In view of the continuing COVID-19 pandemic and pursuant to General Circular Nos. 14/2020, 17/2020, 20/2020, 02/2021, 21/2021 and 02/2022 dated April 8, 2020, April 13, 2020, May 5, 2020, January 13, 2021, December 14, 2021, and May 5, 2022 respectively issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") (collectively referred to as "MCA Circulars") and Circular Nos. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD1/CIR/P/2020/79, SEBI/HO/CFD/ CMD2/CIR/P/2021/11, and SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD2/CIR/P/2022/62 dated May 12, 2020, January 15, 2021, and May 13, 2022, respectively issued by the Securities and Exchange Board of India ("SEBI") (collectively referred to as "SEBI Circulars") permitted the holding of the Annual General Meeting ("AGM") through Video Conferencing ("VC")/Other Audio-Visual Means ("OAVM"), without the physical presence of the Members. In compliance with the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 (the "Act"), the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, as amended ("SEBI Listing Regulations"), MCA Circulars and SEBI Circulars, the AGM of the Company is being held through VC/ OAVM which does not require physical presence of members at a common venue. The proceedings of the AGM will be deemed to be conducted at the Registered Office of the Company which shall be the deemed Venue of the AGM.
- Pursuant to MCA Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 08, 2020, the facility to appoint proxy to attend and cast vote for the members is not available for this AGM/EGM. However, in pursuance of Section 112 and Section 113 of the Companies Act, 2013, representatives of the members such as the President of India or the Governor of a State or body corporate can attend the AGM/EGM through VC/OAVM and cast their votes through e-voting.
- 3. The Explanatory Statement, pursuant to Section 102 of the Companies Act, 2013 (the "Act"), in respect of the Special Business to be transacted at the 39th Annual General Meeting is annexed herewith.
- 4. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 108 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 (as amended) and Regulation 44 of SEBI (Listing Obligations & Disclosure Requirements) Regulations 2015 (as amended), and MCA Circulars dated April 08, 2020, April 13, 2020 and May 05, 2020 the Company is providing facility of remote e-voting to its Members in respect of the business to be transacted at the AGM. For this purpose, the Company has entered into an agreement with Central Depository Services (India) Limited (CDSL) for facilitating voting through electronic means, as the authorized e-Voting's agency. The facility of casting votes by a member using remote e-voting as well as the e-voting system on the date of the AGM will be provided by CDSL.
- In terms of the provisions of Section 113 of the Companies Act, 2013, Corporate Members are entitled to appoint their authorized representatives to attend the AGM through VC/ OAVM on their behalf and participate thereat, including cast votes by electronic means (details of which are provided separately, herein below).
- 6. The attendance of the Members attending the AGM through VC/OAVM will be counted for the purpose of ascertaining the quorum under Section 103 of the Companies Act, 2013.
- 7. The Members can join the EGM/AGM in the VC/OAVM mode 15 minutes before and after the scheduled time of the commencement of the Meeting by following the procedure mentioned in the Notice. The facility of participation at the EGM/AGM through VC/OAVM will be made available to atleast 1000 members on first come first served basis. This will not include large Shareholders (Shareholders holding 2% or more shareholding), Promoters, Institutional Investors, Directors, Key Managerial Personnel, the Chairpersons of the Audit Committee, Nomination and Remuneration Committee and Stakeholders Relationship Committee, Auditors etc. who are allowed to attend the EGM/AGM without restriction on account of first come first served basis.
- 8. In view of the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic, resultant difficulties involved in dispatching of physical copies of the Annual Report and in line with the said Circulars issued by the MCA and said SEBI Circular, the Annual Report including Notice of the AGM of the Company inter alia indicating

the process and manner of e-voting is being sent only by Email, to all the Shareholders whose Email IDs are registered with the Company/ Depository Participant(s) for communication purposes to the Shareholders and to all other persons so entitled.

Therefore, those Members, whose email address is not registered with the Company or with their respective Depository Participant/s, and who wish to receive the Notice of the 39thAGM and the Annual Report for the year 2021-22 and all other communication sent by the Company, from time to time, can get their email address registered.

- 9. In compliance with the aforesaid MCA Circulars and SEBI Circulars, dated May 12, 2020, Notice of the AGM along with the Annual Report 2021-22 is being sent only through electronic mode to those Members whose email addresses are registered with the Company/Depositories. Members may note that the Notice and Annual Report 2021-22 will also be available on the Company's website www.siliconvalleyinfo.co.in, websites of the Bombay Stock Exchange and Calcutta Stock Exchange and The AGM Notice is also disseminated on the website of CDSL (agency for providing the Remote e-Voting facility and e-voting system during the AGM) i.e. www.evotingindia.com.
- 10. Members are informed that in case of joint holders attending the meeting, the member whose name appears as the first holder in the order of names as per the Register of members of the Company will be entitled to vote in the Meeting to be held through video conferencing.
- 11. Regulation 40 of the SEBI Listing Regulations, as amended, mandates that transfer, transmission and transposition of securities of listed companies held in physical form shall be effected only in demat mode. Further, SEBI, vide its circular dated January 25, 2022, has clarified that listed companies, with immediate effect, shall issue the securities only in demat mode while processing investor service requests pertaining to issuance of duplicate shares, exchange of shares, endorsement, sub-division/ consolidation of share certificates, etc. In view of this, Members holding shares in physical form are requested to submit duly filled Form ISR-4 for the abovementioned service requests. In view of this and to eliminate all risks associated with physical shares and for ease of portfolio management, Members holding shares in physical form are requested to consider converting their holdings to dematerialised form. Folios wherein any one of the cited documents/ details are not available on or after April 01, 2023, shall be frozen by the Registrar and Transfer Agent of the Company.
- 13. Shareholders are requested to quote their Folio No. or DP ID Client ID, as the case may be, in all correspondence with the Company or Company's Registrar and Share Transfer Agent.
- 14. Relevant details in respect of Directors seeking Appointment/re-appointment at the AGM, in terms of Regulations 36(3) of the SEBI Listing Regulations and Secretarial Standard 2 on General Meetings are also annexed to this notice.
- 15. In terms of the provisions of Section 108 of the Act, read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Amendment Rules, 2015 (as amended from time to time) and Regulation 44 of the SEBI Listing Regulations and the said Circulars, the Company is pleased to provide to the Shareholders the facility of "e-voting", to enable them to cast their votes on the resolutions proposed to be passed at the AGM, by electronic means. The instructions for e-voting are given hereinbelow.

The Company has engaged the services of Central Securities Depository Limited ("CSDL"), who will provide the e-voting facility of casting votes to a Shareholder using remote e-voting system (e-voting from a place other than venue of the AGM) ("remote e-voting") as well as e-voting during the proceeding of the AGM ("e-voting at the AGM").

THE INTRUCTIONS OF SHAREHOLDERS FOR E-VOTING AND JOINING VIRTUAL MEETINGS ARE AS UNDER:

- **Step 1 :** Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.
- **Step 2**: Access through CDSL e-Voting system in case of shareholders holding shares in physical mode and non-individual shareholders in demat mode.
- (i) The voting period begins on 23rd September, 2022 at 9.00 a.m. and ends on 25th September, 2022 at 5.00 p.m. During this period shareholders' of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the cut-off date of 19th September, 2022 may cast their vote electronically. The e-voting module shall be disabled by CDSL for voting thereafter.
- (ii) Shareholders who have already voted prior to the meeting date would not be entitled to vote at the meeting venue.
- (iii) Pursuant to SEBI Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated 09.12.2020, under Regulation 44 of Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, listed entities are required to provide remote e-voting facility to its shareholders, in respect of all shareholders' resolutions. However, it has been observed that the participation by the public non-institutional shareholders/retail shareholders is at a negligible level.
 - Currently, there are multiple e-voting service providers (ESPs) providing e-voting facility to listed entities in India. This necessitates registration on various ESPs and maintenance of multiple user IDs and passwords by the shareholders.
 - In order to increase the efficiency of the voting process, pursuant to a public consultation, it has been decided to enable e-voting to all the demat account holders, by way of a single login credential, through their demat accounts/ websites of Depositories/ Depository Participants. Demat account holders would be able to cast their vote without having to register again with the ESPs, thereby, not only facilitating seamless authentication but also enhancing ease and convenience of participating in e-voting process.
- **Step 1**: Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.
- (iv) In terms of SEBI circular no. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated December 9, 2020 on e-Voting facility provided by Listed Companies, Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode are allowed to vote through their demat account maintained with Depositories and Depository Participants. Ltd, which has been challenged by the Company before the Appellate Authority and the petition has been under hearing, Since the auction of windmill together with the land itself has been challenged, the same has not given effect to, as the matter is pending before the Appellate Authority.

Further, in respect of deposit of Rs. 100 lacs as per Delhi High Court, the same are deposited in an Escrow Account, which was subjected to refund in case no mutual settlement could be possible between the company and REC. As such the same has been shown separately and not adjusted with Loan amount.

With regards to, qualification No. 5. The company has obtained a loan of Rs 270.59 Lacs from Rural Electrification Corporation Ltd (REC Ltd) in respect of wind mill projects against security of land having book value Rs.13.68 Lacs and the windmill thereon having nil depreciated value. Certain Listed Shares of the Company were also lien against the loan with the REC Ltd. The said land and windmill have been auctioned under order of Recovery Officer, DRT, Delhi which has been challenged by company before Appellate Authority and the said shares have got transferred by virtue of order of Recovery Officers, DRT Delhi.

Pending order of the Appellate Authority, the Company has not made any adjustment in the accounts in respect of said land, windmill, related loan obtained from REC Ltd and Shares Investments. The Company has deposited Rs 100 Lacs as per order of Delhi High Court. In absence of adequate information impact thereof on Financial Statements is not ascertainable

The observation made in the Auditors' Report read together with relevant notes thereon are self explanatory and hence, do not call for any further comments under Section 134 of the Companies Act, 2013.

The observation made in the Secretarial Audit Report is self explanatory and hence, do not call for any further comments.

Global Economic Overview:

After witnessing significant contraction owing to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, the global economy recovered to a certain extent in 2021. However, the momentum was suddenly halted in Q2 by a deadlier variant of the virus, the impact of which was fortunately short lived. The subsequent recovery was supported by vaccination drives being conducted by governments worldwide, despite repeated attacks of virus mutants in several countries of the world.

Towards the end of Q4 FY 2021-22, geopolitical tensions arising from a prolonged Russia-Ukraine conflict further increased downside risks to global growth by disrupting supply chains. Prices of crude, crude derivatives and other commodity prices have since surged significantly, thereby worsening the already high inflation dynamics of both advanced as well as emerging/developing economies.

Inflation has touched multi-decadal highs in the US and many other advanced countries, accelerating policy tightening measures by Central Banks. Economies are now focusing on stabilising the inflation trajectory, without hurting growth prospects

Indian Economy Overview:

The past two years have been difficult for the Indian economy on account of the COVID-19 pandemic. Repeated waves of infection, supply-chain disruptions and, more recently, inflation have created particularly challenging times. Faced with these challenges, the Government proactively implemented a range of safety measures to protect the vulnerable sections of the society. It places a strong thrust on increase in capital expenditure for infrastructure development to boost medium-term demand and expansion of the economy. India's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) is estimated to have grown by 8.7% in FY 2021-22 and growth is expected at 8.2% in FY 2022-23. This implies that the overall economic activity has recovered past the pre-pandemic levels. Growth in the coming year will be driven by widespread vaccine coverage, gains from supplyside reforms and easing of regulations, robust export growth, and availability of fiscal space to ramp up capital spending.

The country is also well poised for a pick-up in private sector investment with the financial system in a good position to provide support to the revival of the economy. Expectations of normal monsoon, abatement of pandemic-related challenges, withdrawal of global liquidity by major central banks, moderate oil prices, and easing of supply chain disruptions will support growth momentum going forward. Despite the disruptions caused by the global pandemic, India's balance of payments remained in surplus throughout the last two years. Among major emerging market economies, Indian markets outperformed its peers in April-December 2021. The year 2021-22 so far has been an exceptional year for the primary markets with a boom in fundraising through IPOs by many new-age companies, tech start-ups, and unicorns. Nearly `89,066 crore was raised via 75 IPO issues in April- November 2021, much higher than in any year in the previous decade.

Industry Structure and Development - Overview:

Indian economy is going through a period of rapid 'financial liberalisation'. The segment consisting of NBFCs, such as equipment leasing/hire purchase finance, loan andinvestment companies, etc. have made great strides in recent years and are meeting the diverse financialneeds of the economy. These NBFCs provide a variety of services including fund-based and fee-basedactivities and cater to retail and non-retail markets and niche segments. They are being recognized ascomplementary to the banking sector due to their customer-oriented services, simplified procedures, attractiverates of return on deposits, flexibility and timeliness in meeting the credit needs of specified sectors

With virtually all finance company business lines coming under greater competitive pressure, defining strategicinitiatives and backing each with the necessary resources has become imperative for success. On the consumer side of the business, the ability to compete in various product offerings often is dictated

byoperational efficiencies and economies of scale. In this respect NBFC's face problems of high cost of fundsbecause they lack the nationwide branch network and have a comparatively lower Tier-I and Tier-II capitalbase.

We witness that NBFC sector, in India are facing stiff competition from different banks and financial institutions. The cost of funds of banks is lower as compared to NBFC's. Not only this, they have a very wide networkand huge capital base which makes them more attractive then NBFC'. However as the market is volatile innature, the long term growth of capital market calls for a matter of concern.

Opportunities, threats, risks and concerns:

Being a Financial company, SVIL is exposed to specific risks that are particular to its business and theenvironment within which it operates, including interest rate volatility, economic cycle, credit risk and marketrisk. The most important among them are credit risk, market risk and operational risk. The measurement,monitoring management of risk remains key focus areas for the company.

Your Company has operations in finance and equity investments. The independent finance industry issuesdebt and lends the proceeds to individuals (consumer finance companies) and corporations (commercialfinance companies) on both a secured and unsecured basis. Unlike the commercial banks, whose deposittaking ability adds significantly to funding availability, finance companies rely almost exclusively on institutionalborrowings and access to the public debt markets for funding. Consequently, the ability to access the short, medium and long-term markets at competitive rates is critical to their ongoing viability. Your company facestough competition from Nationalized, Foreign and Private Sector Banks due to their inability to grant loan ata considerably low rate of interest.

The company has its own specific risks that are particular to its business including default risk, fluctuation of interest rates, economic cycles etc. Moreover existing banks are moving into retail sector and regionalbanks like Assamese banks are coming into play, which poses major concern for your company. Thevolatility in the market is a matter of concern. However economic parameters being strong will upsurge theeconomy. Your company has a well defined and prudent business practice and a comprehensive RiskManagement Policy to manage this risk.

Future Outlook:

Your Company is currently engaged in NBFC activities & Financial Management Services. The Companyintends to continue focusing on NBFC activities including financing, Inter-corporate Investments & CapitalMarket activities. At the same time the company has plans to expand its business by offering a wide arrayof financial products and services.

With a dedicated team of people, the Company expects to establish growth ahead of market in the comingyears. It would definitely try to establish itself and remain as a strong player in the finance industry. With the Capital market expected to be in a better mode than the previous few years and with our efforts we can lookforward to a prosperous year for the Company.

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the accompanying Ind AS financial statements of **SILICON VALLEY INFOTECH LIMITED** ("the Company") which comprises the Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2022, the Statement of Profit and Loss (including Other Comprehensive Income), statement of changes in Equity and Statement of Cash Flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information of the company (herein after referred to as "Financial Statements")

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the basis for qualified opinion paragraph, the aforesaid Ind AS financial statements give the information required by the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the Indian Accounting Standards prescribed under section 133 of the Act read with the Companies (India Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, as amended, ("Ind AS") and other accounting principles generally accepted in India, of the state of affairs of the Company as at March 31, 2022, and its loss (Including Other Comprehensive Income), Statement of Changes in Equityand its cash flows for the year ended on that date.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

Attention is drawn to Note No. 22 The company has obtained a loan of Rs 270.59 Lacs from Rural Electrification Corporation Ltd (REC Ltd) in respect of wind mill projects against security of land having book value Rs.13.68 Lacs and the windmill thereon having nil depreciated value. The said land and windmill have been auctioned under order of Recovery Officer, DRT, Delhi which has been challenged by company before Appellate Authority. Certain Listed Shares of the Company were also lien against the loan with the REC Ltd. The said land and windmill have been auctioned under order of Recovery Officer, DRT, Delhi which has been challenged by company before Appellate Authority and the said shares have got transferred by virtue of order of Recovery Officers, DRT Delhi. One of the Group Company, M/s ATN International Ltd. having same loan from REC on identical terms & conditions, approached Delhi High Court in the year 2021 and the Lordship passed the order directing the board of REC to look into the onetime proposal presented by M/s ATN International Ltd. and at the same time M/s ATN International Ltd. also submitted the proposal with REC. M/s ATN International Ltd. had a successful meeting with the committee formed for this purpose. M/s ATN International Ltd. is having a positive outlook to resolve the matter with REC after the meeting as the committee is going to present the matter with the board to settle the same amicably and mutually. Once M/s ATN International Ltd. matter is resolved, our company matter also will be resolved on similar terms. Pending finalization of outcome, no adjustment in accounts have been made in respect of said land, windmill, related loan obtained from REC Ltd and Shares Investments. The Company has deposited Rs 100 Lacs as per order of Delhi High Court. In absence of adequate information impact thereof on Financial Statements is not ascertainable

We further state that our reporting is based on the facts up to the date of the audit report and we neither give any guarantee nor any assurance that all liabilities falling due within a period of one year from the balance sheet date, will get discharged by the company as and when they fall due.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. CORPORATE INFORMATION

Silicon Valley Infotech Limited (CIN: L15311WB1993PLC061312) was incorporated in the year 1993 having its' Registered Office at 10, Princep Street, 2nd Floor, Kolkata - 700 072 and is carrying on the business of trading and investment in shares and securities and loaning.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. Presentation of Financial statements

The company applies Indian Accounting Standards (IND AS) in preparing and presenting general purpose financial statements. It has also followed RBI guidelines and announcements issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India.

1.1 Presentation of True and Fair View and compliance with IND AS

Financial statements present a true and fair view of the financial position, financial performance and cash flows of the company. Presentation of true and fair view requires the faithful representation of the effects of transactions, other events and conditions in accordance with the definitions and recognition criteria for assets, liabilities, income and expenses set out in the Framework. The application of IND AS, with additional disclosure when necessary, is presumed to result in financial statements that present a true and fair view.

Financial statements comply with IND AS explicitly and without any reservation.

1.2 Going concern

The Company prepares its financial statements on a going concern.

1.3 Accrual basis of accounting

The Financial Statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention on accrual basis, except for:

i. Certain financial assets and liabilities that are measured at fair values at the end of each reporting period; and

1.4 Materiality and aggregation

The Company presents separately each material class of similar items. It presents separately items of a dissimilar nature or function unless they are immaterial except when required by law.

1.5 Offsetting

The Company do not offset assets and liabilities or income and expenses, unless required or permitted by an IND AS.

1.6 Minimum comparative information

Except when IND ASs permit or require otherwise, the company presents comparative information in respect of the preceding period for all amounts reported in the current period's financial statements. It also includes comparative information for narrative and descriptive information if it is relevant to understanding the current period's financial statements.

1.7 Other comprehensive income

Other Comprehensive Income comprises items of income and expenses (including reclassification adjustments) that are not recognised in profit or loss as required or permitted by other IND AS. The

components of other comprehensive income include: (a) changes in revaluation surplus; (b) reameasurements of defined benefit plans; gains and losses from investments in equity instruments designated at fair value.

2. Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors

In the absence of an IND AS that specifically applies to a transaction, other event or condition, management shall use its judgement in developing and applying an accounting policy that results in information that is: (a) relevant to the economic decision-making needs of users; and (b) reliable, in that the financial statements: (i) represent faithfully the financial position, financial performance and cash flows of the entity; (ii) reflect the economic substance of transactions, other events and conditions, and not merely the legal form; (iii) are neutral, i.e. free from bias; (iv) are prudent; and (v) are complete in all material respects.

2.1 Changes in accounting policies

The Company will change an accounting policy only if the change: (a) is required by an IND AS; or (b) results in the financial statements providing reliable and more relevant information about the effects of transactions, other events or conditions on the entity's financial position, financial performance or cash flows.

The Company has corrected all material prior period errors retrospectively in the first set of financial statements approved for issue after their discovery by: (a) restating the comparative amounts for the prior period(s) presented in which the error occurred; or (b) if the error occurred before the earliest prior period presented, restating the opening balances of assets, liabilities and equity for the earliest prior period presented.

3. Events after the Reporting Period

The Company will adjust the amounts recognised in its financial statements to reflect adjusting events after the reporting period. The Company will not adjust the amounts recognised in its financial statements to reflect non-adjusting events after the reporting period. If the company declares dividends to holders of equity instruments after the reporting period, it will not recognise those dividends as a liability at the end of the reporting period. If the company receives information after the reporting period about conditions that existed at the end of the reporting period, it shall update disclosures that relate to those conditions, in the light of the new information. If non-adjusting events after the reporting period are material, non-disclosure could influence the economic decisions that users make on the basis of the financial statements. Accordingly, it will disclose the following for each material category of non-adjusting event after the reporting period: (a) the nature of the event; and (b) an estimate of its financial effect, or a statement that such an estimate cannot be made.

4. Related Party Disclosures

To enable users of financial statements to form a view about the effects of related party relationships with the company, it is appropriate to disclose the related party relationship when director(s) exercise significant influence, irrespective of whether there have been transactions between the related parties.

5. Cash Flow Statement

The statement of cash flows is reported during the period classified by operating, investing and financing activities. Cash flows from operating activities are reported using the indirect method, whereby profit or loss is adjusted for the effects of transactions of a non-cash nature, any deferrals or accruals of past or future operating cash receipts or payments, and items of income or expense

associated with investing or financing cash flows. Major classes of gross cash receipts and gross cash payments arising from investing and financing activities are reported separately. Cash flows arising from interest paid and interest and dividends received is classified as cash flows arising from operating activities.

Dividends paid are classified as cash flows from financing activities. Cash flows arising from taxes on income is separately disclosed and is classified as cash flows from operating activities unless they can be specifically identified with financing and investing activities.

6. Measurement of Fair Values.

Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date.

Disclosure is given for assets and liabilities that are measured at fair value on a recurring or non-recurring basis in the balance sheet after initial recognition, the valuation techniques and inputs used to develop those measurements and for recurring fair value measurements using significant unobservable inputs, the effect of the measurements on profit or loss or other comprehensive income for the period.

7. Inventories

Inventories shall be measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. The cost of inventories shall comprise all costs of purchase, costs of conversion and other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition.

The cost of inventories shall be assigned by using the first-in, first-out (FIFO) or weighted average cost formula. Same cost formula for all inventories having a similar nature and use to the entity has been used.

When inventories are sold, the carrying amount of those inventories is recognised as an expense in the period in which the related revenue is recognised. The amount of any write-down of inventories to net realisable value and all losses of inventories is recognised as an expense in the period the write-down or loss occurs. The amount of any reversal of any write-down of inventories, arising from an increase in net realisable value, is recognised as a reduction in the amount of inventories recognised as an expense in the period in which the reversal occurs.

8. Revenue Recognition.

Revenue will be recognised when the parties to the contract have approved the contract (in writing, orally or in accordance with other customary business practices) and are committed to perform their respective obligations; each party's rights regarding the goods or services to be transferred is identified; payment terms for the goods or services to be transferred is identified; the contract has commercial substance; and it is probable that the company will collect the consideration to which it will be entitled in exchange for the goods or services that will be transferred to the customer. In evaluating whether collectability of an amount of consideration is probable, company shall consider only the customer's ability and intention to pay that amount of consideration when it is due. The amount of consideration to which company will be entitled may be less than the price stated in the contract if the consideration is variable because the company may offer the customer a price concession.

The company shall recognise revenue when it satisfies a performance obligation by transferring a promised good or service (i.e. an asset) to a customer. An asset is transferred when the customer

obtains control of that asset.

When a performance obligation is satisfied, company shall recognise as revenue the amount of the transaction price that is allocated to that performance obligation.

The company shall consider the terms of the contract and its customary business practices to determine the transaction price. The transaction price is the amount of consideration to which company expects to be entitled in exchange for transferring promised goods or services to a customer. The consideration promised in a contract with a customer may include fixed amounts, variable amounts, or both.

A gain or loss on a financial asset or financial liability that is measured at fair value shall be recognised in profit or loss.

Dividends are recognised in profit or loss only when :(a) the company's right to receive payment of the dividend is established;(b) it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the dividend will flow to the company; and (c) The amount of the dividend can be measured reliably.

9. Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment shall be recognised as an asset if, and only if:
(a) it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the company;
and (b) the cost of the item can be measured reliably. Under the recognition principle, an entity
recognises in the carrying amount of an item of property, plant and equipment the cost of replacing
part of such an item when that cost is incurred if the recognition criteria are met.

An item of property, plant and equipment that qualifies for recognition as an asset shall be measured at its cost. The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment comprises: (a) its purchase price, including import duties and non-refundable purchase taxes, after deducting trade discounts and rebates.(b) any costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management. After recognition as an asset, an item of property, plant and equipment shall be carried at its cost less any accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

Each part of an item of property, plant and equipment with a cost that is significant in relation to the total cost of the item shall be depreciated separately. The depreciation charge for each period shall be recognised in profit or loss unless it is included in the carrying amount of another asset. The depreciable amount of an asset shall be allocated on a systematic basis over its useful life. The residual value and the useful life of an asset shall be reviewed at least at each financial year-end and, if expectations differ from previous estimates, the change(s) shall be accounted for as a change in an accounting estimate in accordance with IND AS 8, Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors. The depreciation method used reflects the pattern in which the asset's future economic benefits are expected to be consumed by the entity. The depreciation method applied to an asset is reviewed at least at each financial year-end and, if there has been a significant change in the expected pattern of consumption of the future economic benefits embodied in the asset, the method is changed to reflect the changed pattern. Such a change shall be accounted for as a change in an accounting estimate in accordance with Ind AS 8.

The carrying amount of an item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised: (a) on disposal; or (b) when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. The gain or losses arising from derecognition of an item of property, plant and equipment shall be included in profit or loss when the item is derecognised.

Depreciation is recognised to write off the cost of assets less their residual values over their useful lives, using the Straight Line method.

10. Investment Property

Investment property shall be recognised as an asset when and only when: (a) it is probable that the future economic benefits that are associated with the investment property will flow to the company; and (b) the cost of the investment property can be measured reliably. An investment property shall be measured initially at its cost.

Transaction costs shall be included in the initial measurement. The cost of a purchased investment property comprises its purchase price and any directly attributable expenditure. After initial recognition, an entity shall measure all of its investment properties in accordance with IND AS 16's requirements for cost model, other than those that meet the criteria to be classified as held for sale (or are included in a disposal group that is classified as held for sale) in accordance with IND AS 105, Non-current Assets Held for Sale and Discontinued Operations. Investment properties that meet the criteria to be classified as held for sale (or are included in a disposal group that is classified as held for sale) shall be measured in accordance with IND AS 105. An investment property shall be derecognised (eliminated from the balance sheet) on disposal or when the investment property is permanently withdrawn from use and no future economic benefits are expected from its disposal. Gains or losses arising from the retirement or disposal of investment property shall be determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and shall be recognised in profit or loss in the period of the retirement or disposal.

Depreciation is provided on straight line value method by adopting useful life of 30 years in the case of Building (other than Building) other than RCC Frame structure as prescribed under schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013 after retaining 5% of Original cost as residual value for Buildings.

The fair value of investment property is being determined by property valuer, having recognised qualifications and experience. However if the Investment property is disposed off during the reporting period, the Sale Price not being less than valuation as per Registry office on which stamp duty is being calculated and paid off as per the Registered Sales deed is treated as fair value.

11. Impairment of Assets

Company shall assess at the end of each reporting period whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If any such indication exists, the company shall estimate the recoverable amount of the asset. If, and only if, the recoverable amount of an asset is less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset shall be reduced to its recoverable amount. That reduction is an impairment loss. After the recognition of an impairment loss, the depreciation (amortisation) charge for the asset is adjusted in future periods to allocate the asset's revised carrying amount, less its residual value (if any), on a systematic basis over its remaining useful life.

12. Financial Instrument

Recognition and derecognition

The Company recognises a financial asset or a financial liability in its balance sheet when, and only when, it becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. A regular way purchase or sale of financial assets shall be recognised and derecognised, as applicable, using trade date accounting or settlement date accounting.

The company will derecognise a financial asset when and only when: (a) the contractual rights to

the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or (b) it transfers the financial asset as set out below and the transfer qualifies for derecognition.

- (i) An entity transfers a financial asset if, and only if, it either: (a) transfers the contractual rights to receive the cash flows of the financial asset, or (b) retains the contractual rights to receive the cash flows of the financial asset, but assumes a contractual obligation to pay the cash flows to one or more recipients in an arrangement that meets the conditions.
- (ii) When the company retains the contractual rights to receive the cash flows of a financial asset (the 'original asset'), but assumes a contractual obligation to pay those cash flows to one or more entities (the 'eventual recipients'), the company treats the transaction as a transfer of a financial asset if, and only if, all of the conditions are met like:(a) The entity has no obligation to pay amounts to the eventual recipients unless it collects equivalent amounts from the original asset. Short-term advances by the company with the right of full recovery of the amount lent plus accrued interest at market rates do not violate this condition.(b) The company is prohibited by the terms of the transfer contract from selling or pledging the original asset other than as security to the eventual recipients for the obligation to pay them cash flows.(c) The company has an obligation to remit any cash flows it collects on behalf of the eventual recipients without material delay. In addition, the entity is not entitled to reinvest such cash flows, except for investments in cash or cash equivalents during the short settlement period from the collection date to the date of required remittance to the eventual recipients, and interest earned on such investments is passed to the eventual recipients.
- (iii) Whenever the company transfers a financial asset it evaluates the extent to which it retains the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset. In this case: (a) if the company transfers substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset, the company derecognises the financial asset and recognise separately as assets or liabilities any rights and obligations created or retained in the transfer. (b) If the company retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset, it will continue to recognise the financial asset. (c) If the company neither transfers nor retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset, the company determines whether it has retained control of the financial asset.

In this case: (i) If the company has not retained control, it shall derecognise the financial asset and recognise separately as assets or liabilities any rights and obligations created or retained in the transfer. (ii) If the company has retained control, it shall continue to recognise the financial asset to the extent of its continuing involvement in the financial asset.

Transfers that qualify for derecognition

- (i) When the company transfers a financial asset in a transfer that qualifies for derecognition in its entirety and retains the right to service the financial asset for a fee, it recognises either a servicing asset or a servicing liability for that servicing contract. If the fee to be received is not expected to compensate the company adequately for performing the servicing, a servicing liability for the servicing obligation is recognised at its fair value. If the fee to be received is expected to be more than adequate compensation for the servicing, a servicing asset shall be recognised for the servicing right at an amount determined on the basis of an allocation of the carrying amount of the larger financial asset as stated in (iv) below.
- (ii) If, as a result of a transfer, a financial asset is derecognised in its entirety but the transfer

- results in the entity obtaining a new financial asset or assuming a new financial liability, or a servicing liability, the company recognises the new financial asset, financial liability or servicing liability at fair value.
- (iii) On derecognition of a financial asset in its entirety, the difference between: (a) the carrying amount (measured at the date of derecognition) and (b) the consideration received (including any new asset obtained less any new liability assumed) is recognised in profit or loss.
- (iv) If the transferred asset is part of a larger financial asset (e.g. when the company transfers interest cash flows that are part of a debt instrument, and the part transferred qualifies for derecognition in its entirety, the previous carrying amount of the larger financial asset shall be allocated between the part that continues to be recognised and the part that is derecognised, on the basis of the relative fair values of those parts on the date of the transfer. For this purpose, a retained servicing asset shall be treated as a part that continues to be recognised. The difference between: (a) the carrying amount (measured at the date of derecognision) allocated to the part derecognised and (b) the consideration received for the part derecognised (including any new asset obtained less any new liability assumed) shall be recognised in profit or loss.

Transfers that do not qualify for derecognition

If a transfer does not result in derecognition because the entity has retained substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the transferred asset, the entity shall continue to recognise the transferred asset in its entirety and shall recognise a financial liability for the consideration received. In subsequent periods, the entity shall recognise any income on the transferred asset and any expense incurred on the financial liability.

Continuing involvement in transferred assets

When the company neither transfers nor retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of a transferred asset, and retains control of the transferred asset, the company continues to recognise the transferred asset to the extent of its continuing involvement.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

An entity shall remove a financial liability (or a part of a financial liability) from its balance sheet when, and only when, it is extinguished-i.e. when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged or cancelled or expires.

Classification of financial assets

The Company will classify financial assets as subsequently measured at amortised cost, fair value through other comprehensive income or fair value through profit or loss on the basis of both: (a) the entity's business model for managing the financial assets and (b) the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset.

A financial asset shall be measured at amortised cost if both of the following conditions are met: (a) the financial asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows and (b) the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Classification of financial liabilities

An entity shall classify all financial liabilities as subsequently measured at amortised cost.

13. Non-Performing Assets & Write-off Policy

The company shall directly reduce the gross carrying amount of a financial asset when the entity has no reasonable expectations of recovering a financial asset in its entirety or a portion thereof. A write-off constitutes a derecognition event. Identification of Non-Performing Assets (NPAs) is being done as per the guidelines of Master Direction- Non Banking Financial Company -Non -Systemically Important Non-Deposit taking Company (Reserve Bank) Directions, 2016 prescribed by the Reserve Bank of India. The company is writing off NPAs in its books of accounts every year.

14. Investments in equity instruments

At initial recognition, the company makes an irrevocable election to present in other comprehensive income subsequent changes in the fair value of an investment in an equity instrument within the scope of this Standard that is neither held for trading nor contingent consideration recognised by an acquirer in a business combination to which IND AS103 applies. Once it makes this election, it shall recognise in profit or loss dividends from that investment.

15. Borrowing Cost

The company will capitalise borrowing costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of a qualifying asset as part of the cost of that asset. It recognises other borrowing costs as an expense in the period in which it incurs them. To the extent that it borrows funds specifically for the purpose of obtaining a qualifying asset, it will determine the amount of borrowing costs eligible for capitalisation as the actual borrowing costs incurred on that borrowing during the period less any investment income on the temporary investment of those borrowings. To the extent that it borrows funds generally and uses them for the purpose of obtaining a qualifying asset, it will determine the amount of borrowing costs eligible for capitalisation by applying a capitalisation rate to the expenditures on that asset. The capitalisation rate shall be the weighted average of the borrowing costs applicable to the borrowings of the company that are outstanding during the period, other than borrowings made specifically for the purpose of obtaining a qualifying asset. The amount of borrowing costs that company capitalises during a period shall not exceed the amount of borrowing costs it incurred during that period. The company will begin capitalising borrowing costs as part of the cost of a qualifying asset on the commencement date. The commencement date for capitalisation is the date when it first meets all of the following conditions: (a) it incurs expenditures for the asset; (b) it incurs borrowing costs; and (c) it undertakes activities that are necessary to prepare the asset for its intended use or sale. It will suspend capitalisation of borrowing costs during extended periods in which it suspends active development of a qualifying asset. It will cease capitalising borrowing costs when substantially all the activities necessary to prepare the qualifying asset for its intended use or sale are complete.

16. Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets

A provision shall be recognised when:

- (a) The company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event;
- (b) It is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation; and
- (c) A reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognised as a provision shall be the best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period. The risks and uncertainties that inevitably surround many events and circumstances shall be taken into account in reaching

the best estimate of a provision. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the amount of a provision shall be the present value of the expenditures expected to be required to settle the obligation. Provisions is reviewed at the end of each reporting period and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate. If it is no longer probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation, the provision is reversed.

Unless the possibility of any outflow in settlement is remote, the company will disclose for each—class of contingent liability at the end of the reporting period a brief description of the nature of the contingent liability and, where practicable:

- (a) An estimate of its financial effect,
- (b) An indication of the uncertainties relating to the amount or timing of any outflow; and (c) the possibility of any reimbursement.

Where an inflow of economic benefits is probable, the company will disclose a brief description of the nature of the contingent assets at the end of the reporting period, and, where practicable, an estimate of their financial effect.

17. Earnings per Share

The company will calculate basic earnings per share amounts for profit or loss attributable to ordinary equity holders and, if presented, profit or loss from continuing operations attributable to those equity holders. Basic earnings per share shall be calculated by dividing profit or loss attributable to ordinary equity holders (the numerator) by the weighted average number of ordinary shares outstanding (the denominator) during the period. The objective of basic earnings per share information is to provide a measure of the interests of each ordinary share in the performance of the company over the reporting period.

If the number of ordinary or potential ordinary shares outstanding increases as a result of a capitalisation, bonus issue or share split, or decreases as a result of a reverse share split, the calculation of basic and diluted earnings per share for all periods presented shall be adjusted retrospectively. If these changes occur after the reporting period but before the financial statements are approved for issue, the per share calculations for those and any prior period financial statements presented shall be based on the new number of shares. The fact that per share calculations reflect such changes in the number of shares shall be disclosed. In addition, basic and diluted earnings per share of all periods presented shall be adjusted for the effects of errors and adjustments resulting from changes in accounting policies accounted for retrospectively.

The company will present in the statement of profit and loss basic and diluted earnings per share for profit or loss from continuing operations attributable to the ordinary equity holders and for profit or loss attributable to the ordinary equity holders for the period for each class of ordinary shares that has a different right to share in profit for the period. It will present basic and diluted earnings per share with equal prominence for all periods presented. It will present basic and diluted earnings per share, even if the amounts are negative (ie a loss per share).

18. . Employee Benefits.

Short-term employee benefits include items such as the following, if expected to be settled wholly before twelve months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related services: (a) wages, salaries and social security contributions; (b) paid leave; (c) bonuses; and (d) non-monetary benefits if any for current employees. When an employee has rendered service to the company during an accounting period, it recognises the undiscounted amount of short-term employee

benefits expected to be paid in exchange for that service: (a) as a liability (accrued expense), after deducting any amount already paid. If the amount already paid exceeds the undiscounted amount of the benefits, it recognises that excess as an asset (prepaid expense) to the extent that the prepayment will lead to, for example, a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.(b) as an expense. It will recognise the expected cost of bonus payments only when: (a) it has a present legal or constructive obligation to make such payments as a result of past events; and (b) a reliable estimate of the obligation can be made.

A present obligation exists when, and only when, the entity has no realistic alternative but to make the payments.

Post-employment benefits include items such as the following: (a) retirement benefits (lump sum payments on retirement i.e. gratuity); and (b) other post-employment benefits, such as leave encashment, terminal benefits. Arrangements whereby company provides post-employment benefits are post-employment benefit plans. It applies this Standard to all such arrangements whether or not they involve the establishment of a separate entity to receive contributions and to pay benefits.

Post-employment benefit plans are classified as either defined contribution plans or defined benefit plans, depending on the economic substance of the plan as derived from its principal terms and conditions.

Under defined contribution plans the company's legal or constructive obligation is limited to the amount that it agrees to contribute to the fund. Thus, the amount of the post-employment benefits received by the employee is determined by the amount of contributions paid by the company (and perhaps also the employee) to a post-employment benefit plan or to an insurance company, together with investment returns arising from the contributions. In consequence, actuarial risk (that benefits will be less than expected) and investment risk (that assets invested will be insufficient to meet expected benefits) fall, in substance, on the employee. The company may pay insurance premiums to fund a postemployment benefit plan. The entity shall treat such a plan as a defined contribution plan unless the entity will have (either directly, or indirectly through the plan) a legal or constructive obligation either: (a) to pay the employee benefits directly when they fall due; or (b) to pay further amounts if the insurer does not pay all future employee benefits relating to employee service in the current and prior periods. If it retains such a legal or constructive obligation, it shall treat the plan as a defined benefit plan.

When an employee has rendered service to the company during a period, it shall recognise the contribution payable to a defined contribution plan in exchange for that service: (a) as a liability (accrued expense), after deducting any contribution already paid. If the contribution already paid exceeds the contribution due for service before the end of the reporting period, an entity shall recognise that excess as an asset (prepaid expense) to the extent that the prepayment will lead to, for example, a reduction in future payments or cash refund. (b) as an expense. When contributions to a defined contribution plan are not expected to be settled wholly before twelve months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related service, they shall be discounted using the discount rate.

Accounting by an entity for defined benefit plans involves the following steps: (a) determining the deficit or surplus. (b) Determining the amount of the net defined benefit liability (asset). (c) Determining amounts to be recognised in profit or loss: (i) current service cost (ii) any past service cost and gain or loss on settlement (iii) net interest on the net defined benefit liability (asset). (d) Determining the reameasurements of the net defined benefit liability (asset), to be recognised in other comprehensive income, comprising: (i) actuarial gains and losses; (ii) return on plan assets, excluding amounts included in net interest on the net defined benefit liability (asset); and (iii) any change in the effect of the asset ceiling, excluding amounts included in net interest on the net defined benefit liability (asset).

The company will account not only for its legal obligation under the formal terms of a defined benefit plan, but also for any constructive obligation that arises from its informal practices. Informal practices give rise to a constructive obligation where it has no realistic alternative but to pay employee benefits.

The company recognises the net defined benefit liability (asset) in the balance sheet. When the company has a surplus in a defined benefit plan, it shall measure the net defined benefit asset at the lower of: (a) the surplus in the defined benefit plan; and (b) the asset ceiling, determined using the discount rate

The company uses the projected unit credit method to determine the present value of its defined benefit obligations and the related current service cost and, where applicable, past service cost.

19. . Income Taxes

Deferred tax assets are the amounts of income taxes recoverable in future periods in respect of: (a) deductible temporary differences; (b) the carry forward of unused tax losses; and (c) the carry forward of unused tax credits.

Current tax for current and prior periods shall, to the extent unpaid, be recognised as a liability. If the amount already paid in respect of current and prior periods exceeds the amount due for those periods, the excess shall be recognised as an asset.

A deferred tax liability is recognised for all taxable temporary differences, except to the extent that the deferred tax liability arises from: (a) the initial recognition of goodwill; or (b) the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction which: (i) is not a business combination; and (ii) at the time of the transaction, affects neither accounting profit nor taxable profit (tax loss). Temporary differences also arise when assets are revalued and no equivalent adjustment is made for tax purposes. Ind ASs permits or requires certain assets to be carried at fair value or to be revalued. The difference between the carrying amount of a revalued asset and its tax base is a temporary difference and gives rise to a deferred tax liability or asset.

A deferred tax asset shall be recognised for all deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary difference can be utilised.

A deferred tax asset shall be recognised for the carry forward of unused tax losses and unused tax credits to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profit will be available against which the unused tax losses and unused tax credits can be utilised.

Current tax liabilities (assets) for the current and prior periods is measured at the amount expected to be paid to (recovered from) the taxation authorities, using the tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period. Deferred tax assets and liabilities is measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the period when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period. When different tax rates apply to different levels of taxable income, deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured using the average rates that are expected to apply to the taxable profit (tax loss) of the periods in which the temporary differences are expected to reverse.

Current and deferred tax is recognised as income or an expense and included in profit or loss for the period, except to the extent that the tax arises from a transaction or event which is recognised, in the same or a different period, outside profit or loss, either in other comprehensive income or directly in equity. Current tax and deferred tax shall be recognised outside profit or loss if the tax relates to items that are recognised, in the same or a different period, outside profit or loss. Therefore, current tax and deferred tax that relates to items that are recognised, in the same or a different period: (a) in other

comprehensive income, shall be recognised in other comprehensive income (b) directly in equity, shall be recognised directly in equity.

20. IND AS 101 First Time Adoption of Indian Accounting Standards

The company shall use the same accounting policies in its opening IND AS Balance Sheet and throughout all periods presented in its first IND AS financial statements. Those accounting policies shall comply with each IND AS effective at the end of its first IND AS reporting period, except as specified below:

The accounting policies that an entity uses in its opening IND AS Balance Sheet may differ from those that it used for the same date using its previous GAAP. The resulting adjustments arise from events and transactions before the date of transition to IND ASs. Therefore, the company will recognise those adjustments directly in retained earnings (or, if appropriate, another category of equity) at the date of transition to IND ASs.

21. Mandatory Exemptions adopted by the Company

- i. De recognition of financial assets and financial liabilities
 - The Company shall apply the derecognition requirements in IND AS 109 prospectively for transactions occurring on or after the date of transition to IND ASs.
- ii. Classification and measurement of financial assets
 - The Company shall assess whether a financial asset meets the conditions of IND AS 109 on the basis of the facts and circumstances that exist at the date of transition to IND AS.
- iii. Impairment of financial assets
 - The Company shall apply the impairment requirements of IND AS 109 retrospectively subject to exemptions provided in IND AS 101

22. Optional Exemptions Availed by the Company

Deemed cost

The Company elects to continue with the carrying value for all of its property, plant and equipment as recognised in the financial statements as at the date of transition to IND ASs, measured as per the previous GAAP and use that as its deemed cost as at the date of transition. Hence, no further adjustments to the deemed cost of the property, plant and equipment so determined in the opening balance sheet shall be made for transition adjustments that might arise from the application of other IND ASs. This option is also be availed for intangible assets covered by IND AS 38, Intangible Assets and investment property covered by IND AS 40, Investment Property.

Long Term Borrowings of Rs.270.59 Lacks from Rural Electrification Corporation Ltd (REC Ltd) is Secured against movable and immovable properties except book debts in respect of Wind Power Projects and guaranteed by a director. REC has filed a recovery suit against the company for recovery of dues with Recovery officer, DRT, Delhi. On the directives from Honourable Delhi High Court the company has also deposited Rs.100 Lacks. Land and the wind mill thereon having depreciated value of nil have been auctioned under order of Recovery officer, DRT. Certain quoted listed Shares of the company which were lien against the loan of REC Ltd have got transferred by virtue of order of Recovery officer, DRT details whereof not available .The order of the DRT has been challenged by company before Appellate authority. One of the Group Company, M/s ATN International Ltd. having same loan from REC on identical terms & conditions, approached Delhi High Court in the year 2021 and the Lordship passed the order directing the board of REC to look into the onetime proposal presented by M/s ATN International Ltd. and at the same time M/s ATN International Ltd. also submitted the proposal with REC. M/s ATN International Ltd. had a successful meeting with the committee formed for this purpose. M/s ATN International Ltd. is having a positive outlook to resolve the matter with REC after the meeting as the committee is going to present the matter with the board to settle the same amicably and mutually. Once M/s ATN International Ltd. matter is resolved, Our company matter also will be resolved on similar terms. Pending finalisation of outcome no adjustment in accounts have been made.
