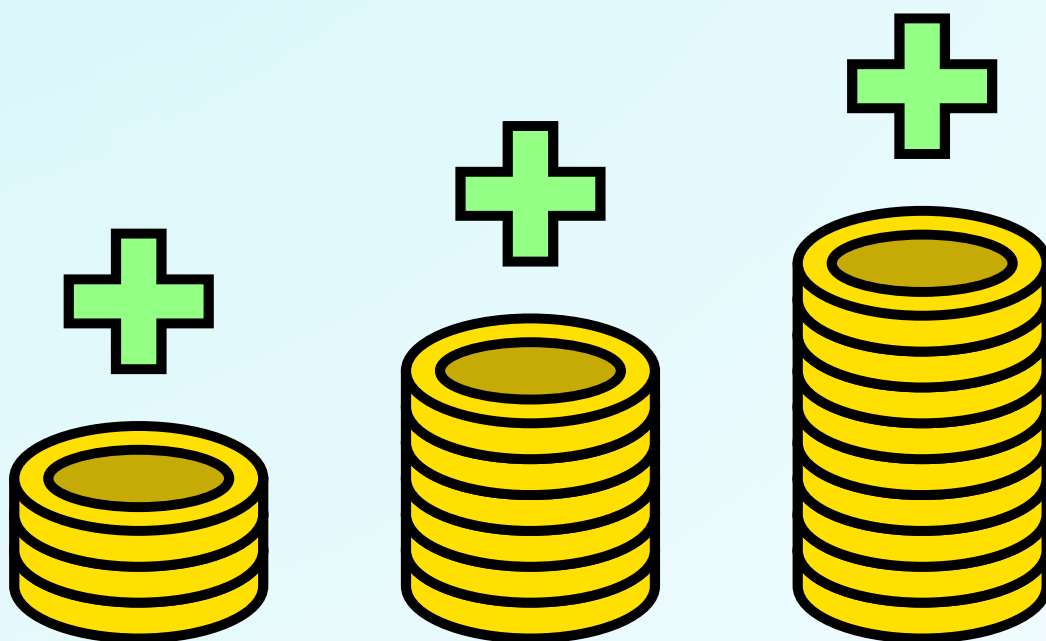

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DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Your Directors are pleased to present the 74th Annual Report of Esaar (India) Ltd together with Director's Report, Audited Financial Statements and Auditors' Report for the Financial Year ended March 31, 2026.

1. FINANCIAL RESULTS

Your Company's financial performance during the Financial Year 2025-26 is summarized below:

2. RESULTS OF OPERATIONS

During the year under review, your Company has generated a revenue of Rs. 4070.88 lakhs as compared to Rs. 1476.84 lakhs in the previous year. Further, the Company has earned a Net Profit of Rs. 1113.69 lakhs as against the Net Loss of Rs. 224.40 lakhs in the previous year.

3. CHANGE IN THE NATURE OF THE BUSINESS

There was no change in the nature of business of the Company for the year under review. Further, information on the business overview and outlook and state of the affairs of the Bank is covered under the Management Discussion & Analysis section of the Annual Report.

4. CHANGE IN THE NAME OF THE COMPANY

During the year under review, there was no change in the name of the Company.

5. MATERIAL CHANGES OR COMMITMENTS

During the year, the open offer was made by M/s. Prabhat Capital Investments Limited (“Acquirer”) for the acquisition of upto 53,15,050 (Fifty Three Lakhs Fifteen Thousand and Fifty Only) fully paid-up equity shares of the face value of ₹10/- each, representing upto 26% (Twenty Six Percent) of the Voting Share Capital of Esaar (India) Ltd (the “Target Company”) at an offer price of ₹ 8/- (Rupees Eight Only) per Equity Share, from the Public Shareholders by the acquirer for the purpose of (“Offer” or “Open Offer”).

6. CHANGE IN SHARE CAPITAL

During the Financial Year under review, the Authorized Share Capital of the Company was increased from Rs.61,50,00,000 to Rs.81,50,00,000 pursuant to the approval of the Members of the Company at the Extraordinary General Meeting] held on March 23, 2026. Consequent to the aforesaid increase, the Authorized Share Capital of the Company stands at Rs. 81,50,00,000, comprising 8,15,00,000 Equity Shares of Rs.10 each.

7. TRANSFER TO RESERVE AND SURPLUS

Your Company decided not to transfer any amount to the Reserves for the year ended March 31, 2026.

8. DIVIDEND

With a view to strengthening the financial position of the Company, your Board has not recommended any dividend on shares for the FY 2025-26.

9. TRANSFER TO THE INVESTOR EDUCATION AND PROTECTION FUND

The Company does not have any funds lying unpaid or unclaimed for a period of seven years. Therefore, there were no funds which were required to be transferred to Investor Education and Protection Fund (IEPF).

10. PUBLIC DEPOSITS

Your Company has been registered as a NBFC in terms of the provisions of Non-Banking Financial (Non-Deposit Accepting or Holding) Companies Prudential Norms (Reserve Bank) Directions, 2007. Your Company is categorized as Non-Deposit taking Non-Banking Financial Company. The Company has not accepted/invited any deposits during the year from the public falling within the ambit of Chapter V of the Companies Act, 2013 and the Companies (Acceptance of Deposits) Rules, 2014.

11. BUY-BACK / SWEAT EQUITY / BONUS SHARES / EMPLOYEE STOCK OPTIONS

During the year, the Company has neither issued any shares including sweat equity, employee stock options or bonus shares nor has bought back its shares.

12. ISSUE OF DEBENTURES, BONDS OR ANY NON-CONVERTIBLE SECURITIES

The Company has not issued any Debentures, Bonds or Non-Convertible Securities.

13. ISSUE OF CONVERTIBLE WARRANTS ON PREFERENTIAL BASIS

The Company has not issued any convertible warrants during the year.

16. INTERNAL AUDITOR

The Company has appointed M/s. Rao & Shyam, Chartered Accountants (Firm Registration No. 006186S) as the Internal Auditor of the Company for the FY 2024-26.

17. STATUTORY AUDIT REPORT

The Auditors' Report on the financial statement for the current year is self-explanatory, therefore does not require any further explanation. The Company has already submitted declaration pursuant to Regulation 33(3)(d) of SEBI (Listing Obligation and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, ("SEBI LODR") to the Stock Exchange.

18. COST AUDITOR REPORT AND COST RECORD

The Directors state that Section 148(1) of the Companies Act, 2013 is not applicable to the Company.

19. SECRETARIAL AUDITOR AND SECRETARIAL AUDIT REPORT

M/s. Shekhawat & Associates, Practicing Company Secretaries (Membership No: A34214; CP No. 12724), were appointed as the Secretarial Auditor to conduct the Secretarial Audit of the Company for the FY 2025-26, pursuant to Section 204 of the Companies Act, 2013, and rules

made there under. The Secretarial Audit Report for the FY 2025-26 forms part of the Annual Report. The Secretarial Audit report for the current year is self-explanatory, therefore does not require any further explanation.

As on March 31, 2026, the Company has Five (5) Directors consisting of –

One (1) Whole-Time Director, One (1) Director and Three (3) Non- Executive Independent Directors.

i. Independent Director:

Mr. Vaibhav Shastri has been re-appointed as an Independent Director of the Company at the Extra-Ordinary General Meeting of the Company held on March 23, 2026 to hold office for a second term of 5 (five) consecutive years on the Board of the Company.

ii. Executive Director/Whole-time Director:

Pursuant to the recommendations of the Nomination and Remuneration Committee, Mr. Shivanshu Pandey was appointed as Additional Director of the Company in the Board Meeting held on December 23, 2025 and has been regularized in the Extra Ordinary General Meeting held on March 23, 2026.

iii. Women Director:

Your Company's Board is represented by One (1) Woman Director, Ms. Dipti Shashank Yelve.

iv. Directors Retiring by Rotation:

In accordance with the provisions of Section 152(6) of the Companies Act, 2013 and the Company's Articles of Association, Mr. Bipin D Varma (DIN: 05353685), Director of the Company, retires by rotation at the forthcoming 74th Annual General Meeting and being eligible has offered himself for re-appointment.

v. Key Managerial Personnel:

During the FY 2025-26, Mr. Mithlesh Kumar Ayodhya Prasad Jaiswal resigned from the post of Chief Financial Officer of the Company with effect from June 30, 2025.

Company in its Board meeting held on June 10, 2026 approved the issuance of equity shares on a rights basis for an amount not exceeding 6000 lakhs ("Rights Equity Shares", and such issue, the "Rights Issue" or "Issue"), in accordance with the Companies Act, 2013, as amended and the rules made thereunder, Securities and Exchange Board of India (Issue of Capital and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2018 as amended and other applicable laws.

44. MATERIAL DEVELOPMENTS DURING THE FINANCIAL YEAR

During the Financial Year, M/s. Prabhat Capital Investments Limited ("Acquirer") entered into a Share Purchase Agreement ("SPA") with Mr. Dheeraj Shah, the promoter of the Company dated February 14, 2025. The Acquirer has agreed to purchase 6,34,688 Equity Shares representing 3.10% of the Voting Share Capital ("Sale Shares"), from the Promoter at Rs.5/- (Rupees Five Only) per Equity Share.

Pursuant to the Share Purchase Agreement ("SPA"), the Acquirer issued a Public Announcement ("PA") to the Public Shareholders of our Company for the acquisition of upto 53,15,050 (Fifty-Three Lakhs Fifteen Thousand and Fifty Only) fully paid-up equity shares of the face value of Rs. 10/- each ("Equity Shares") at an offer price of Rs. 8/- (Rupees Eight Only) per Equity Share, representing upto 26% (Twenty-Six Percent) of the Voting Share Capital of the Company.

The Open Offer process was completed in accordance with the applicable provisions of the SEBI SAST Regulations and other applicable laws. The requisite post-offer formalities have also been completed by the Acquirer/Company, as applicable.

During the year, an Extra Ordinary General Meeting of the Members of the Company was held on Monday, March 23, 2026.

3. *Mr. Mithlesh Kumar Ayodhya Prasad Jaiswal resigned as CFO w.e.f. June 30, 2025. As per Section 203(4) of the Companies Act, 2013 and Regulation 26A of SEBI (LODR) Regulations, 2015, the vacancy was required to be filled within six and three months respectively. Mr. Dipesh Bharatbhai Mistri was appointed as CFO only on June 10, 2026, due to delay in finalizing a suitable candidate, resulting in non-compliance under both provisions.*
4. *The Statutory Auditor of the Company resigned on August 11, 2025 during the financial year without issuance of the limited review/audit reports for the quarter ended June 30, 2025, resulting in non-compliance with Paragraph 6.1 of Section V-D of Chapter V of the SEBI Master Circular for Listed Entities. A new Statutory Auditor was subsequently appointed by the Company with effect from August 23, 2025.*

I further report that:

The Compliance by the Company of applicable financial laws, like direct and indirect tax laws, has not been reviewed in this Audit since the same have been subject to review by statutory financial auditor and other designated professionals.

As informed by the company the industry specific laws/general laws as applicable to the company has been complied with. The management has also represented and confirmed that all the laws, rules, regulations, orders, standards and guidelines as are specifically applicable to the Company relating to RBI, Industry/Labour etc., have been complied with.

The Board of Directors of the Company is duly constituted with proper balance of Executive Directors, Non-Executive Directors and Independent Directors. The changes if any in the composition of the Board of Directors that took place during the period under review were carried out in compliance with the provisions of the Act.

□ Adequate notice is given to all directors to schedule the Board Meetings, agenda and detailed notes on agenda were generally sent in advance, and a system exists for seeking and obtaining further information and clarifications on the agenda items before the meeting and for meaningful participation at the meeting.

- During the year under review, an Open Offer was made by M/s. Prabhat Capital Investments Limited under the provisions of the SEBI (Substantial Acquisition of Shares and Takeovers) Regulations, 2011 to acquire up to 53,15,050 equity shares representing 26% of the voting share capital of the Company. Pursuant to the Open Offer, 8,56,854 equity shares representing 4.19% of the voting share capital of the Company were validly tendered and accepted.
- The Company has proposed to increase the Authorised Share Capital from Rs. 61,50,00,000/- (Rupees Sixty-one Crore Fifty Lakhs Only) to Rs. 81,50,00,000 (Rupees Eighty-One Crore Fifty Lakhs Only) by creating additional share capital of Rs. 20,00,00,000/- (Rupees Twenty Crore Only). Report on the Audit of Financial Statements Opinion

1. We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Essar (India) Limited ("the Company") which comprise the Balance Sheet as at 31st March, 2026 the Statement of Profit and Loss (including Other Comprehensive Income), Statement of Changes in Equity and the Cash Flow Statement for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements including a summary of the material accounting policies and other explanatory information.
2. In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the accompanying financial statements give the information required by the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act"), in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with Indian Accounting Standards prescribed under section 133 of the Act read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules 2015, as amended, ("Ind AS") read with note of Emphasis of Matter below and other accounting principles generally accepted in India of the state of affairs of the Company as at 31st March, 2026, its Net Profit, total comprehensive income, changes in equity and its Cash Flows for the year ended on that date.

Basis for Opinion

3. We conducted our audit in accordance with the Standards on Auditing (SAs) specified under section 143(10) of the Act. Our responsibilities under those Standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Company in accordance with the Code of Ethics issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements under the provisions of the Act and the Rules thereunder, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the Code of Ethics. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Emphasis of Matter

4. Due to substantial increase in the volume of transactions in Shares the management has decided from the current year to show the Income from Share Trading as Net gain /(Loss) on Trading of shares in the Statement of Profit & Loss and the closing stock of such shares will be classified under the head Inventories. Our opinion is not modified in respect of the above matter.

Key Audit Matters

5. Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were of most significance in our audit of the financial statements of the current year. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters.

Key Audit Matter	How our audit addressed the key audit matter
<u>1) Impairment of financial assets (expected credit losses) :-</u> Ind AS 109 requires the Company to recognize impairment loss allowance towards its financial assets (designated at amortised cost and fair value through other comprehensive income) using the expected credit loss (ECL) approach. Such ECL allowance is required to be measured considering the guiding principles of Ins AS 109 including :- Unbiased , probability weighted outcome under various scenarios; Time value of money; Impact arising from forward looking macro-economic factors and; Availability of reasonable and supportable information without undue costs; Applying these principles involves significant estimation in various aspects , such as; Grouping of borrowers based on homogeneity by using appropriate statistical techniques; Staging of loans and estimation of behavioural life; Determining macro-economic factors impacting credit quality of receivables; Estimation of losses for loan products with no/minimal historical defaults. Considering the significance of such allowance to the overall financial statements and the degree of estimation involved in computation of expected credit losses, this area is considered as a key audit matter.	We assessed the Company's accounting policies for impairment of financial assets and their compliance with Ind AS 109 . We tested the criteria for staging of loans on their past due status to check compliance with requirements of Ind AS 109. Tested a sample of performing (Stage 1) loans to assess whether any loss indicators were present requiring them to be classified under stage 2 or 3 and vice versa. We have evaluated the reasonableness of the Management estimates by understanding the process of ECL estimation and tested the controls around data extraction and validation Tested the ECL model, including assumptions and underlying computation. Assessed the floor/minimum rates of provisioning applied by the Company for loan products with inadequate historical defaults Audited disclosure included in the Ind AS financial statements in respect of expected credit losses.

6. The Company's Board of Directors is responsible for the matters stated in section 134(5) of the Act with respect to the preparation of these financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position and financial performance and cash flows of the company in accordance with the Accounting principles generally accepted in India, including the Accounting Standards specified under section 133 of the Act, read with Rule 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules 2014. This responsibility also includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Act for safeguarding the assets of the company and for preventing & detecting fraud & other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial control, that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation

of the financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so. The Board of Directors are also responsible for overseeing the company's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibility for the Audit of the Financial Statements

7. 1 Corporate Information

Esaar India Limited ('The Company'), Incorporated In India, Is A Public Limited Company, Headquartered In Mumbai. The Company is A Non - Banking Financial Company ('NBFC') Engaged in Providing Asset Finance. The Company Is Registered As A Non Systemically Non Important Non Deposit Accepting NBFC As Defined Under Section 45-IA Of The Reserve Bank Of India ('RBI') Act, 1934 With Effect From 4 September 1998. The Equity Shares Of The Company Are Listed On The Bombay Stock Exchange ("BSE") In India.

The Company's registered office is at Shop no.06, Prathamesh Avenue, Datta Mandir Road, Malad East, Mumbai-400097, Maharashtra, India. The Company's corporate office is at 101, 1st Floor, Western Edge I, Western Express highway, Borivali (East) Mumbai 400066, Maharashtra, India.

2 Summary of Material Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of preparation and Presentation

The Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) as per the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 as amended from time to time and notified under section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 (the Act) along with other relevant provisions of the Act, the guidelines issued by the RBI, wherever applicable and notification for Implementation of Indian Accounting Standard vide circular RBI/2019-20/170 DOR (NBFC).CC.PD.No.109/22.10.106/2019-20 dated March 13, 2020 ("RBI Notification") issued by RBI as applicable to NBFC. The Company uses accrual basis of accounting except in case of significant uncertainties. Any application guidance/clarifications/directions issued by RBI or other regulators are implemented as and when they are issued/applicable.

The Balance Sheet and the Statement of Profit and Loss are prepared and presented in the format prescribed in the Division III to Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") applicable for Non-Banking Finance Companies ("NBFC").

(b) Basis of Measurement

The Ind AS Financial Statements have been prepared as a going concern on historical cost basis using Indian Rupees as its functional and reporting currency, which is depicted as "Rs" or "INR". The Management has followed the going concern as it is satisfied that the Company shall be able to continue its business for the foreseeable future and no material uncertainty exists that may cast significant doubt on the going concern assumption. In making this assessment, the Management has considered a wide range of information relating to present and future conditions, including future projections of profitability, cash flows and capital resources.

(c) Property, Plant & Equipment

Property, Plant & Equipment are carried at historical cost of acquisition less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, consistent with the criteria specified in Ind AS 16 "Property, Plant & Equipment".

(d) Depreciation

The Company has provided for depreciation using the written down value method over the estimated useful life of the assets as prescribed under part C of Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013 as per the useful life specified therein.

(e) Investments and Other financial assets

Financial assets and liabilities are recognised when the company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instruments.

(f) Financial Assets

1) Initial recognition:

(a) those measured at amortised cost

(b) those to be measured subsequently at fair value through Statement of Profit & Loss.

The classification depends on the entity's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual terms of cash flows. For assets measured at fair value, gains and losses will either be recorded in profit or loss or other comprehensive income as the case may be.

2) Measurement:

All financial assets are initially recognised at fair value. Transaction costs of acquisition of financial assets carried at fair value through profit and loss are expensed in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Amortised cost: Assets that are held for collection of contractual cash flows where those cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest are measured subsequently at amortised cost. Interest income from these financial assets is included in Other income using the effective interest rate method.

3) Impairment of Financial Assets

In accordance with Ind-AS 109, the company uses "Expected Credit Losses (ECL)" model, for evaluating impairment of Financial Assets other than those measured at Fair Value Through Profit and Loss (FVTPL).

Expected credit losses are measured through as loss allowance at an amount equal to:

The company follows a staging methodology for ECL Computation. Financial assets where no significant increase in credit risk has been observed are considered to be in 'stage 1' and for which a 12-month ECL is recognized. Financial assets that are considered to have significant increase in credit risk are considered to be in 'stage 2' and those which are in default or for which there is an objective evidence of impairment are considered to be in 'stage 3'. Lifetime ECL is recognized for stage 2 and stage 3 financial assets.

At initial recognition, allowance (or provision in the case of loan commitments) is required for ECL towards default events that are possible in the next 12 months, or less, where the remaining life is less than 12 months.

In the event of a significant increase in credit risk, allowance (or provision) is required for ECL towards all possible default events over the expected life of the financial instrument ('lifetime ECL').

Financial assets (and the related impairment loss allowances) are written off in full, when there is no realistic Prospect of recovery.

Treatment of the different stages of financial assets and the methodology of determination of ECL

(a) Credit impaired (stage 3)

The Company recognizes a financial asset to be credit impaired and in stage 3 by considering relevant objective evidence, primarily whether:

- i) Contractual payments of either principal or interest are past due for more than 90 days.
- ii) The loan is otherwise considered to be in default.

Restructured loans, where repayment terms are renegotiated as compared to the original contracted terms due to significant credit distress of the borrower, are classified as credit impaired. Such loans continue to be in stage 3 until they exhibit regular payment of renegotiated principal and interest over a minimum observation period, typically 12 months – post renegotiation, and there are no other indicators of impairment. Having satisfied the conditions of timely payment over the observation period these loans could be transferred to stage 1 or 2 and a fresh assessment of the risk of default is done for such loans.

Interest income is recognized by applying the EIR to the net amortized cost amount i.e., gross carrying amount less ECL allowance.

b) Significant increase in credit risk (stage 2)

An assessment of whether credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition is performed at each reporting period by considering the change in the risk of default of the loan exposure. However, unless identified at an earlier stage, 30 days past due is considered as an indication of financial assets to have suffered a significant increase in credit risk. Based on other indications such as borrower's frequently delaying payments beyond due dates though not 30 days past due are included in stage 2 for mortgage loans.

The measurement of risk of defaults under stage 2 is computed on homogenous portfolios, generally by nature of loans, tenors, underlying collateral, geographies and borrower profiles. The default risk is assessed using PD (probability of default) derived from past behavioral trends of default across the identified homogenous portfolios. These past trends factor in the past customer behavioral trends, credit transition probabilities and macroeconomic conditions. The assessed PDs are then aligned considering future economic conditions that are determined to have a bearing on ECL.

(c) Without significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition (stage 1)

ECL resulting from default events that are possible in the next 12 months are recognized for financial instruments in stage 1. The Company has ascertained default possibilities on past behavioral trends witnessed for each homogenous portfolio using application/behavioral score cards and other performance indicators, determined statistically.

(d) Measurement of ECL

The assessment of credit risk and estimation of ECL are unbiased and probability weighted. It incorporates all information that is relevant including information about past events, current conditions and reasonable forecasts of future events and economic conditions at the reporting date. In addition, the estimation of ECL takes into account the time value of money. Forward looking economic scenarios determined with reference to external forecasts of economic parameters that have demonstrated a linkage to the performance of our portfolios over a period of time have been applied to determine impact of macro-economic factors.

The Company has calculated ECL using three main components: Exposure at Default (EAD), Probability of Default (PD), Loss Given Default (LGD)

(g) Financial liabilities

1) Initial recognition and measurement

The Company classifies all financial liabilities as subsequently measured at amortised cost, except for financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss. Such liabilities, including derivatives that are liabilities, shall be subsequently measured at fair value.

2) Subsequent measurement

Financial liabilities are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method. For trade and other payables maturing within one year from the balance sheet date, the carrying amounts approximate fair value due to the short maturity of these instruments.

3) Derecognition of Financial Instruments:

The company derecognises a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the Financial Asset expire or it transfers the Financial Asset and the transfer qualifies for derecognition under Ind AS 109. A Financial Liability (or part of Financial Liability) is derecognised from the Company's Balance Sheet when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged or cancelled or expires.

Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offsetted and the net amount is reported in the balance sheet if there is a currently enforceable legal right to offset the recognized amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis, to realize the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

(h) Fair Value Measurement of Financial Instruments

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either:

- In the principal market for the asset or liability, or
- In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability. The principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible by the Company.

The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their economic best interest.

A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use.

The Company uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximizing the use of relevant observable inputs and minimizing the use of unobservable inputs. All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorized within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

Level 1 – Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities

Level 2 – Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is directly or indirectly observable.

Level 3 – Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable. For assets and liabilities that are recognized in the financial statements on a recurring basis, the Company determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by re-assessing categorization (based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole) at the end of each reporting year.

(i) Revenue Recognition

Interest income from a financial asset is recognized when it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the company and the amount of income can be measured reliably. Sale of shares and securities is accounted on execution of contract notes.

Dividend income on equity shares is recognized when the Company's right to receive the payment is established, which is generally when shareholders approve the dividend. Dividends on trading inventory are recognized as operating income, while dividends on investment are classified as "Other income".

(j) Cash, cash equivalents and other bank deposits

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand and other short term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months

or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Bank deposits with maturity exceeding three months are disclosed in "Bank balance other than above" i.e. other than cash and cash equivalents.

(k) Inventories

Inventories comprise of Shares and are valued at fair value as per Ind AS 109 "Financial Instruments". Cost for the purpose of closing stock valuation has been taken as per the closing Market Value of the respective scrip.

(l) Employee Benefits

Employee benefits are provided in the books in the following manner:

Defined Contribution Plans : Company's contributions paid/ payable during the year to provident fund is recognised in the Statement of Profit & Loss.

Defined Benefit Plans: The company's liabilities towards gratuity and leave encashment, a defined benefit obligation, has been made on the basis of actual amount due as against the past practice of actuarial valuation due to insignificant number of employees.

(m) Direct Taxes

Current Tax

Income tax expense represents the sum of current tax and deferred tax and includes any adjustments related to past periods in current and /or deferred tax adjustments that may become necessary due to certain developments or reviews during the relevant year. Current income tax is based on the taxable income and calculated using the applicable tax rates.

Current tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities, in accordance with the Income Tax Act, 1961 and the Income Computation and Disclosure Standards (ICDS) prescribed therein. The tax rates and tax law used to compute the amounts are those that are enacted or substantively enacted, at the reporting date.

Advance taxes and provisions for current income taxes are presented in the balance sheet after off-setting advance tax paid and income tax provision.

Deferred Tax

Deferred income tax is provided, using the liability method, on all temporary difference at the balance sheet date between the tax bases of asset and the carrying amount liabilities used in the computation of taxable profit and their carrying amounts in the financial statements for financial reporting purposes.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognized for all taxable temporary differences and deferred tax assets are recognized for deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which the deductible temporary differences can be utilized.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax asset to be utilized. Unrecognized deferred tax assets, if any, are reassessed at each reporting date and are recognized to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profits will allow the deferred tax asset to be recovered.

Deferred tax asset and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the year when the asset is realized or the liability is settled, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax relating to items recognized outside the Statement of Profit and Loss is recognized either in OCI or in Other Equity.

Deferred tax asset and deferred tax liabilities are offset if a legally enforceable right exists to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities.

(n) Contingent Liabilities & Assets

A contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events whose existence will be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the Company or a present obligation that is not recognized because it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation. A contingent liability also arises in extremely rare cases where there is a liability that cannot be recognized because it cannot be measured reliably. The Company does not recognize a contingent liability but discloses its existence in the financial statements.

Contingent assets are neither recognized nor disclosed.

(o) Earning per share (EPS)

The Company report basic and diluted earnings per share in accordance with Ind AS 33 "Earning per Share". The Basic EPS is computed by dividing the profit after taxes by the weighted number of equity shares outstanding during the accounting period. The diluted EPS is computed using the weighted average number of the aggregate of equity shares outstanding at the end of the year and those that may be possible issued in the near future.

(p) Provisions

A provision is recognized when the Company has a present obligation Legal or Constructive that is reasonably estimatable and it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation. These estimates are reviewed at each Balance Sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

If the effect of the time value of money is material, provisions are discounted using a current pre-tax rate that reflects, when appropriate, the risks specific to the liability. When discounting is used, the increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognized as a finance cost.

(q) Provision for Doubtful Debts and Written-off of bad debts

Provision are recognized when the Company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that the Company will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. The amount recognized as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. When provision is measured using the cash flow estimated to settle the present obligation, its carrying amount is the present value of these cashflows (when the effect of the time value of money is material).

Debts specifically considered fully or partially irrecoverable are written-off and provision against sub-standard and doubtful asset is

made in accordance with the guidelines issued by RBI under the Non-Systemically Important Non-Banking Financial (Non-Deposit

Accepting or Holding) Companies Prudential Norms (Reserve Bank) Directions, 2015. Sums recovered against debts earlier written off

and provision no longer considered necessary in the context of the current status of the borrower are written back.

r) Collateral Repossessed

Based on operational requirements, the Company's policy is to determine whether a repossessed asset can be best used for its internal operations or should be sold. Assets determined to be useful for the internal operations are transferred to their relevant asset category for capitalization at their fair market value.

In the normal course of business, the Company does not physically repossess assets/properties in its loan portfolio, but engages external agents to repossess and recover funds, to settle outstanding debt. Any surplus funds are returned to the customers/obligors. Financial assets held as collaterals are shown as current assets as well as current liabilities.

s) Write-Offs

The gross carrying amount of a financial asset is written off when there is no realistic prospect of further recovery. This is generally the case when the Company determines that the debtor/borrower does not have assets or sources of income that could generate sufficient cash flows to repay the amounts subject to the write-off. However, financial assets that are written off could still be subject to enforcement activities under the Company's recovery procedures, taking into account legal advice where appropriate. Any recoveries made from written off assets are netted off against the amount of financial assets written off during the year under bad debts and write offs forming part of impairment on financial instruments in statement of profit and loss.

t) Finance Cost

Finance costs include interest expense computed by applying the effective interest rate on respective financial instruments measured at amortized cost. Financial instruments include bank/FI borrowings, broker facilities to the extent they are regarded as an adjustment to the interest cost. Finance costs are charged to the statement of profit and loss.

3 Use of Judgment's, Estimates and Assumptions

The Preparation of Company's financial Statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of revenue, expenses, assets and liabilities and the accompanying disclosures. Uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustments to the carrying amount of assets or liabilities affected in next financial years.

a. Determination of the estimated useful lives of Property, Plant and Equipment and Intangible Assets:

Estimates are involved in determining the cost attributable to bringing the assets to the location and condition necessary for it to be

b. Provisions:

Provisions and liabilities are recognized in the period when it becomes probable that there will be a future outflow of funds resulting from past operations or events and the amount of cash outflow can be reliably estimated. The timing of recognition and quantification of the liability requires the application of judgements to existing facts and circumstances, which can be subject to change. The carrying amount of provisions and liabilities are reviewed regularly and revised to take account of changing facts and circumstances..

c. Current versus non-current classification:

All the assets and liabilities have been classified as current or non-current as per the company's normal operating cycle of twelve months and other criteria set out in Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013.

d. Impairment of financial assets:

The impairment provisions for financial assets are based on assumptions about risk of default and expected cash loss rates. The Company uses judgement in making these assumptions and selecting the inputs to the impairment calculation, based on Company's past history,

e. Impairment of non-financial assets:

The impairment provisions for financial assets are based on assumptions about risk of default and expected cash loss rates. The Company uses judgement in making these assumptions and selecting the inputs to the impairment calculation, based on Company's past history, existing market conditions as well as forward looking estimates at the end of each reporting period. The impairment provision for of non-financial assets company estimates asset's recoverable amount, which is higher of an asset's or Cash Generating Units (CGU's) fair value less costs of disposal and its value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset. In determining fair value less costs of disposal, recent market transactions are taken into account, if no such transactions can be identified, an appropriate evaluation model is used.

f. Effective Interest Rate (EIR) Method:

The company recognize interest income/ expense using a rate of return that represents the best estimate of a constant rate of return over the expected life of the loans given / taken. This estimation, by nature, requires an element of judgment regarding the expected behavior and life-cycle of the instruments, as well as expected changes to other fee income/expense that are integral parts of the instrument.

g. Recognition of Deferred Tax Assets and Liabilities:

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognised for deductible temporary differences and unused tax losses for which there is probability of utilisation against the future taxable profit. The Company uses judgement to determine the amount of deferred tax that can be recognised, based upon the likely timing and the level of future taxable profits and business developments.

h. Recent pronouncements

Ministry of Corporate Affairs (“MCA”) notifies new standards or amendments to the existing standards under Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules as issued from time to time. For the year ended 31st March, 2025, MCA has notified Ind AS – 117 Insurance Contracts and amendments to Ind AS 116 – Leases, relating to sale and leaseback transactions, applicable to the Company w.e.f. April 1, 2024. The Company has reviewed the new pronouncements and based on its evaluation has determined that it does not have any significant impact in its financial statements.

i. Recent pronouncements

Ministry of Corporate Affairs (“MCA”) notifies new standards or amendments to the existing standards under Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules as issued from time to time. In May 2025, MCA notified amendments to Ind AS 21 - The Effects of Changes in Foreign Exchange Rates, applicable w.e.f. April 1, 2025. The Company has reviewed the amendment and based on its evaluation has determined that it does not have any significant impact in its financial statements.

In August 2025, MCA notified the following amendments to:

Ind AS 1, Presentation of Financial Statements, applicable w.e.f. April 1, 2025 – The amendment relates to classification of liabilities as current or non-current and non-current liabilities with covenants. In the context of classifying a liability as current, it removes the requirement of existence of a right to defer settlement for at least 12 months after the reporting date and instead requires that the said right should exist on the reporting date and have substance. The amendment also introduces guidance on classification of liabilities with covenants. The Company has no impact of these amendments in its classification criteria of current and non-current liabilities.

Ind AS 7, Statement of Cash Flows and Ind AS 107, Financial Instruments: Disclosures, applicable w.e.f. April 1, 2025 – The amendment in Ind AS 7 requires to inform users of financial statements of the existence of supplier finance arrangements and explain the nature of the arrangements, the carrying amount of liabilities and the range of payment due dates. Ind AS 107 has been amended to add supplier finance arrangements as a factor that may cause concentration of liquidity risk. The Company has reviewed the amendment and based on its evaluation has determined that it does not have any significant impact in its financial statements.

Ind AS 12, International Tax Reform – Pillar Two Model Rules applicable immediately - The amendments provide a temporary mandatory relief from deferred tax accounting for top-up tax and disclose that they have applied the relief. The Company has reviewed the amendment and based on its evaluation has determined that it does not have any significant impact in its financial statements.

The risks that could have significant influence on the Company are market risk, credit risk and liquidity risk. The Company's Board of Directors reviews and sets out policies for managing these risks and monitors suitable actions taken by management to minimise potential adverse effects of such risks on the company's operational and financial performance.

B.ii. Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that the Company will incur a loss because its customers or counterparties fail to discharge their contractual obligation. The Company manages and controls credit risk by setting limits on the amount of risk it is willing to accept for individual counterparties, and by monitoring exposures in relations to such limits. The maximum exposure to credit risk for each class of financial instruments is the carrying amount of that class of financial instruments presented in the financial statements. The Company's major classes of financial assets are cash and cash equivalents, loans, investment in mutual fund units, term deposits, trade receivables and security deposits.

Trade Receivables :

Based on the Industry practices and business environment in which the entity operates, Management considers unsecured receivables as default if the payment is overdue for more than 90 days for direct customer. For franchisee customers, Aggregate of unsecured receivables as reduced by Franchisee deposit/ future brokerages are considered as default. Management would also consider balance in client's family accounts and collaterals in form other than the securities while considering the secured position of the client. Management would also consider impairment on client balance which are unsecured and overdue for less than 90 days on case to case basis, based on their scope of recoverability. For litigation cases, management could provide enhanced provision if the probability of outflow of economic resource is higher. If there are specific cases which are overdue for more than 90 days and the management is very confident of its recovery in near future, impairment loss would not be provided for such cases based on the approval of business head for each reporting period. Probability of default (PD) on these receivables is considered at 100% and treated as credit impaired.

Loans :

Loans includes Loans to others , Loans to staff and loans to related parties for which staged approach is taken into consideration for determination of ECL. Stage 1.

All positions in the MTF loan book are considered as stage 1 asset for computation of expected credit loss. For exposures where there has not been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition and that is not credit impaired upon origination. Margin trading facility, Loans to subsidiaries and loans to staff are considered in stage 1 for determination of ECL. Exposure to credit risk in stage 1 is computed considering historical probability of default, market movements and macro-economic environment.

Stage 2.

Exposures under stage 2 include overdues up to 90 days pertaining to principal amount, interest and any other charges on the MTF loan book which are unsecured. While arriving at the secured position of the client, management would also consider balance in client's family accounts, securities in other segment and collaterals in form other than the securities while considering the secured position of the client. At each reporting date, the Company assesses whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk for financial assets since initial recognition. In determining whether credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition, the Company uses days past due information and other qualitative factors to assess deterioration in credit quality of a financial asset. For credit exposures where there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition but that are not credit impaired, a lifetime ECL is recognised.

B.iii. Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will encounter difficulty in meeting the obligations associated with its financial liabilities that are settled by delivering cash or another financial asset.

Liquidity risk is managed by Company through effective fund management of the Company's short, medium and long-term funding and liquidity management requirements. The Company manages liquidity risk by maintaining adequate reserves, banking facilities and other borrowing facilities, by continuously monitoring forecast and actual cash flows, and by matching the maturity profiles of financial assets and liabilities.

B.iv. Market risk

Market Risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk comprises three types of risk: currency risk, interest rate risk and other price risk.

B.iv.a Currency risk

The Company is not exposed to any currency risk on account of its operating and financing activities. The functional currency of the Company is Indian Rupee. Our exposure are mainly denominated in INR's Only. The Company's business model incorporates assumptions on currency risks and ensures any exposure is covered through the normal business operations. This intent has been achieved in all years presented. The Company has put in place a Financial Risk Management Policy to Identify the most effective and efficient ways of managing the currency risks.

B.iv.b Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. The Company is exposed to interest rate risk through the impact of rate changes on interest-bearing liabilities and assets. The Company manages its interest rate risk by monitoring the movements in the market interest rates closely.
