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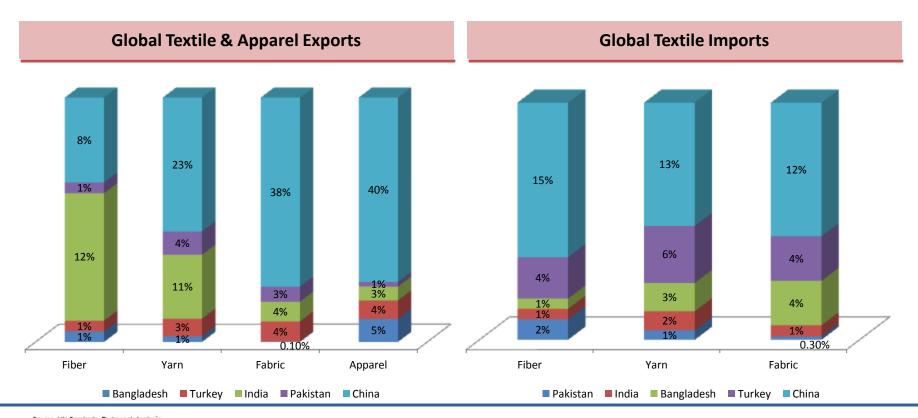
Industry Overview





Global Textile & Apparel Industry

- Textile and apparel trade ~USD 662 billion in 2011
 - expected to grow at a CAGR of 5% in the next 10 years
- China, India, Pakistan, Bangladesh, Thailand, Indonesia leading countries in terms of installed machinery capacity



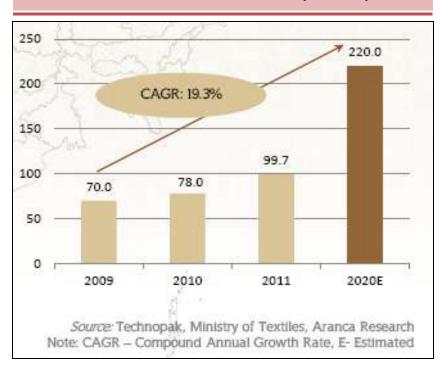

Indian Textile & Apparel Industry

- World's second largest producer of textiles and garments
- Market size estimated at ~ USD 99.7 bn in 2011
- Market recorded a CAGR of 19.3% over 2009-11
- Expected to grow to USD 220 bn by 2020
- Textile plays major role in Indian economy
 - Accounts for 27% of foreign exchange inflows
 - Share of 14% in industrial production
 - Largest source of employment generation

Policy support: A key ingredient to growth

Technology Upgradation Fund Scheme (TUFS)

- TUFS infused at an investment of ~USD43 billion until June 2010; another USD3.3 billion has been allocated for the 12th Five Year Plan
- Investment was made to promote New Projects, Expansion & Modernisation and Upgradation of the textile industry by providing credit at reduced rates

National Textile Policy-2000

- Policy was introduced for the overall development of textile industry
- Key areas of focus include technological upgrades, enhancement of productivity, product diversification and financing arrangements

Foreign Direct Investment

• FDI up to 100 per cent is allowed in the textile sector through the automatic route

Scheme for Integrated Textiles Parks (SITP)

- SITP was set up in 2005 to provide necessary infrastructure to new textile units;
 under SITP, 40 projects (worth USD900 million) have been sanctioned
- The planned outlay for the textiles and apparel sector under the 11th Five Year
 Plan (2012–17) was USD2.9 billion

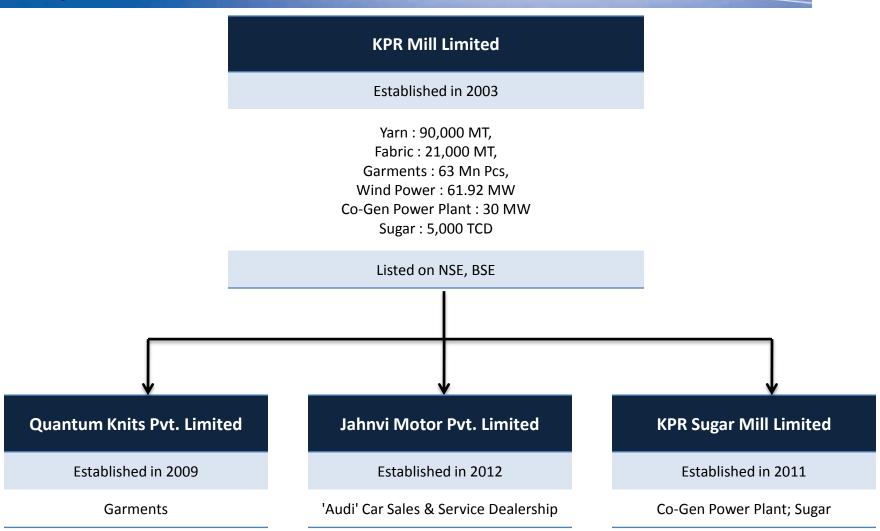

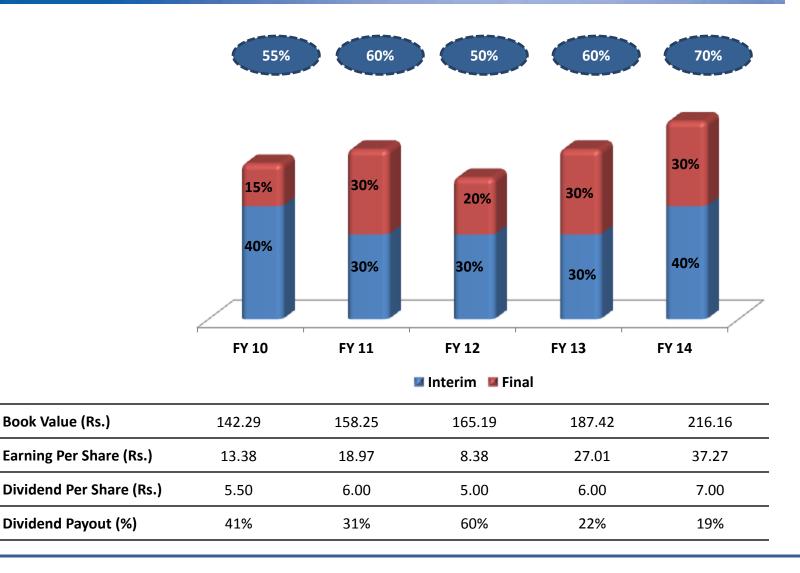

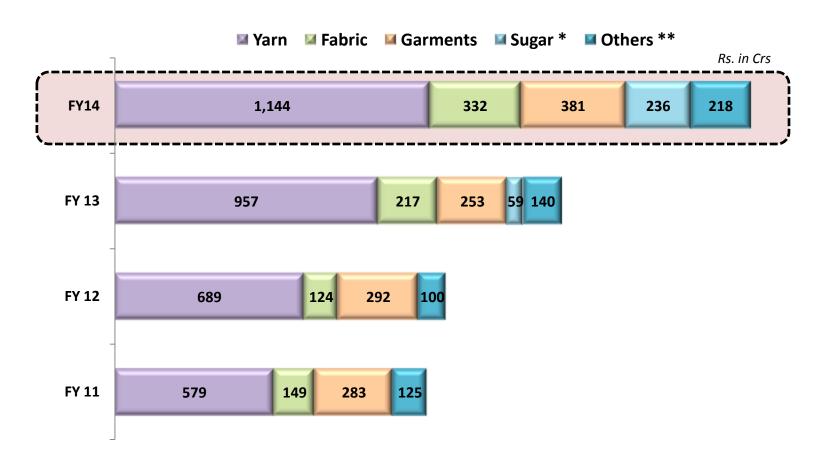

Segment Wise Revenue contribution

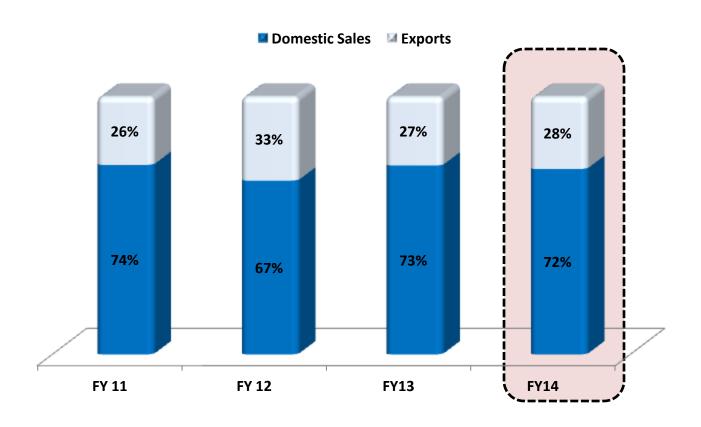

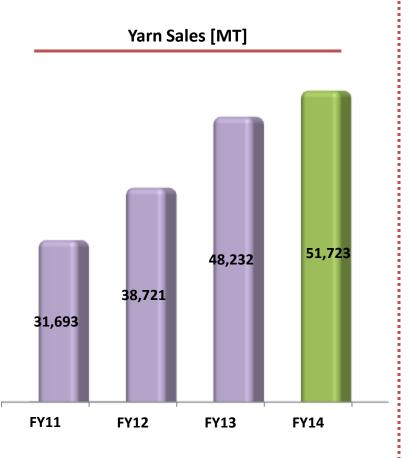


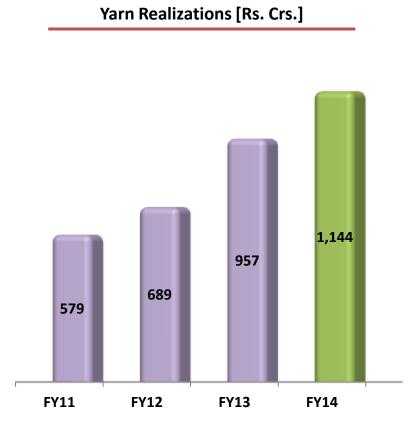
Geographical Split





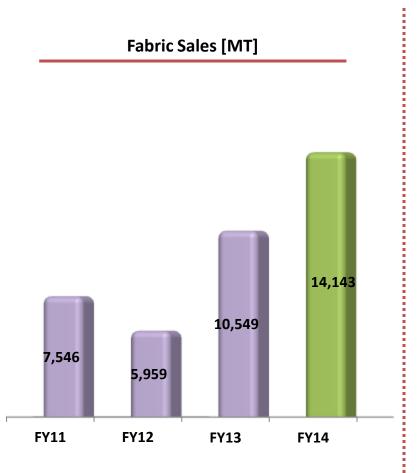

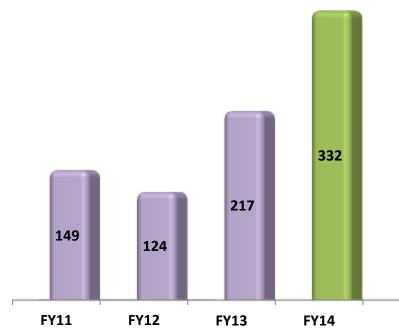

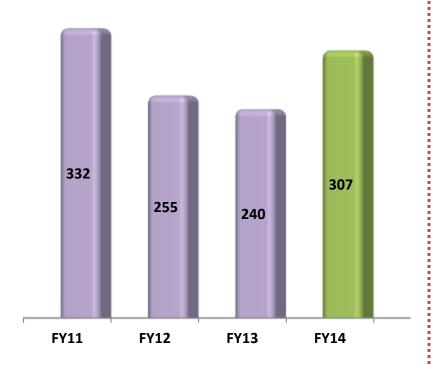
Fabric Realizations [Rs. Crs.]



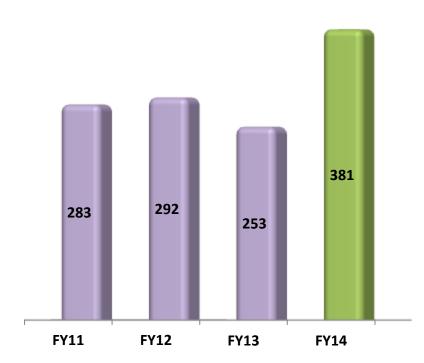
