuarial basis.

Defined contribution plan : The company makes defined contribution to Provident Fund and Employee State Insurance which are recognized in the statement of Profit and Loss on accrual basis.

Defined benefit plan : The company's liability towards gratuity is determined on the basis of year end actuarial valuations applying the Projected Unit Credit Method done by an independent actuary as on the Balance sheet date.

The actuarial valuation method used by the independent actuary for measuring the liability is the projected unit credit method. Actuarial losses and gains are recognized in Other Comprehensive Income (OCI) and are not reclassified to the statement of profit and loss in any subsequent periods. Changes in the present value of the defined benefit obligation resulting from plan amendments or curtailments are recognized immediately in the statement of profit and loss as past service costs.

(j) Taxation

Income tax expense represents the sum of the tax currently payable and deferred tax.

a) Current tax: Current tax is the amount of tax payable on the taxable income for the year as determined in accordance with the applicable tax rates and the provisions of the Income Tax Act, 1961.

b) Deferred tax: Deferred tax is recognized using the balance sheet approach. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognised on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the financial statement and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit. Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognised for all taxable temporary differences. Deferred tax assets are generally recognised for all deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which those deductible temporary differences can be utilised. The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at the end of each reporting period and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits will be available to allow all or part of the asset to be utilised. Deferred tax liabilities and assets are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period in which the liability is settled or the asset realised, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period. The measurement of deferred tax liabilities and assets reflects the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Company expects, at the end of the reporting period, to recover or settle the carrying amount of its assets and liabilities.

(k) Property, Plant and Equipment

Land and buildings held for use in the production or supply of goods or services, or for administrative purposes, are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. Freehold land is carried at historical cost.

Property, plant and equipment are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, if any. The cost of property, plant and equipment comprises its purchase price/ acquisition cost, net of any trade discounts and rebates, any import duties and other taxes (other than those subsequently recoverable from the tax authorities), any directly attributable expenditure on making the asset ready for its intended use, other incidental expenses and interest on borrowings attributable to acquisition of qualifying property, plant and equipment up to the date the asset is ready for its intended use. Subsequent expenditure on property, plant and equipment after its purchase / completion is capitalised only if such expenditure results in an increase in the future benefits from such asset beyond its previously assessed standard of performance.

Depreciation on Property, plant and equipment (other than freehold land) has been provided on the straight-line method as per the useful life prescribed in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013. The estimated useful life of the tangible assets and the useful life are reviewed at the end of the each financial year and the depreciation period is revised to reflect the changed pattern, if any. An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected to arise from continued use of the asset. Any gain or loss arising on the disposal or retirement of an item of property, plant and equipment is determined as the difference between the sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognised in the statement of profit and loss.

(l) Business combinations

Business combinations of entities under common control are accounted using the “pooling of interests” method and assets and liabilities are reflected at the predecessor carrying values and the only adjustments that are made are to harmonise accounting policies. The figures for the previous periods are restated as if the business combination had occurred at the beginning of the preceding period irrespective of the actual date of the combination.

(m) Intangible assets

Intangible assets are stated at cost less accumulated amortisation and impairment. Intangible assets are amortised over their respective estimated useful lives on a straight line basis, from the date that they are available for use. The estimated useful life of an identifiable intangible asset is based on a number of factors including the effects of obsolescence, demand, competition and other economic factors (such as the stability of the industry and known technological advances) and the level of maintenance expenditures required to obtain the expected future cash flows from the asset. Estimated useful lives of the intangible assets is 6 years which contains Software. The estimated useful life of the intangible assets and the amortisation period are reviewed at the end of the each financial year and the amortisation period is revised to reflect the changed pattern, if any.

(n) Impairment of tangible and intangible assets

At the end of each reporting period, the Company reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any). Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs of disposal and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset for which the estimates of future cash flows have not been adjusted. If the recoverable amount of an asset is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset is reduced to its recoverable amount. An impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

When an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in statement of profit and loss.

(o) Inventories

Stock of food and beverages and stores and operating supplies are carried at the lower of cost (computed on a Weighted Average basis) or net realisable value. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less the estimated costs of completion and selling expenses. Cost includes the fair value of consideration paid including duties and taxes (other than those refundable), inward freight, and other expenditure directly attributable to the purchase. Trade discounts and rebates are deducted in determining the cost of purchase.

(p) Provisions and contingencies

Provisions: A provision is recognised when the Company has a present obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, in respect of which a reliable estimate can be made.

The amount recognised as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. When a provision is measured using the cash flows estimated to settle the present obligation, its carrying amount is the present value of those cash flows (when the effect of time value of money is material).

Contingent liabilities: Contingent liabilities are not recognised but are disclosed in notes to accounts.

(q) Financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instruments. Financial assets and liabilities are initially recognised at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to financial assets and liabilities [other than financial assets and liabilities measured at fair value through profit and loss (FVTPL)] are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or liabilities, as appropriate on initial recognition. Transaction costs directly attributable to acquisition of financial assets or liabilities measured at FVTPL are recognised immediately in the statement of profit and loss.

a) Non-derivative Financial assets: All regular way purchases or sales of financial assets are recognised and derecognised on a trade date basis. Regular way purchases or sales are purchases or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within the time frame established by regulation or convention in the marketplace.

All recognised financial assets are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost or fair value, depending on the classification of the financial assets

Financial assets at amortised cost

A financial asset is measured at amortised cost if both of the following conditions are met:

- a) the financial asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows and
- b) the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest (SPPI) on the principal amount outstanding.

Effective interest method:

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a debt instrument and of allocating interest income over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is that which exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the debt instrument, or, where appropriate, a shorter period, to the net carrying amount on initial recognition. Income is recognised on an effective interest basis for debt instruments other than those financial assets. Interest income is recognised in profit or loss and is included in the "Other income" line item.

b) Derecognition of financial assets: A financial asset is derecognised only when the Company:

- has transferred the rights to receive cash flows from the financial asset or
- retains the contractual rights to receive the cash flows of the financial asset, but assumes a contractual obligation to pay the cash flows to one or more recipients. When the entity has transferred an asset, the Company evaluates whether it has transferred

substantially all risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset. In such cases, the financial asset is derecognised. Where the entity has not transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset, the financial asset is not derecognised.

Where the entity has neither transferred a financial asset nor retains substantially all risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset, the financial asset is derecognised if the Company has not retained control of the financial asset. When the Company retains control of the financial asset, the asset is continued to be recognised to the extent of continuing involvement in the financial asset.

c) Foreign exchange gains and losses: The fair value of financial assets denominated in a foreign currency is determined in that foreign currency and translated at the spot rate at the end of each reporting period. For foreign currency denominated financial assets measured at amortised cost and FVTPL, the exchange differences are recognised in statement of profit and loss.

d) Financial liabilities: All financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method or at FVTPL.

Financial liabilities at FVTPL - Financial liabilities at FVTPL are stated at fair value, with any gains or losses arising on remeasurement recognised in statement of profit and loss. The net gain or loss recognised in statement of profit and loss incorporates any interest paid on the financial liability and is included in the 'Other income/Other expenses' line item.

Financial liabilities subsequently measured at amortised cost

Financial liabilities that are not held-for-trading and are not designated as at FVTPL are measured at amortised cost at the end of subsequent accounting periods. The carrying amounts of financial liabilities that are subsequently measured at amortised cost are determined based on the effective interest method.

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial liability and of allocating interest expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments through the expected life of the financial liability, or (where appropriate) a shorter period, to the net carrying amount on initial recognition.

Foreign exchange gains and losses

For financial liabilities that are denominated in a foreign currency and are measured at amortised cost at the end of each reporting period, the foreign exchange gains and losses are determined based on the amortised cost of the instruments and are recognised in the statement of profit and loss. The fair value of financial liabilities denominated in a foreign currency is determined in that foreign currency and translated at the spot rate at the end of the reporting period. For financial liabilities that are measured as at FVTPL, the foreign exchange component forms part of the fair value gains or losses and is recognised in the statement of profit and loss.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

The Company derecognises financial liabilities when, and only when, the Company's obligations are discharged, cancelled or have expired. An exchange between with a lender of debt instruments with substantially different terms is accounted for as an extinguishment of the original financial liability and the recognition of a new financial liability.

(r) Segment reporting

Operating segments are reported in a manner consistent with the internal reporting provided to the chief operating decision maker. The Company has identified the Managing Director and Joint Managing Director as chief operating decision makers.

(s) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash comprises cash on hand and demand deposits with banks. Cash equivalents are short-term balances (with an original maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition) and highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into known amounts of cash and which are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value.

(t) Earnings per share (EPS)

Basic earnings per share are computed using the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period.

Diluted EPS is computed by dividing the profit or loss attributable to ordinary equity holders by the weighted average number of equity shares considered for deriving basic EPS and also weighted average number of equity shares that could have been issued upon conversion of all dilutive potential equity shares. Dilutive potential equity shares are deemed converted as of the beginning of the period, unless issued at a later date. Dilutive potential equity shares are determined independently for each period presented. The number of equity shares and potentially dilutive equity shares are adjusted for bonus shares, as appropriate.

(u) Operating Cycle

Based on the nature of products / activities of the Company and the normal time between acquisition of assets and their realisation in cash or cash equivalents, the Company has determined its operating cycle as 12 months for the purpose of classification of its assets and liabilities as current and non-current.

When the Company, along with other aggrieved Companies and Hotels challenged the above unilateral charge before the Hon'ble Telangana High Court, the Hon'ble Court while giving a Stay directed all the aggrieved Companies and Hotels to pay 50% of the demand amount, which is equivalent to ₹ 99.91 lakhs in our case. The Final order is yet to be passed by the Hon'ble Telangana High Court and the matter is currently sub-judice. Pending final adjudication, the said amount has been disclosed under "Other non-current assets", and no provision has been made in the books. The management, based on legal opinion, believes that it has a strong case and the likelihood of liability crystallizing is remote.

Note 39 (iii) : During the financial year 2025-26, the Customs, Excise and Service Tax Appellate Tribunal (CESTAT), Hyderabad, vide Final Order No. A/30095/2026 dated February 25, 2026, ruled in favor of the Company by setting aside the confiscation of capital goods and the associated penalties. Regarding the differential customs duty demand of ₹1,08,68,097/-, the Tribunal set aside the demand and remanded the matter back to the Adjudicating Authority for fresh re-computation. Since the original demand order no longer subsists and has been legally struck down pending fresh quantification, the company has reviewed its risk exposure. Consequently, the contingent liability of ₹352.77 Lakhs previously carried under 'Customs Duty with Excise Department' has been removed from the contingent liabilities schedule as of March 31, 2026.

Note No. 44**Capital and Financial risk management objectives and policies****(a) Risk management framework**

Company is being driven by the market forces, its businesses are subject to several risks and uncertainties including financial risks. The Company's documented risk management policies act as an effective tool in mitigating the various financial risks to which the business is exposed to, in the course of their daily operations.

The risk management policies cover areas around all identified business risks including commodity price risk, foreign exchange risk etc., Risks are identified through a formal risk management programme with active involvement of senior management personnel and business managers. The Company has in place risk management processes in line with the Company's policy. Each significant risk has an owner, who coordinates the risk management process.

The risk management framework aims to:

- Better understand our risk profile;
- Understand and better manage the uncertainties which impact our performance;
- Contribute to safeguarding Company value and interest of various stakeholders;
- Ensure that sound business opportunities are identified and pursued without exposing the business to an unacceptable level of risk;
- Improve compliance with good corporate governance guidelines and practices as well as laws & regulations; and
- Improve financial returns

Treasury management

The Company's treasury function provides services to the business, co-ordinates access to domestic financial markets, monitors and manages the financial risks relating to the operations of the Company through internal risk reports which analyse exposures by degree and magnitude of risks. These risks include credit risk and liquidity risk.

Treasury management focuses on capital protection, liquidity maintenance and yield maximization. The treasury operates as per the delegation of authority from the Board. Day-to-day treasury operations are managed by Company's finance team. Long-term fund raising including strategic treasury initiatives are handled by a Treasury team. The Company has a strong system of internal control which enables effective monitoring of adherence to Company's policies.

(i) Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that the counter party will not meet its obligation under a financial instrument, leading to a financial loss. The Company is exposed to credit risk from its operating activities (primarily trade receivables) and from its financing activities, including deposits with banks and other financial instruments. The carrying amount of trade receivables, advances, deposits, cash and bank balances, bank deposits and interest receivable on deposits represents company's maximum exposure to the credit risk.

Credit risk from balances with banks is managed by the Company's treasury department in accordance with Company's policy. No other financial asset carry a significant exposure with respect to the credit risk. Bank deposits and cash balances are placed with reputable banks and deposits are with reputable government, public bodies and others. Since company operates on business model of primarily cash and carry, credit risk from receivable perspective is insignificant.

(ii) Liquidity Risk

The Company requires funds both for short-term operational needs as well as for long-term investment programmes mainly in growth projects. The Company generates sufficient cash flows from the current operations which together with the available cash and cash equivalents and short-term investments provide liquidity both in the short-term as well as in the long-term.

The Company remains committed to maintaining a healthy liquidity, gearing ratio, deleveraging and strengthening balance sheet. The maturity profile of the Company's financial liabilities based on the remaining period from the date of balance sheet to the contractual maturity date is given in the table below. The figures reflect the contractual undiscounted cash obligation of the Company.

The Company has hypothecated its trade receivables, inventory, advances and other current assets in order to fulfil the collateral requirements for the financial facilities in place. There are no other significant terms and conditions associated with the use of collateral.
