NOTES:

1. A member entitled to attend and vote at the 08th annual general meeting is entitled to appoint one or more proxies to attend and vote instead of him/herself and such proxy need not be a member of the company. The instrument appointing proxy should however, be deposited at the registered office of the company not later than 48 hours before the commencement of the meeting.
2. Person can act as a proxy on behalf of members not exceeding fifty and holding in the aggregate not more than ten percent of the total share capital of the company carrying voting rights. A member holding more than ten percent of the total share capital of the company carrying voting rights may appoint a single person as proxy and such person shall not act as a proxy or any other person or shareholder.
3. Details of the Directors seeking re-appointment at the 08th AGM are provided as annexure to the AGM notice. The Company has received the requisite consents/declarations for the re-appointment under the Companies Act, 2013 and the rules made thereunder.
4. Relevant documents referred to in the accompanying Notice are open for inspection by the members at the registered office of the company on all working days, except Sundays, between 11.00 a.m. and 05.00 p.m. up to the date of meeting.
5. The Register of Members and the Share Transfer Books of the Company will remain closed for a period of Ten (10) days from Monday, 21st September, 2026 to Wednesday, 30th September, 2026 (both days inclusive).
6. In case of joint holders attending the AGM, the Member whose name appears as the first holder in the order of names as per the Register of Members of the Company will be entitled to vote.
7. The voting rights of Members shall be in proportion to their shares of the paid-up equity share capital of the Company as on the cut-off date i.e. Wednesday, 23rd September, 2026.
8. The Company has appointed Mr. Gaurang R Shah (CPN. 14446) Practicing Company Secretary, to act as the scrutinizer for conducting the voting process in a fair and transparent manner.
9. The Scrutinizer shall after the conclusion of 08th AGM, thereafter unblock the votes cast at meeting and shall make a scrutinizer's report of the total votes cast in favour or against, invalid votes, if any, and whether the resolution has been carried or not, and such Report shall then be sent to the Chairman or a person authorized by him, within 02 (two) working days from the conclusion of the 08th AGM, who shall then countersign and declare the result of the voting forthwith.
10. The Results declared along with the report of the Scrutinizer shall be placed on the website of the Company at www.technopackltd.com immediately after the declaration of Results by the Chairman or a person authorized by him. The results shall also be immediately forwarded to the BSE SME Limited, where the equity shares of the Company are listed.

11. Members are requested to contact Registrar and Transfer Agent (RTA) namely BIGSHARE SERVICES PVT. 12. Section 72 of the Companies Act, 2013, extends the nomination facility to individual shareholders of the Company. Therefore, the shareholders should approach to their respective depository participants for making nominations.
13. Members who hold shares in dematerialized form are requested to bring their client ID and DP ID numbers for easy identification of attendance at the meeting.
14. Members/Proxies are requested to bring with the attendance slip duly filled in and hand it over at the entrance.
15. Corporate Members intending to send their authorized representatives to attend the AGM are requested to send a certified copy of the Board Resolution to the Company, authorizing them to attend and vote on their behalf at the AGM.
16. Members, who have multiple accounts in identical names or joint names in same order are requested to intimate M/s. BIGSHARE SERVICES PVT. LTD the Ledger Folio of such accounts to enable the Company to consolidate all such shareholdings into one account.
17. As per the mentioned circular SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD1/CIR/P/2020/79 dated May 12, 2020, SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD2/CIR/P/2022/62 dated May 13, 2022 and in continuation thereof SEBI/HO/CFD/PoD-2/P/CIR/2023/4 dated January 05, 2023 and SEBI/HO/CFD/CFD-PoD-2/P/CIR/2023/167 dated October 7, 2023 and SEBI/HO/CFD/CFD-PoD-2/P/CIR/2024/133 dated October 3, 2024 and SEBI/HO/DDHS/DDHS-PoD-1/P/CIR/2025/83 dated June 25, 2023 (the “SEBI Circular”), Companies can serve Annual Reports and other communications through electronic mode to those Members who have registered their e-mail address either with the Company or with the Depository. Members who have not registered their e-mail addresses so far are requested to register their e-mail address so that they can receive the Annual Report and other communication from the Company electronically. Members holding shares in demat form are requested to register their e-mail address with their Depository Participant(s) only. Members of the Company, who have registered their e-mail address, are entitled to receive such communication in physical form upon request.
18. We desire members to support ‘Green Initiative’ by receiving the Company’s Communication through email. Members who have not registered their email addresses and mobile number so far are requested to validate/register their details with the Depository Participant for receiving all communication including Annual Report and other Notices from the Company electronically. The Members will be entitled to receive physical copy of the Annual Report for the financial year ended on March 31, 2026, free of cost, upon sending a request to the Registrar and Transfer Agent

or the Company Secretary of the Company.

19. In terms of the MCA Circulars and SEBI Circulars, the Notice of the AGM and the Annual Report for the Financial Year 2025-26 including therein the Audited Financial Statements for the Financial Year 2025-26 has been uploaded on the website of the Company at www.technopackltd.com and may also be accessed from the relevant section of the websites of the Stock Exchange i.e. BSE Limited at www.bseindia.com.
20. As per Regulation 40(1) of SEBI Listing Regulations, as amended, transfer of securities of the Company shall not be processed unless the securities are held in the dematerialised form with a depository. Further, transmission or transposition of Securities of the Company held in physical or dematerialised form shall be effected only in dematerialised form.
21. This Notice is being sent to all the Members whose names appear as on 28th August, 2026, in the Register of Members or in the Register of beneficial owners as received from Bigshare Services Pvt Ltd., the Registrar and Transfer Agent (“RTA”) of the Company.
22. A person whose name is recorded in the Register of Members or in the Register of beneficial owners maintained by the depositories as on 23rd September, 2026, (“Cut-Off date”) only shall be entitled to avail the facility of remote e-voting. The voting rights of Members shall be in proportion to their share of the paid-up equity share capital of the Company as of the Cut-Off date.
23. In case of joint holders attending the AGM, the Member whose name appears as the first holder in the order of names as per the Register of Members of the Company will be entitled to vote.

VOTING THROUGH ELECTRONIC MEANS (EVSIN: 260903007):

24. The Ministry of Corporate Affairs (“MCA”) vide its General Circular No. 03/2025 dated September 22, 2025 read with General Circular No. 09/2024 dated September 19, 2024, General Circular No. 09/2023 dated September 25, 2023, General Circular Nos. 2/2022 dated May 05, 2022, 21/2021 dated December 14, 2021, 02/2021 dated January 13, 2021, 20/2020 dated May 05, 2020, 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020 and 14/2020 dated April 08, 2020 (collectively referred to as “MCA Circulars”) permitted holding of the Annual General Meeting (“AGM”) through Video Conferencing (VC) / Other Audio Visual Means (OAVM), without physical presence of the Members at a common venue. The forthcoming AGM will thus be held through video conferencing (VC) or other audio-visual means (OAVM). Hence, Members can attend and participate in the ensuing AGM through VC/OAVM.
25. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 108 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 (as amended) and Regulation 44 of SEBI (Listing Obligations & Disclosure Requirements) Regulations 2015 (as amended), and MCA Circulars dated April 08, 2020, April 13, 2020 and May 05, 2020 the Company is providing facility of remote e-voting to its Members in respect of the business to be transacted at the AGM. For this purpose, the Company has entered into an agreement with Central Depository Services (India) Limited (CDSL) for facilitating voting through electronic means, as the authorized e-

Voting's agency. The facility of casting votes by a member using remote e-voting as well as the e-voting system on the date of the AGM will be provided by CDSL.

26. The Members can join the AGM in the VC/OAVM mode 15 minutes before and after the scheduled time of the commencement of the Meeting by following the procedure mentioned in the Notice. The facility of participation at the EGM/AGM through VC/OAVM will be made available to atleast 1000 members on first come first served basis. This will not include large Shareholders (Shareholders holding 2% or more shareholding), Promoters, Institutional Investors, Directors, Key Managerial Personnel, the Chairpersons of the Audit Committee, Nomination and Remuneration Committee and Stakeholders Relationship Committee, Auditors etc. who are allowed to attend the EGM/AGM without restriction on account of first come first served basis.
27. The attendance of the Members attending the AGM through VC/OAVM will be counted for the purpose of ascertaining the quorum under Section 103 of the Companies Act, 2013.
28. Pursuant to MCA Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 08, 2020, the facility to appoint proxy to attend and cast vote for the members is not available for this AGM. However, in pursuance of Section 112 and Section 113 of the Companies Act, 2013, representatives of the members such as the President of India or the Governor of a State or body corporate can attend the AGM through VC/OAVM and cast their votes through e-voting.
29. In line with the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) Circular No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020, the Notice calling the AGM has been uploaded on the website of the Company at www.technopackltd.com. The Notice can also be accessed from the websites of the Stock Exchanges i.e. BSE Limited at www.bseindia.com. The AGM Notice is also disseminated on the website of CDSL (agency for providing the Remote e-Voting facility and e-voting system during the AGM) i.e. www.evotingindia.com.
30. Since the AGM will be held through VC/OAVM, the Route Map is not annexed to this Notice. The deemed venue for the 08th AGM shall be the Registered Office of the Company.

THE INTRUCTIONS OF SHAREHOLDERS FOR E-VOTING AND JOINING VIRTUAL MEETINGS ARE AS UNDER:

Step 1 : Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.

Step 2 : Access through CDSL e-Voting system in case of shareholders holding shares in physical mode and non-individual shareholders in demat mode.

- (i) The voting period begins on **Sunday, 27th September, 2026 at 09:00 A.M. IST and ends on Tuesday, 29th September, 2026 at 05:00 P.M. IST**. During this period shareholders of the Company, holding shares, as on the cut-off date (record date) of **Wednesday, 23rd September, 2026** may cast their vote electronically. The e-voting module shall be disabled by CDSL for voting thereafter.

- (ii) Shareholders who have already voted prior to the meeting date would not be entitled to vote at the meeting venue.
- (iii) Pursuant to SEBI Circular No. **SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated 09.12.2020**, under Regulation 44 of Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, listed entities are required to provide remote e-voting facility to its shareholders, in respect of all shareholders' resolutions. However, it has been observed that the participation by the public non-institutional shareholders/retail shareholders is at a negligible level.

Currently, there are multiple e-voting service providers (ESPs) providing e-voting facility to listed entities in India. This necessitates registration on various ESPs and maintenance of multiple user IDs and passwords by the shareholders.

In order to increase the efficiency of the voting process, pursuant to a public consultation, it has been decided to enable e-voting to **all the demat account holders, by way of a single login credential, through their demat accounts/ websites of Depositories/ Depository Participants**. Demat account holders would be able to cast their vote without having to register again with the ESPs, thereby, not only facilitating seamless authentication but also enhancing ease and convenience of participating in e-voting process.

Step 1 : Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.

- (iv) In terms of **SEBI circular no. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated December 9, 2020** on e-Voting facility provided by Listed Companies, Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode are allowed to vote through their demat account maintained with Depositories and Depository Participants. Shareholders are advised to update their mobile number and email Id in their demat accounts in order to access e-Voting facility.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS REPORT

Your Director's have pleasure in presenting the management discussion and analysis report for the year ended on March 31, 2026.

GLOBAL ECONOMIC OVERVIEW

The global economy witnessed a notable deceleration during the financial year ended March 31, 2026, with overall growth moderating to an estimated **3.0% to 3.1%**. This slowdown was driven by a potent combination of persistent geopolitical tensions—escalating sharply in West Asia during the latter half of the fiscal year—elevated trade barriers, and highly cautious monetary execution across central banks reacting to structural inflation. High interest rates, implemented earlier to combat inflation, continued to dampen private capital expenditures and temper aggregate consumer spending.

Global trade remained sluggish, reflecting structural shifts in supply chains and reduced cross-border capital flows. Advanced economies, including the United States and much of Europe, reported weaker-than-expected growth, with Germany facing continued recessionary pressures and the UK undergoing sharp growth downgrades due to energy cost shocks. In contrast, select emerging markets demonstrated remarkable structural resilience—most notably India, which emerged as the global outperformer, sustaining a strong full-year real GDP growth rate well above the global average, supported by robust domestic consumption and aggressive public asset creation.

The world economy is at a precarious moment. Heightened trade tensions, alongside deep policy ambiguities, have significantly tested the global economic architecture heading into 2026. Higher protective tariffs—resulting in an increase in the effective tariff rate across major Western economies—are straining global supply chains, driving up cross-border production costs, and delaying critical institutional investment decisions, while also injecting volatility into secondary financial markets.

GDP GROWTH

During the financial year 2025–26, global GDP growth slowed to a tight 3.1% band, marking one of the softer expansions in the post-pandemic era.

- 1. Advanced Economies:** Saw a sharp deceleration. The United States grew at approximately 1.6%, constrained by prolonged tight financial cycles and elevated policy uncertainties, while the Eurozone hovered around 1.0% due to depressed factory output and vulnerability to energy import shocks.
- 2. China:** Growth moderated to a 4.0% – 4.4% range, heavily influenced by continued property sector adjustments and external trade restrictions.
- 3. India:** Emerged as the definitive global outperformer, with real full-year GDP growth climbing to an impressive 7.7%, driven by an energetic expansion in private final consumption expenditure, infrastructure investment, and key structural policy reforms.

INFLATION

Inflation continued to decline across most major economies, albeit at a slower and highly uneven rate. Heightened trade strains and localized industrial supply friction have added to uncertainty about its short-term trajectory. Global headline inflation averaged **4.0%** for the period, with forward trajectories projected to tick down slightly to **3.6%** in the outer months of 2026.

While softening prices for crude oil and base metals provided some supply-side relief, newly enacted trade restrictions and rising consumer tariff schedules across key advanced economies created contrasting upward pressures. These cross-currents introduce upside risk, keeping consumer pricing indices vulnerable to sudden turnarounds.

TRADE AND INVESTMENT

International trade is losing steam as a growth driver, with global trade growth weakening to 0.6% in 2023 and expected to recover to 2.4% in 2024. The report points to a shift in consumer spending from goods to services, rising geopolitical tensions, supply chain disruptions, and the lingering effects of the pandemic as factors impeding global trade.

INDIAN ECONOMY

After weathering a year of severe global headwinds—from elevated global interest rates to deep geopolitical instability in energy-exporting corridors—India’s macroeconomic fundamentals showcased exceptional structural strength.

According to the official provisional estimates released by the National Statistical Office (NSO), the Indian economy expanded by an outstanding 7.7% for the full fiscal year 2025–26 (an improvement from the 7.1% recorded in the previous fiscal year). The final quarter of the financial year (January–March 2026) capped this momentum with a powerful 7.8% year-over-year expansion, setting a highly confident operational baseline for the upcoming financial cycle.

Entering the new fiscal year, India’s economic landscape is buoyed by three key engines: a highly resilient domestic consumer base, a broadening enterprise investment landscape, and a digitally adaptive workforce. Urban spending indices remain healthy, private corporate capital expenditures are showing genuine green-shoot capacity additions, and localized high-value professional services are scaling up global delivery capabilities.

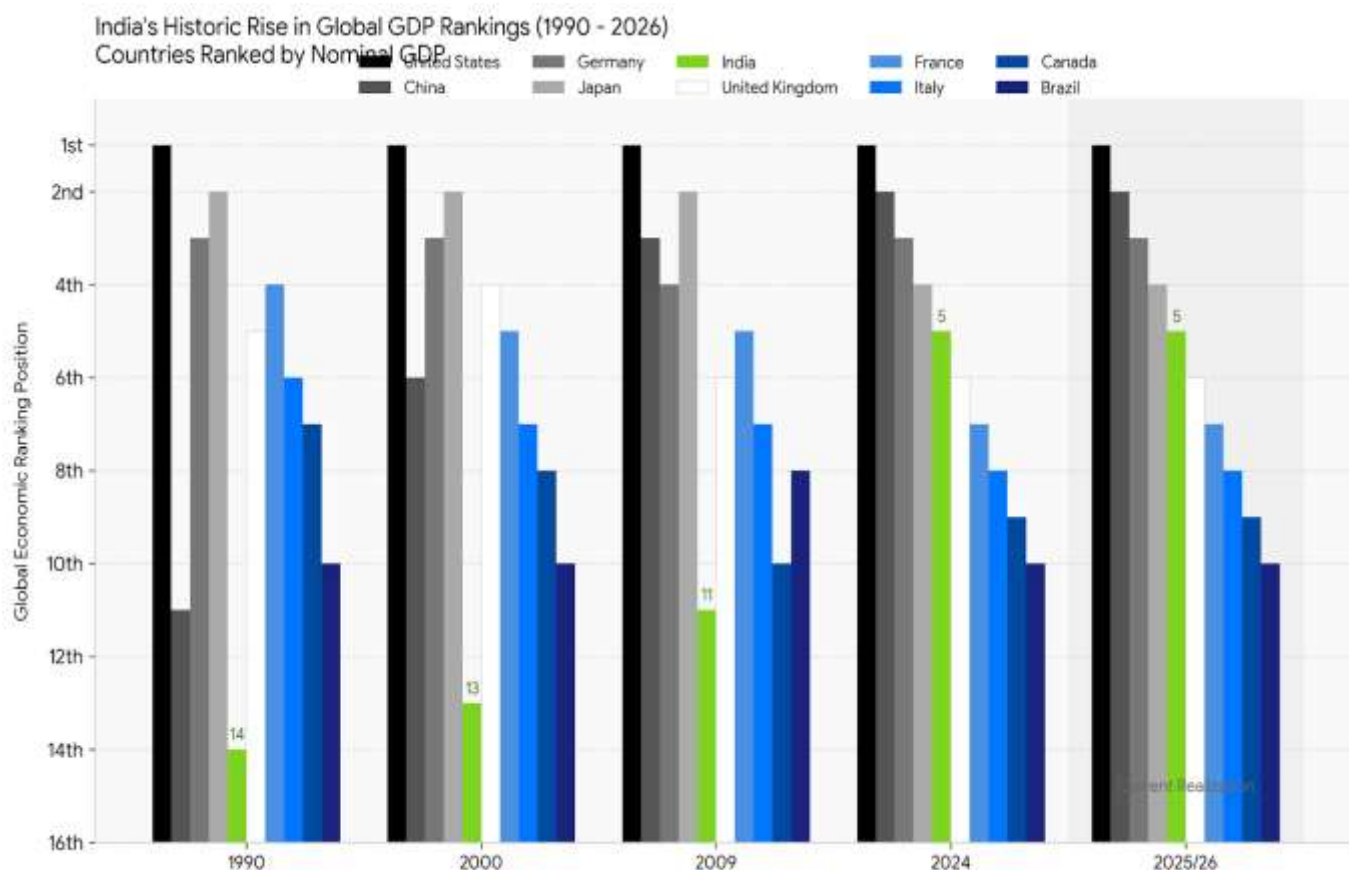
GDP RESILIENCE IN ECONOMIC FUNDAMENTALS

India’s official GDP numbers for the final quarter of fiscal 2025–26 outpaced institutional expectations, with real Gross Value Added (GVA) tracking at a robust 7.9%. This performance indicates that domestic demand is highly resilient, insulated by stable employment environments, tax rationalization, and improving agricultural recovery in rural economies.

From an expenditure standpoint, growth was securely led by a double-engine: Private Final Consumption Expenditure (PFCE) grew at an impressive 7.7%, while Gross Fixed Capital Formation (GFCF), capturing core domestic investment velocity, expanded by 8.2%. On the production side, the manufacturing sub-sector grew by 10.7%, while trade, transport, and communication services expanded by 11.0% in real terms.

The impact of global trade friction did lead to a moderation in goods exports during specific quarters. Nonetheless, service exports and robust inward remittances acted as highly critical shock absorbers.

According to data released by the Reserve Bank of India (RBI), India recorded a robust current account surplus of \$7.1 billion (0.7% of GDP) in the final quarter (Q4) of FY26, driven by net services receipts hitting \$60.4 billion and personal remittances surging to \$41.3 billion. For the full fiscal year 2025–26, India's annual Current Account Deficit (CAD) was maintained at a remarkably safe and unchanged level of just 0.6% of GDP, reinforcing India's superior macroeconomic stability relative to its emerging market peers.



INDIA'S NEAR-TERM OUTLOOK

Realized Growth and Drivers (FY 2025–26)

Supported by a structural improvement in economic fundamentals and a deliberate, multi-pronged policy push to unlock consumption spending—primarily driven by key direct tax exemptions and a calibrated easing of domestic monetary policy—India's growth did not merely sit within its baseline projection of 6.4% to 6.7%. Instead, the economy dramatically outperformed expectations, delivering a powerful real GDP expansion of 7.7% for the full fiscal year ended March 31, 2026.

Steady deceleration in core inflation acted as a major catalyst throughout the year, decisively bolstering both urban and rural consumer confidence. This return of purchasing power fueled a sustained surge in private

final consumption expenditure across primary discretionary sectors. Concurrently, international crude oil prices remained structurally range-bound. Given crude oil's substantial share in the national import bill, this pricing stability kept imported inflation low and directly insulated India's external trade balances.

Investment Momentum and Forward Trajectory (FY 2026–27)

The fiscal year concluded with robust domestic demand, showcasing an energetic uptick in private corporate spending in the first half of the year, followed by heavy commitments toward private investments as business leadership gained clarity amid global policy uncertainties.

Entering the new fiscal year (FY 2026–27), this macroeconomic momentum is structurally positioned to accelerate further. The compound growth trajectory achieved over the last two years has successfully lifted India's real GDP well beyond its pre-COVID trend line. The historical, pandemic-induced output gap has not just been closed—it has been decisively and structurally surpassed, paving the way for a more confident and expansionary mid-term investment cycle.

INDUSTRY OVERVIEW

The caps, closures and PET preform industry continued to demonstrate resilience and steady growth during FY 2025–26, supported by sustained demand from key end-use sectors including food and beverages, packaged drinking water, pharmaceuticals, personal care, household products and chemicals. The growing consumption of packaged products, urbanisation, changing consumer lifestyles and increasing preference for convenient and hygienic packaging solutions continued to support the overall demand for caps, closures and PET preforms.

The caps and closures segment remained an important component of the packaging industry, with manufacturers increasingly focusing on product innovation, improved functionality, lightweight designs and enhanced safety features. Demand for tamper-evident, leak-proof and easy-to-use closures continued to increase, particularly in the food, beverage and pharmaceutical sectors. At the same time, growing awareness regarding environmental sustainability encouraged industry participants to adopt recyclable materials, reduce material consumption and develop packaging solutions with improved environmental performance.

The PET preform industry also maintained a positive growth trajectory during FY 2025–26, primarily driven by continued demand from the packaged beverage, bottled water, edible oil and other consumer product segments. The increasing consumption of bottled and packaged beverages, together with the expansion of modern retail and distribution networks, supported demand for PET bottles and consequently for PET preforms. Manufacturers continued to focus on lightweighting and optimisation of preform designs to reduce raw material consumption, transportation costs and overall packaging weight while maintaining the required strength and performance characteristics.

Technological advancements remained a key factor influencing the industry during the year. Improvements in injection moulding technologies, automation, precision manufacturing and process optimisation enabled manufacturers to enhance productivity, improve product consistency and reduce manufacturing wastage. The adoption of customised preforms, high-performance designs and lightweight solutions also provided opportunities for manufacturers to address the specific requirements of different customers and applications.

The industry continued to remain sensitive to fluctuations in the prices of key raw materials, particularly PET resin and other polymer-based materials. Changes in crude oil prices, global supply-demand conditions, currency movements and logistics costs continued to influence input costs and operating margins. In addition, manufacturers remained focused on efficient inventory management, operational productivity and cost optimisation to mitigate the impact of volatility in raw material prices.

Sustainability continued to emerge as a significant theme during FY 2025–26. Increasing regulatory attention and customer preference for environmentally responsible packaging encouraged manufacturers to explore recyclable and resource-efficient packaging solutions. Lightweighting, reduction in material usage, recyclability and improved production efficiency remained important areas of focus across the industry.

Overall, the caps, closures and PET preform industry remained well positioned for continued growth, supported by increasing consumption of packaged products, expanding beverage and FMCG markets, technological developments and the continuing need for efficient, safe and sustainable packaging solutions. The ability of industry participants to manage raw material volatility, improve operational efficiency and respond to evolving customer and regulatory requirements is expected to remain critical for sustainable growth and competitiveness.

OPPORTUNITIES & THREATS

Opportunities

1. High-Speed Automation

Automation is the foundational operational standard driving the Indian plastic cap and closure industry. Driven by high-volume client demands across FMCG and beverage segments, automated continuous compression molding (CCM) reduces cycle times, optimizes thermal energy consumption, and limits production defects to achieve better operational margins.

2. Innovative Closure Design Enhancing Brand Image

As listed global and domestic consumer goods brands seek distinct market differentiation, innovative closure designs have transitioned from an aesthetic asset to an enterprise necessity. Manufacturers focusing on high-performance, complex multi-colored structures, and smart aesthetic closures can capture premium packaging accounts.

3. Accelerated Adoption of Lightweight Caps

Lightweight closure engineering is a critical tool for minimizing input resin consumption amid volatile global petrochemical pricing. By utilizing sophisticated high-performance geometries, lightweight plastic caps lower transportation freight costs and help institutional customers meet strict carbon footprint benchmarks.

4. Digitization and Supply Chain Traceability

The regulatory landscape requires enhanced digitization across production pipelines. Implementation of mandatory QR codes and localized tracking systems on rigid plastic packaging allows downstream client transparency, ensuring compliance with strict domestic raw material batch validations.

5. IoT Integration in Molding Operations

The integration of Internet of Things (IoT) sensors across CCM production floors provides continuous, real-time machine telemetry. This infrastructure enables predictive tool maintenance, drastically decreases unplanned factory downtime, and automates scrap segregation at scale.

6. Mandated Circularity and rPET Integration

With sustainability standards evolving rapidly, handling food-grade recycled plastics (rPET) has transformed into a high-growth business opportunity. Developing early processing capabilities for recycled materials establishes your business as a preferred tier-1 vendor for sustainability-conscious consumer corporations.

Threats

1. Implementation of the Plastic Waste Management (Amendment) Rules, 2026

The MoEFCC has aggressively codified the Plastic Waste Management (Amendment) Rules, 2026. Under this regime, **Category I (Rigid Plastic Packaging)** manufacturers face an immediate mandatory recycled content threshold of **30% for FY 2025–26**, climbing swiftly to **40% for FY 2026–27**. Non-compliance directly risks statutory penalties and supply line pauses.

2. Friction in High-Purity Supply Ecosystems

While compliance with Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) targets and recycled material quotas is legally binding, the domestic plastic collection ecosystem remains highly unorganized. Manufacturers face structural supply shortfalls in procuring clean, consistent, high-purity post-consumer plastic flakes suitable for food-grade cap reprocessing.

3. Volatility in Petrochemical Feedstocks

Operating margins continue to be exposed to sharp swings in international crude oil indexes and global polymer supply chains. Fluctuations in primary polypropylene (PP) and high-density polyethylene (HDPE) spot pricing complicate corporate margin forecasting.

4. High Capex Barriers for Advanced Engineering

Transitioning production assets to handle lightweight profiles, bioplastics, or precision rPET processing demands expensive upgrades. Relying on advanced injection and compression systems requires high upfront capital expenditure and long integration cycles.

5. Shortage of Specialized Technical Talent

Operating advanced Industry 4.0 automated machinery and complex molding matrices requires a highly trained engineering workforce. The domestic packaging industry faces strong competition for skilled field operators, creating risk of wage inflation and operational bottlenecks.

6. Elevated Product Development Costs for Green Packaging

Meeting corporate client requirements for sustainable packaging demands significant R&D spending. Companies must design custom, complex single-material systems that match the sealing properties of older, non-recyclable alternatives.

7. Competitive Fragmentation in Base Segments

The market continues to see low-tier local startups entering the commodity closure domain. This fragmentation compresses baseline margins for standard product lines, requiring established market leaders to continually pivot toward high-value, specialized closure technologies.

SEGMENT-WISE PERFORMANCE

The Company's core operational focus is organized under a single dominant segment: the high-velocity manufacturing of **Continuous Compression Molding (CCM) Caps & Closures** and **PET Preforms**. For the financial year ended March 31, 2026, resource allocations, factory floor optimizations, and capital deployments were dedicated to scaling up output and efficiency across these unified product groups.

OUTLOOK

The structural outlook for the Indian plastic closures ecosystem remains highly robust, driven by steady demand across downstream packaging applications. To build on this momentum, the Company is continually reviewing capacity enhancements in high-growth, technically advanced product categories.

Our long-term strategy focuses on prudent capital management, upgrading molding assets, and expanding our sustainable packaging capabilities to match evolving consumer corporate demands. Production expansions will remain strictly aligned with verified client demands to protect corporate liquidity.

RISK & CONCERNS

The Company operates a comprehensive enterprise risk management policy to systematically identify, evaluate, monitor, and mitigate business vulnerabilities. The primary corporate risk areas and our active mitigation strategies include:

Business Risk

Risk Profile: Over-reliance on a concentrated group of high-volume buyers or single-category packaging products leaves revenues vulnerable to client turnover or sudden shifts in consumer demand.

Mitigation Strategy: The Company continues to actively expand into non-beverage consumer segments, such as specialized pharma, chemical, and agrochemical packaging closures. We are steadily broadening our institutional client base across multiple geographies to avoid high individual account concentration.

Legal & Statutory Risk

Risk Profile: Listed entities face strict compliance obligations under the SEBI (LODR) Regulations, the Companies Act, 2013, and changing environmental mandates like the Plastic Waste Management framework.

Mitigation Strategy: The Company's legal, compliance, and secretarial teams continuously track changing statutory standards. The Company Secretary provides detailed compliance reviews to the Board of Directors quarterly, and the firm engages external legal and statutory advisors for all major cross-border transactions and capacity deployments.

Human Resource Attrition Risk

Risk Profile: Operating precision continuous compression systems requires retaining experienced technicians and production managers. High attrition rates directly disrupt factory productivity and product consistency.

Mitigation Strategy: Technopack Polymers Limited treats its engineering workforce as a key strategic asset. The Company manages attrition through structured skill development programs, competitive performance incentives, and clear long-term internal career paths.

Macroeconomic Risks

Risk Profile: Volatile energy trends, shifting indirect tax systems, and sudden adjustments to international import/export duties can directly impact production margins.

Mitigation Strategy: The Company relies on strict, conservative internal financial targets. We maintain a highly disciplined debt-to-equity ratio, manage appropriate liquidity buffers, and focus on premium institutional corporate clients with a strong track record of timely trade settlements.

Operational Risks

Risk Profile: Unplanned machine downtime, sudden drops in tooling output, or potential product liability issues can disrupt customer supply schedules and erode core margins.

Mitigation Strategy: The Company enforces rigorous, multi-tier quality control protocols across its molding processes. Our production teams use standardized preventive maintenance programs, maintain adequate buffer stocks of primary components, and carry robust product liability coverage to manage unexpected field disruptions.

Others (Foreign Exchange and Input Cost Risks)

Risk Profile: Fluctuations in cross-border currency pairs affect imported machinery costs, while global petrochemical movements directly drive baseline resin expenses.

Mitigation Strategy: The treasury team uses structured hedging strategies to lock in foreign exchange exposures. Raw material adjustments are managed through flexible, formula-based pricing mechanisms in long-term corporate supply agreements, allowing partial pass-through of extreme polymer price swings.

AUDIT AND INTERNAL CONTROL SYSTEM

One of the key requirements of the Companies Act, 2013 is that companies should have adequate Internal Financial Controls (IFC) and that such controls should operate effectively. Internal Financial Controls means the policies and procedures adopted by the Company for ensuring orderly and efficient conduct of its business, including adherence to Company's policies, safeguarding of its assets, prevention and detection of frauds and errors, accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, and timely preparation of reliable

financial information. Your Company's process of assessment ensures that not only does adequate controls exist, but it can also be evidenced by unambiguous documentation. The process involves scoping and planning to identify and map significant accounts and processes based on materiality. Thereafter, risk is identified and their associated controls are mapped, else remediation is implemented. These controls are tested to assess operating effectiveness. The auditor performs independent testing of controls. The Auditors' Report is required to comment on whether the Company has adequate IFC system in place and such controls are operating effectively. Your Company's Internal Control System is robust and well established. It includes documented rules and guidelines for conducting business. The environment and controls are periodically monitored through procedures/ processes set by the management, covering critical and important areas. These controls are periodically reviewed and updated to reflect the changes in the business and environment.

The Audit Committee periodically reviews the internal controls systems and reports their observations to the Board of Directors.

The Directors have appointed M/s. Padaliya & Associates (FRN: 138580W), Chartered Accountants as the Internal Auditors of the Company for the FY 2025-26 on 29/05/2026 in Board Meeting.

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

During the year under review, the Company has generated total revenue of ₹ 837.41/- (in Lakhs) (Previous Year ₹ 1,728.15/- (in Lakhs)). The net profit before exceptional items and taxes is ₹ 152.02/- (in Lakhs) (Previous Year ₹ 231.99/- (in Lakhs)). The net profit after taxes resulted into the profit for the year at ₹ 120.88/- (in Lakhs) (Previous Year ₹ 171.61/- (in Lakhs)).

MATERIAL DEVELOPMENTS IN HR / INDUSTRIAL RELATION / NUMBER OF PERSON EMPLOYED

Our Company believes that the human capital is key to bring in progress. The Company believes in maintaining cordial relation with its employees, which is one of the key pillars of the Company's business. The Company's HR policies and practices are built on core values of Integrity, Passion, Speed, and Commitment. The Company's focus is on recruitment of good talent and retention of the talent pool. The Company is hopeful and confident of achieving the same to be able to deliver results and value for our shareholders. As on 31st March, 2026, the total employees on the Company's rolls stood at 8 on permanent basis and 10 on contract basis.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention on an accrual basis. The management accepts responsibility for the integrity and objectivity of the financial statements, as well as for the various estimates and judgment used therein.

1. Company Information

Technopack Polymers Limited (formerly known as Technopack Polymers Private Limited) is a limited company domiciled in India and incorporated under the Companies Act, 2013 as 'Technopack Polymers Private Limited'. The company is engaged in manufacturing HDPE Caps, and a range of high-quality plastic packaging solutions. 2. Significant accounting policies

(a) Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the applicable Accounting Standards notified under the Companies (Accounting Standards) Rules, 2021 and other accounting principles generally accepted in India. These financial statements comply in all material respects with the relevant provisions of the Companies Act, 2013.

The Company is listed on the SME Platform of Name of Exchange - e.g., NSE EMERGE / BSE SME and, as per the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) Notification dated 16th February 2015, is exempted from the mandatory adoption of Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS). Accordingly, the Company has prepared its financial statements under the prevailing Accounting Standards (AS) framework as applicable to Small and Medium-sized Companies.

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention, unless otherwise stated.

(b) Use of Accounting Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Indian GAAP requires management to make judgments, estimates, and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income, expenses, and the accompanying disclosures as at the reporting date.

These estimates and underlying assumptions are based on management's best knowledge of current events and circumstances and are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates, if any, are recognized prospectively in the period in which the estimates are revised and in future periods affected.

Due to the inherent uncertainties involved in making estimates, actual results may differ from those estimates.

(c) Revenue Recognition

(As per AS 9 - "Revenue Recognition", under Companies (Accounting Standards) Rules, 2021, applicable to companies not covered under Ind AS)

Revenue is recognized when it is reasonably certain that ultimate collection will occur, and when significant risks and rewards of ownership of goods or services have been transferred to the buyer, as per the terms of the contract.

Sale of Goods: Revenue from sale of goods is recognized when the goods are delivered and the property in goods passes to the buyer, typically on dispatch or delivery, depending on the agreed terms.

Other Operating Revenue: Any ancillary operating revenue is recognized on accrual basis when the right to receive is established.

Interest Income: Recognized on a time proportion basis, using the effective interest rate method.

Other Income: Recognized on accrual basis, unless the collection is uncertain.

All revenue is recognized net of Goods and Services Tax (GST) and other applicable indirect taxes.

Current Investments are carried at the lower of cost and fair value, determined individually for each investment.

On disposal of an investment, the **difference between the carrying amount and the net sale proceeds** is recognized as income or expense in the **Statement of Profit and Loss**.

Subsequent expenditures are capitalized only if they result in **enhanced future economic benefits** from the asset. Otherwise, such costs are recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss as incurred.

Assets individually costing Rs.5,000 or less are depreciated at **100% in the year of acquisition**.

Depreciation is provided using the **Written Down Value (WDV) method** in accordance with the rates and useful lives specified in Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013 or based on management's best estimate where different.

General Machinery: 18.10% WDV (15-year useful life)

Camera / Label Printer: 25.89% WDV

Low-use assets (e.g., furniture, office equipment): Custom rates per management estimate
Assets purchased close to year-end are depreciated proportionately.

The useful life and residual value of assets are reviewed annually and adjusted, if appropriate.

Capitalization of Machinery Not Yet Put to Use

The following assets were capitalized during the year ended 31st March 2025 but were not ready for intended use as at the Balance Sheet date. Accordingly, no depreciation has been charged on these assets during the year:

CCM2 Machinery (Feb '25)

CCM3 Machinery (Technopack)

PMV Machine (Feb '25)

These assets are carried at cost under **Property, Plant and Equipment** and will be depreciated commencing from the date they are available for use as per the Company's accounting policy in line with AS 10.

Disposal of Machinery (PET & CAP OLD):

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured using the tax rates and **tax laws that have been enacted** or substantively enacted by the Balance Sheet date.

The Company **reassesses** unrecognized deferred tax assets, if any, at each Balance Sheet date.

It is **probable** that an **outflow of resources** will be required to settle the obligation.

A reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

Provisions are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the best estimate. If it is no longer probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, the provision is reversed.

A contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events, whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events.

Contingent liabilities are not recognized in the financial statements but are disclosed in the notes to accounts if material.

Contingent Assets are **not recognized** in the financial statements:

Contingent assets are disclosed where an inflow of economic benefits is **probable**, but they are not recognized as assets until realization is virtually certain.

If the realization of income is virtually certain, the related asset is recognized in the period in which the change occurs.

Financing Activities: These include activities that result in changes in the **size and composition of the equity capital** and **borrowings** of the Company.

Cash and cash equivalents include **cash on hand**, **balances with banks in current accounts**, and other short-term, highly liquid investments with **original maturities of three months or less** that are readily convertible into known amounts of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

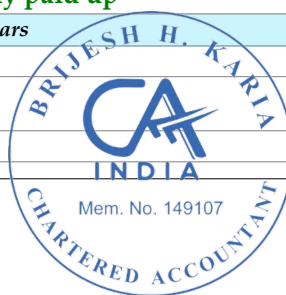
